VOV Builds Support for a Community FM Station

During Strawberry Festival weekend, in the span of just 16 hours, Voice of Vashon volunteers collected over 1,500 signatures on a petition to the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) in support of a community FM radio station on Vashon Island.

If the license is granted, perhaps sometime next year, it will be the culmination of a dream first imagined by the late Bill Morosoff and Voice of Vashon's Steve Allen in 2001. A community group including Bill Wood, Jeff Hoyt, Susan McCabe and many other volunteers pulled together when initial studies made it seem that a community FM radio station might be possible. Sadly, the first license attempt failed in 2003 because the old FCC rules made it extremely difficult to find a clear frequency on the dial. This new license application, to be filed in October, has a much better chance of success because the new rules have been changed to allow more community radio stations

"We have a lot more hope for getting a license this time because the new rules are less strict," says Steve Allen, a veteran broadcast engineer. "Also, the FCC has denied hundreds of applications for so-called translator stations that rebroadcast a single station over a wide area but suck up frequencies that might be used by small rural communities like ours."

Thanks to community donations at

Festival, combined with grant funding from Puget Sound Energy, VoV has now covered the cost of the license application. Very sophisticated engineering studies will be required under FCC rules to prove the Island's community radio station will comply with FCC regulations aimed at preventing interference with stations on the mainland.

VoV Community Outreach Coordinator Susan McCabe has been working all year, gathering endorsements Continued on Page 9

OCCU leases Bank of America building

By the end of the year Vashon Island residents will have the option of two credit unions on Vashon Island. Our Community Credit Union based out of Shelton, Washington has announced its plans to expand to Vashon Island. OCCU will offer services to residential and business customers, offering commercial loans and merchant account services. The new Credit union will also be making safe deposit boxes available to both residential and business customers.

Patte Wagner at Puget Sound Cooperative Credit Union welcomed the addition of another credit union to serve the Islands needs. She noted that this will greatly improve the offerings to businesses on Vashon that wish to bank with credit unions.

OCCU emailed this statement to the Vashon Loop.

Our Community Credit Union is pleased to announce that they will be partnering with Vashon East Shopping Center to begin leasing the building that Bank of America will depart on November 1, 2013. The 25,000 member, \$270 million credit union based out of Shelton Washington, answered the call of Norm Mathews, managing partner of the Vashon East Shopping Center to become a part of the Vashon community. "We felt it was a good fit, says Norm, I spoke with CEO Bert Fisher over the course of several weeks and really liked the credit union's philosophy of local involvement and handson approach to member service."

OCCU formally Simpson Employees Federal Credit Union was formed in 1941 by



a group of loggers who were unable to get a loan through traditional banks. Since then the philosophy of people helping people has been the guiding principle of how the credit union operates. As a cooperative credit union they help families and business owners save money by offering low or no fee services.

"We're excited to get to know the people of Vashon and develop relationships with the families and businesses in the community." says Bert Fisher, President/CEO of OCCU.

The credit union hopes to open their branch by the end of the year. This is their 7th branch with other locations in Shelton, Union, McCleary, Elma and Montesano. You can learn more about the credit union and the services they offer at www.ourcu.com.

Bank of America is currently installing a new automated banking center in the parking lot of the Vashon Market Fresh IGA, located on the Westside of Vashon town off 100th Ave. The new bank machine should be operational before the closing of the Vashon Bank of America branch. The new automated banking center will be the only Bank of America location where customers can still withdraw money, make deposits or transfer funds on Vashon Island without incurring fees.

Skill Sharing

Now as to the more in depth skills sharing, I have a much grander idea that will require the time and energy of a lot of people to put on. What I have in mind is a skillshare fair. Since we quit repairing things or doing a lot of things for ourselves, we have forgotten skills that our parents or grandparents or somebody they knew had. However, we all have skills that we can teach each other.

For instance, I have to confess that as much as I've read and accumulated the proper tools, getting a really good edge on a kitchen knife is still mystifying to me. I can't seem to get that razor edge that glides through the carrots and

immediately parts a tomato skin. How often have you had a tool or appliance stop working and your only recourse was to send it back to the factory at great expense or buy another one? More often than not, the easiest solution is to dump the old one and buy a new one. Because of our lack of skill, the non working machine which may have required a 15 minute repair is thrown in the garbage with 99% of its parts in perfect working condition. I think everybody agonizes over that to some extent. We can't afford to waste the time and resources put into those parts. We also can't afford to frivolously manufacture millions of new tools from increasingly scarce resources. In the transition movement, we have often talked about caretaking our finite fossil fuel supply, but we can't ignore all the other minerals as well. It's true that we are getting a lot better at recycling our minerals, but we can't continue to operate an economy that sees ever more goods and ever more consumption as inherently good.

Another set of lost skills revolves around making useful things out of the plants, animals, and materials we find all around us. This includes growing, preparing, preserving food, knowing *Continued on Page 9*

Sad Seal Story

Harbor Seal pupping season is off to a tragic start on Vashon. On July 25, a pup recovered from the beach at Dilworth died in transport to rehab. The pup was dehydrated and malnourished because the mother could not nurse her baby regularly. Too many people hovering around the pup or otherwise disregarding the Marine Mammal Protection Act (MMPA) -- federal law that protects seals -- deterred the mother from coming ashore to feed her baby.

A much-publicized episode with a "weaner" seal in Henderson Inlet illustrates the challenges facing marine mammal stranding responders. The public generally dislikes hearing that we do not routinely intervene with every solitary pup. Scarce resources and funding limit response capacity – can



you say "sequestration?" We do not handle seals as if they were stray puppies and kittens.

The Henderson Inlet "weaner" is at a Harbor Seal haul-out site with dozens of seals. At more than four weeks old, he is old enough to find his own food. Several mothers rejected him before he found one willing to let him nurse alongside her own younger pup. Do not expect such a Disney ending on Vashon. We have no large seal haul-outs nearby, so another lactating mom is unlikely to indulge a forlorn pup here.

Hauling out is normal pinniped behavior. Pinnipeds -- seals and sea lions -- do it everyday. They come ashore to rest, thermoregulate, mate, give birth, nurse young, and molt. In urban Puget Sound, pinnipeds use manmade structures and even large marine debris because many shorelines are unnatural and highly developed.

Typically, seal pups on shore are not abandoned or ill. Mother seals leave *Continued on Page 5*

Fire Marshal calls for burn ban in King County

As hot and dry weather conditions continue, the outdoor fire danger has increased. In response King County is issuing a fire safety burn ban in unincorporated areas of the County effective July 29, 2013.

This is a Phase 1 burn ban and applies to all outdoor burning except for small recreational fires in established fire pits at approved camp grounds or private property with the owner's permission. Recreational fires must:

- Be built in a metal or concrete fire pit, such as those typically found in designated campgrounds; and not be used as debris disposal;
 - · Grow no larger than three feet in diameter;
- · Be located in a clear spot free from any vegetation for at least 10 feet in a horizontal direction, including at least 25 feet away from any structure and allow 20-foot vertical clearance from overhanging branches; and
- · Be attended at all times by an alert individual and equipment capable of extinguishing the fire.

For properties located within cities, please contact your local jurisdiction for requirements. This ban remains in effect until further

Vashon Island Hosts Third Annual Northwest Salmon Derby

A wise man once said: "There's a fine line between fishing and just standing insensibly on the shore."

More recently, an even wiser man said: "Why not fish from the shore or launch a boat and participate in the 2013 Vashon Island Picnic & Pink Salmon Derby, Saturday, August 24, at Dockton Park, when there is CASH \$\$\$ to be won?

(We want to encourage shore fishermen to enter the derby too!)

Why, indeed?

The organizers of the Vashon Derby are proud to be one of the 15 derbies in the Northwest Salmon Derby Series. Lead organizer, Islander Gene Kuhns, has worked hard each of the past three years to bring the Derby (benefiting Vashon's IFCH (Interfaith Council to Prevent Homelessness)) to the waters of Outer Quartermaster and beyond.

Weigh-in begins that Saturday at 10am and continues until 12 noon – precisely (anglers: don't be a second too late!)

From noon to 2 pm, following the weigh-in, there will be a free community potluck picnic and barbeque grilling (just follow your nose and all the happy grins to the area just beyond Dockton Park playground). All are invited to come, angler or no, and don't forget to bring a favorite item to grill and one of grandma's dishes to pass.

Also don't forget about the prizes. This year they're bigger and better:

Adults (17 yrs +): 1st Place, \$1,500*; 2nd Place, \$750*; 3rd Place, \$250*. (*based on 200 entrants)

Youth (12-16 years): first place is \$125.

Children (2-11 years): first place is \$62.50.

For Youth and Children, there will be cash prizes awarded for 1st – 10th place.

In the wake of last year's Derby, Gene Kuhns was ecstatic about prying 67 fishermen away from the region's larger and better known derbies and was happy to see 12 hatchery-raised beauties landed and weighed. Twelve fish were registered in 2012 with the largest being 12 lb 13 oz. landed by Islander Dan Rice. Dan duly received a check for \$480.

Last year's Dockton Derby also benefited the Interfaith Council with a donation check in the amount of \$500.

The NW Salmon Derby Series grand prize last year was a River Hawk boat that went to Lon Hayne of Bellevue. Lon won the boat by participating in the 2012 Edmonds Coho Derby. The 21-foot River Hawk boat was rigged and outfitted at Cabela's and placed on display at the Seattle Boat Show this past January.

This year's grand prize is a fully-loaded 21' River Hawk boat powered by a Merc 4-stroke 150HP engine, the total boat package valued at \$55,000!

The NW Salmon Derby Series also has a Mercury Marine Challenge. Adult 1st Prize will be \$3,000; 2nd Place, \$2,000; and 3rd Place, \$1,000. (If your primary power is a Mercury Marine Engine 2008 or newer)

their pups alone, sometimes for many hours, while they forage offshore. Pups nap on beaches, rafts, boat ramps, stairs, and bulkheads. Inexperienced or firsttime mothers are more likely to park their pups in less desirable, high-traffic areas, such as the boat ramp by La Playa Restaurant and busy beaches at Point Robinson, KVI and Dilworth.

Newborn seals look appealing and helpless on land, but resist the impulse to touch or feed them. Do not move them, pour water on them, cover them with blankets, or put them in a backpack, car, bathtub - aargh! Stay 100 yards away from pups on shore; respect their space.

Harassing marine mammals violates the MMPA. Harassment or disturbance occurs when people impede a marine mammal's ability to hunt, feed, rest, breed, communicate, socialize, or care for young. Moreover, frightened seals can bite and transmit diseases to dogs and humans.

If people and dogs loiter around a seal pup, thereby preventing Mom from returning to nurse her baby, Mom might ditch the pup. Disrupting feeding and maternal bonding jeopardizes pup survival. Interfering with natural behavior by "rescuing" a seal pup who is not in trouble imperils the pup's adaptability in the wild. Seal rehab centers have severely limited space, and pups released from rehab face an uncertain future. Studies show that they do not hunt as proficiently as wild-reared pups. People are poor substitutes for seal mothers.

Inadvertently, waterfront-dwelling

humans are encroaching on seal habitat. We must be considerate and learn to share the shore with seal moms and babies during pupping season, which is July to September on Vashon-Maury Island. Check out NOAA's "Sharing the Shore with Harbor Seal Pups" fact sheet at www.nwr.noaa.gov/Marine-Mammals/Stranding-Information.cfm.

We urge Islanders to immediately report seal pups on beaches where crowd control is an issue. Many incidents involving seal pups can be harmoniously resolved with a phone call to the VHP. Posting a seal sign on private property is problematic - the signs often go missing or become beach trash. With help from compassionate neighbors, we would prefer to designate informal "Seal Sitters."

Annual Harbor Seal pup mortality is a sobering 50%. As stranding responders, we habitually confront the distressing sight of dying or dead marine mammals. Human intrusion contributed to the Dilworth pup's death. Seal pups should not die needlessly from ignorance and insensitivity.

Please support the work of the Vashon Hydrophone Project (VHP): REPORT LOCAL WHALE SIGHTINGS ASAP TO 463-9041, as well as sick, injured, or dead marine mammals on Island beaches. Prompt reports to the VHP expedite vital data collection efforts by Mark Sears and other researchers, and sustain an accurate record of whale sightings for Vashon-Maury and Central Puget Sound initiated three decades ago. 2013 Vashon Sheepdog Classic Includes a New Focus on Fiber Arts

On September 13, 14, and 15, from dawn to dusk each day, sheepdogs will cunningly herd sheep on a beautiful, serene Misty Isle Farms pasture. Hundreds of people will watch, and be amazed and amused as the competition unfolds before their eyes

Off to the side, on a slightly raised knoll above the pasture, another sort of action will unfold: the Skacel Fiber Arts Tent. Under this tent local fiber artists will share their knowledge, skill, and devotion to All Things Fiber.

Maggi MaClure (founder and Head Sheepdog of the Vashon Sheepdog Classic) recognizes that the annual Vashon sheepdog trials event is the perfect venue to showcase sheepdog handler's and their dog's skills. She also recognizes that it could be the perfect venue to showcase what fiber artists do with wool from sheep. So Maggi has invited local spinners, knitters, felters and weavers to share in the dog trial event activities, showcasing what they love to do.

Skacel Knitting (an international wholesaler for yarn and knitting accessories, and based in Tukwila) agreed to sponsor a fiber arts tent at the trials. As a result, folks attending the Sheepdog Trials this year will also be invited to view and take part in the fiber arts when they visit this tent at the trials

Within the Skacel Fiber Arts Tent, the following will be happening each day, 10am-4pm:

- -- Yarnstorming: local knitters will be joined by any willing knitter attending the trials as they knit pieces and secure them onto a field gate. The resulting colorful "yarnstormed gate" will be used in the 2014 Vashon trials.
- -- Sheep to Shawl Demonstration: a local spinning group, SpinnersRock, will provide a daily demonstration showing how wool is picked, carded, spun and woven to create a shawl. The resulting shawls will be donated as a fundraiser for Vashon's local nonprofit wildlife sanctuary, Wolftown.
- -- Fiber arts product sales will be offered by Susan Bates, the Vashon Textile Collective, local spinners, and others.

--Skacel Knitting will provide demonstrations and answer questions about their

--The Sheepdog Trials Afghan, created by a local group of knitters will be on display, and available for purchase.

--Fiber Arts Demonstrations will be offered throughout each day and will include Dyeing with Plants, Drop Spindle Spinning, Solar Dyeing, Great Wheel Spinning, Drumcarding, Needle Felting, Sheep Shearing, Knitting Multiple Socks on One Knitting Needle, Rigid Heddle Loom Weaving, and Charka Spinning.



You've heard a lot about the Mediterranean Diet, how it brings you long life, smart brain and joi de vivre. And you've heard from me about how the sea-vegetable eating Okinawans remain active and productive up to age 100 and older. Now we find out that Nordic people are no slouches in the art of healthy living. According to a dieticians at Weill Cornell Medical College, a Nordic diet can keep you healthy just as well as the more famous Mediterranean Diet.

The term "Nordic" m e a n s essentially Scandinavian - Norway and Sweden. A Nordic diet is laden with fish, berries, and root vegetables. Half of Norway and a third if Sweden is farther north than Anchorage, Alaska, and is extremely hilly. Sweden has a fringe of low altitude land along the Gulf of Bothnia and lots of low altitude land between 56 and 62 degrees north. Their growing season is short, but those summer days last many, many hours even at the southernmost part of Scandinavia. And when the long winter closes in, you can dig beneath the snow and find your carrots, turnips, and rutabagas cleverly clad in mounds of earth

so the roots won't freeze. For winter protein, Norwegians had

Here is a recipe that fits a Nordic type diet, but it's from Spain and for summer. Serve as an appetizer, or as a main dish. One of it's blessings is that it requires very little cooking, a boon on days too warm to cook. You can make it in the morning and let it chill all day.

Escabeche

4 appetizer servings 2 main dish servings

1 lb. boneless or boned

1 cup lemon juice (bottled juice works fine)

2 Tablespoons minced hot green pepper

½ cup diced peeled and seeded tomato

1 teaspoon salt Dash cayenne

Dash oregano, optional

Poach the fish 3 minutes. Drain. Dice. Place in a glass or ceramic dish. Combine the remaining ingredients and smother the fish pieces with

Cover the dish. Marinate in refrigerator for 3 to 4 hours.

Service: If you are totally sure that the fish came from unpolluted water, you can skip the poaching. Then the fish is never cooked by anything but the acid in the lemon juice, and the resulting summer delight is called seviche.

Accompany either Escabeche or Seviche with potato salad, buttered green peas, rye bread and butter, and for dessert strawberries dipped in melted bittersweet chocolate, or in sour cream and coconut sugar, only 30 on the Glycemic Index vs. cane sugar's 100.

Things around us includes our own hands, voices, and feet, so music and dancing are some other things we can become proficient at. Did you know that native hazelnut or Indian plum will make a good strong shovel handle and, with a little looking you can find a piece that is already the size and shape that you need? We've come to think that the only legitimate goods have to come from big manufacturers or farms. We are surrounded by all kinds of basket weaving and cord making materials that are as or more durable as many manmade materials. I'm not saying that all manmade materials are without merit, but we can go a long way making practical and aesthetically pleasing artifacts for ourselves and enjoy the process of making them. What's not to like about that? Well, I can hear a lot of you saying that you don't have the time to do those things. That is indeed a lamentable situation and a difficult problem that's been addressed here before and will be again.

His compositions have been commissioned by the Kronos Quartet, The Brooklyn Academy of Music, and Earshot Jazz Festival and has been the recipient of grants from several organizations including the National Endowment of the Arts.

Robin Holcomb is a pianist and songwriter who has been critically acclaimed for her seamless merging of avant guard jazz, classical compositions and Americana and folk that create dusty atmospheres and landscapes that are both haunting and compelling. She has released several albums, all critically acclaimed for their inventiveness and depth. She also appeared on the Bill Frisell's seminal and groundbreaking record "Nashville" and many other recordings. The New York Times says: "...She has created a new American regionalism, spun from many threads -country, rock, minimalism, Civil War songs, Baptist hymns, Appalachian fold tunes, even the poly-tonal music of

elegantly simple as a Shaker Quilt, and no less beautiful."

Eyvind Kang, the groundbreaking and massively acclaimed viola player and composer has played on records from Bill Frisell, Laurie Anderson, Lou Reed, Mike Patton, John Zorn, Laura Veirs, Beth Orton and Beck. As a composer, he has put out over 20 recordings, many on John Zorns label Tzadic Records, including 7 Nades, Theatre of Mineral Nades, The Story of Iceland, The Yelm Sessions and Grass. He has explored in these various musical outings an aesthetic that swings effortlessly between jazz, avant guard, metal, folk, and eastern music. His collaborations with his wife Jessika Kenney have led to works that have been recognized, along with his other work as innovative, lush compositions that cross boundaries elegantly and genuinely.

Jessika Kenney is a truly inspiring singer. She is committed to traditional music, notably Persian and Javanese, and is one of the few non Persian to achieve as much renown with her work, performing and recording with Ostad Hossein 'Omoumi. She has not been limited to this however, and has collaborated with John Cage, Jarred Powell, and husband, Eyvind Kang. Her ability to transform disparate singing styles into a cohesive sound is truly remarkable, and she should be considered one of the best pure vocalists in the world.

Bill Patton is a guitar and pedal steel player who has worked with countless names in the Seattle area including Grammy nominated work with the Fleet Foxes, Josh Tillman (Father John Misty), the Low Hums, Gold Leaves and many others. His own work is spare and contemplative, rich in songwriting values and lyrical depth. His guitar work is extraordinary and his performances are known for their riveting intensity and tenderness.

Rafe Pearlman's music springs from his life as a gypsy traveler born to two bohemian artists. As a boy, he and his family journeyed from a houseboat in Sausalito, to a cabin outside Guerneville, California to the dunes of Cape Cod and eventually across Canada in a big dodge pickup. The migration ended with floating down the Yukon River into the town of Ruby, Alaska (population 166) on two canoes that had been tied together. It was here amongst trappers, fisherman and wilderness navigators that he learned to sing with the sled dogs, howl with the wolves and talk with the ravens. Heartfelt communication through music and art became his navigational compass for life.

Rafe Pearlman is a musician who defies categorization yet stands firmly in his unique creative space and owns it. Over the years, Rafe has been involved with an eclectic array of interesting musical adventures, including features in film scores, performing on "America's Got Talent," writing with renowned composer Tyler Bates, headlining music festivals, as the first male voice on Sony's God of War video game and a host of recordings and




