Community Solar!

As we ride over the peak of global oil production, and the threat of climate disturbance approaches, we will need to learn how to live with less and less fossil fuel, firstly because we won't have as much, and secondly, because we dare not burn it. One of the first casualties of this double jeopardy is the global economy. As the global economy weakens, the obvious alternative is to begin localizing our economy. With multiple independent and redundant economies, natural disasters or conflict in one place will not necessarily broadcast instability throughout the system. It is the way nature works. I'm not saying that everything will be rosy, but we would stand a much better chance of providing for our needs. So, localizing makes good sense for that reason alone.

Nowhere are we more dependent on the world at large than in our reliance on the power grid. When the grid goes down, the effect is dramatic and immediate. We can build resilience into our communities in two ways: we can reduce our need for power through conservation and conscious lifestyle change, and we can begin to invest in energy sources at the local level.

You may remember the PUD proposal that we voted on in 2006.

The proposal called for a massive commitment to improve home energy efficiency while building local energy infrastructure. As you may remember, the PUD proposal was defeated. I think it's fair to say that either it wasn't ready for us or we weren't ready for it.

The proposal was based on the first comprehensive assessment of the ability of Vashon to provide energy for itself. The study was completed in 2005 by the Institute for Environmental Research and Education, which is led by Islander Rita Schenck. This study is a tremendous resource for us and I expect that most of the data collected is still valid. The study, all 127 pages, can be accessed here: www. iere.org/Data/Sites/1/SharedFiles/ energyindependence/vashon-summary.

Even though the PUD never became a reality, some of the opportunities that it would have provided are available today just the same. Rebates and Subsidies for home energy efficiency upgrades are available through Puget Sound Energy and the state and Federal governments. Puget Sound Consumer Credit Union now offers low interest loans similar to what would have been available through the PUD. Vashon Wisenergy provides the audits and assistance the PUD would

Holy Moly Moments MPD Project Relocates

Native Vashon islander Hallie Aldrich returned to Vashon in fall, 2011 with her EcoDance project in tow. Aldrich grew up on Vashon Island from 1977 - 1989. She graduated from VHS in 1989, and from UCLA with a theater degree in early 1994. Aldrich found that work in Los Angeles lacked creative opportunity, so she returned to Vashon in 1994. She commuted to Seattle to study contemporary dance, while working for her family's island business, Aldrich Office, Art, and Press and working in theater. In 1999 she started performing and choreographing professionally, prompting her to move to Seattle in 2001 to dance for several companies such as Khambatta Company, to San Francisco in 2006 to work as a company member in Scott Wells & Dancers, and to grad school as a fellow in the prestigious dance department at University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign in 2008. Aldrich met Haas in grad school, and together they started EcoDance. As of today, Aldrich is building her EcoDance prototype in Open Space's warehouse while working at Movement Intelligence, her Pilates-Massage studio in Burton.

In the last year of a three-year graduate

dance program at UIUC, movement artist Haas and choreographer Aldrich realized that their sustainable life as artists was about to disappear. Instead of one regular university paycheck for creative and teaching work, Aldrich and Haas saw a future of multiple jobs unrelated to dance and few performance opportunities. Instead of adapting to the current circumstances for U.S. performance artists like themselves, they decided to transform their reality by co-founding EcoDance, an organization that builds sustainable artist-commerce models that accomodate creative freedom and financial stability through the construction of individualized, mobile live-work spaces for performance artists. They launched their project in January, 2011.

In the summer of 2011, Aldrich and Haas started the design-build process on two mobile performance dwelling prototypes through a fluid process which considered questions of ecology, architecture, and dance. These two prototypes were designed and built based on the precept that an individualized artist commerce model - and the accompanying mobile performance dwelling - will provide

You most likely have seen the emergency notification signs around the Island that boldly state "Listen When Flashing - Tune Into 1650 AM Voice of Vashon". The solar powered flashing-light signs, installed on existing Vashon Island Fire & Rescue fire danger sign posts by Voice of Vashon, let residents and visitors know when emergency information is being broadcast on 1650 AM. The signs are just one aspect of Voice of Vashon's Emergency Alert Service that has been given a significant boost thanks to the generosity of an Island business and dozens of donations from Island residents.

John and Beth de Groen of Windermere Real Estate Vashon-Maury Island, LLC have stepped up with a major underwriting contribution to the Voice of Vashon's proud to call our home."

During Island emergencies such as power outages, ferry disruptions or the earthquake everyone hopes will never come, Voice of Vashon volunteers work round-the-clock to keep the information flowing. On its 1650AM emergency broadcast system, Voice of Vashon transmits continuous information. Volunteers share the bulletins through the VashonALL email list and during major events also on the Voice of Vashon Facebook page and the VoiceOfVashon.org website.


Letters From the Pacific

Just for laughs, at the special Park District meeting this past Saturday, I asked what seemed to be a fairly obvious question, and that was: "Can you play on the fields as they are now?", referring of course to what are designated the VES Fields in the on-going, laugh-a-minute imbroglio that is the Vashon Park District dog and pony show. This wasn't a trick question, but it seemed to catch Parks Commission chairman Joe Wald somewhat off guard and after a pause I got my answer-yes. I already knew this-I was just checking. This was because I wanted to hear from the powers that claim to be that doing nothing more on these fields could be a real option to consider. Another reason to stop this madness might just be exemplified by an exchange that followed involving the true cost of getting this ill-conceived job done. During what was a brief back and forth, at least five different numbers were quoted, and with cost overruns and unexpected contingencies the highest figure of \$195 thousand might be expected to double before the project is completed.

Fast forward to the following Tuesday night and Truman O'Brien's question to the board regarding the fact that the \$95 thousand currently budgeted to get this \$195K task completed didn't seem to be a sufficient quantity of cash for the task. Board member and accounting whiz Bill Ameling was quick to respond that they were talking about \$95K net, not gross, which after some explanation seemed to mean that the Parks would only have the \$95K to spend, and the rest of the monies would come from the diligent labors of legions of Keebler Elves as they scrape and shovel every morning before sunrise out on the VES field in order to collect the precious piles of pure gold unicorn poop nuggets left after a night of frolic, as the field has been found to be a surprisingly welcoming habitat for these terrestrial narwhals.

All fantasies aside, which is asking a lot in this case, the stacked board which has left us with a white elephant of a project through cronyism and mismanagement continues to point fingers at everyone but themselves regarding fault or blame. With all fairness, Lu-Ann Branch and John Hopkins are trying to reach a solution on this, while the other three of five are content to forge ahead regardless of the warning signs and red flags that seem now to be up at all corners of this project. The denials of the three seem to be best exemplified by the last minute dramas at of both these past two meetings regarding the non-transparency of the process by which the former and future VES project manager, Mike Mattingly, was rehired. It came to light after the meeting that this hiring was news to both Branch and Hopkins. As any new hiring requires the approval of the entire Board, this appeared to directly fly in the face of Board policy. In their report about Park transgressions, the state auditors had cautioned against what they had found to be a lack of transparency and accountability, a problem which, given this latest incident, seems not to have been deemed a problem by at least Chairman Wald. This was revealed as something way more than evident at this last meeting. In spite of a number of requests by Branch throughout the meeting for a discussion of the Mattingly

rehiring, Chairman Wald quickly gaveled the meeting closed as Branch was trying to have it recognized at the end of the night, in spite of protests voiced by both Branch and members of the audience.

Lu-Ann has said that a number of my comments are unhelpful in solving this problem of the VES fields project. To that I would answer that I have a right to ask any of the questions that I have, or might have, as it seems they are not getting asked and they are in need of some answers. One of the questions that I brought up at Saturday's meeting was about water, something that seems of be of more than a passing importance on this Island, and anywhere else for that matter. The second part of Mr. O'Brien's question above had to do with water. In fact, it was more of a suggestion, and that was to hook up the existing water pumps to the electric grid, water the fields, keep them alive and play on them, and forget the rest of the project until a time when something other than unicorn nugget fantasy funds are available. As it was, last year the Park District paid an apparent \$18,000 for a diesel generator to run these pumps at least twelve hours a day in order to not have the new grass on the field dry up and blow away.

In fact, that wouldn't be a bad option, letting the fields die, as then the smoke and mirrors being thrown up by the gang of three on the board would be seen for what it is. But that, as Lu-Ann might say, isn't helpful, to which I would agree. But she also said that my questioning her use of the term sustainable watering- which it is indeed somewhat of an oxymoron- was not helpful either. There is, however, a whole series of questions about water involved in this project that I had not heard asked about these fields, so I asked them. One was a voicing of my concern over the massive use of water and fertilizer in order to keep a sand based grass field alive during our no rain summers. I understand that sub surface sand allows for better drainage and less muddy fields and field damage. I asked about where that runoff water might be going, and was told of the extensive drain pipe system that had been installed under the field to shunt of excess water. One might ask where this shunted water might be shunting off to, and I did. It appears there is a catch basin in a ditch by the highway that receives this bounty of "waste" water and field chemistry, which according to Mr. Mattingly was then directed to the town waste treatment plant. According to another audience member, that was not the case- that more than likely the runoff water just goes into the ground.

There was also uncertainty as to exactly how much water is to be used on these fields, and in the grand tradition of our Parks crew we were given a rough figure of somewhere between five and thirty thousand gallons- it sounded as if that was in one watering, although a reliable estimation of needed frequency seemed sketchy at best. Admittedly, water needs vary, but 30,000 gallon blocks of water to keep Justin and Chelsea in soccer heaven seems as close to absurd as one might want to get. And if it does indeed require that much water to keep these fields alive, one has to ask what will happen when summer restrictions kick in, which is why I questioned the delusion of sustainable watering to start with. Will Island residents then question the sanity of creating a pretty grass sandbox so that we can be seen in the same circles as the Bainbridge Island soccer clique? I know, that wasn't helpful, but maybe someone should have been asking for it back before this particular barn door was blown off its hinges. At this point, help seems an awful long way away.

You Never Know, Does One?

It is the season of Lent in the Christian church, a time of reflection, penitence, and self-denial, one object of these practices being humility.

I have mentioned before that my definition of humility is to have a clear, true perception of yourself, which does not mean self-bashing or delusions of grandeur, but rather an objective view of who you are. I think it's impossible to be objective about yourself when you're looking from inside your own head, but where else can you stand? It's worth the effort to try. If you're lying to yourself about who you are, whether you're lying about being more than you are or less than you are, you're lying. Living a lie makes nonsense of your life, so clear your head as well as you can, and see what you can see.

One good way to clear your head is to take a walk.

Yesterday was sunny, one of those early false spring days, and Marley the dog and I went down to the KVI beach for a walk. The sun was hot on my back and the wind was cold in my face as we went. Marley ecstatically sniffed practically every blade of grass, and left her own mite of communication in a spot which I now think of as Poop Central for dogs on KVI beach.

When I walk on the beach I am looking for where I would run in the event of a large earthquake and tsunami. If this makes me neurotic and paranoid, so be it. This paranoia is based on my knowledge that these things have happened here in the past, and could happen again.

happen again. I took the Vashon 101 class a few years ago in which one of the lecturers took glee in telling us that when the Seattle Fault lets go, we will have about four minutes before the tsunami hits Vashon. So now when I walk on the beach, hobbling along on my arthritic joints and assisted by my walking stick (thank you, Becky), I am calculating: how far could I go in four minutes? Is that a trail up the bluff there in the salal? Would my wornout knees allow me to get up to safety in a hurry? Should I stand there and kiss the world good-bye and watch the wave come to take me?

Then I tell myself that while

there will be an earthquake, the likelihood of it happening right this minute is slim. I've been walking on these beaches for over 40 years now. So far so good. I go back to limping along, picking up rocks that catch my eye, as well as things people have left behind. Yesterday's haul: twenty white pebbles for my garden cairn, one pair of plaid sleep pants (size XL), and a pink plastic clothes pin.

In 1966 I lived in Alameda (another island) and commuted to San Francisco on the AC Transit. Every day on the way home as we crossed the Bay Bridge, I would worry. What if there was an earthquake? What if the bridge collapsed?

Mind you, I'd lived near the San Andreas Fault all my life, and had experienced many quakes, though no really large ones at that time. The large earthquake came later, in February, 1971, in Los Angeles. It gave me respect for earthquakes and what they can do. I moved up here in 1973, thinking that I was getting away from earthquakes. That's how ignorant I was at the time. But getting back to my story...

On October 17, 1989, at 5:04 p.m., the Loma Prieta earthquake struck. The San Andreas Fault shifted in the Santa Cruz Mountains, and guess what? A section of the Bay Bridge collapsed. One woman died when her car plummeted

into the gap. All other vehicles were turned around and sent back to San Francisco. Meanwhile, in Oakland, the double-decker Cyprus freeway, which had been part of my daily commute in 1966, collapsed on itself, and 42 people died.

I had never worried about that freeway collapsing, only the Bay Bridge. In retrospect, I'd say my paranoia was at least partially not paranoia, but the worst that happened when the earthquake hit was not something I had foreseen, or worried about. That's the thing about worry and paranoia – you are preparing to defend yourself from what you imagine, and you might have it all, or partially, wrong. You never know.

There was no earthquake while I was at the beach yesterday. The dog and I made it back to the car fine. I took some snapshots of the sunny scene so I could look at them on days like today, when the overcast is high and white and unbroken.

Is my head clearer for yesterday's walk? I find that head clearing needs to be done every day for best results. The dog likes to clear her head, too, so we'll go out walking again today.

I wish you a blessed Lent, if Christianity is your spiritual practice, and a clear head regardless of your spiritual practice.

BIRTH STORY: Award-winning Documentary

"Birth Story," winner of the Audience Award at the 2012 Los Angeles Film Festival, screens one-time only, Tuesday, March 5th at 6 PM at the Vashon Theatre. The screening is a benefit for Woman's Way Red Lodge and is co-sponsored by Green Tech and the Vashon Theatre. Suggested donation is \$5-10 (sliding scale) at the door.

This new release film about world-renowned midwife Ina May Gaskin's work is awesome and carries a powerful message about our responsibility to keep the real knowledge about birth alive in a world where birth by abdominal surgery is becoming more and more prevalent. In the U.S., C-section births increased by 49% from 2000 (when it was 22.9%) to 2011 (when it was 32.8%). Our children's children need us to keep precious knowledge about natural birth alive and breathing.

Counterculture heroine Ina May Gaskin and her spirited friends began delivering each other's babies in 1970, on a caravan of hippie school buses, headed to a patch of rural Tennessee land. With Ina May as their leader, the women taught themselves midwifery from the ground up, and became an integral part of a new communal, agricultural society called The Farm. The people of the Farm grew their own food, built their own houses, published their own books, and, as word of their social experiment spread, created a model of care for women and babies that changed a generation's approach to childbirth.

Forty years ago Ina May led the charge away from isolated hospital birthing rooms, where husbands were not allowed and mandatory forceps deliveries were the norm. Today, she fights to preserve her community's hard-won knowledge.

Ina May Gaskin's first book,

Spiritual Midwifery, has been passed from pregnant woman to pregnant woman, touching hundreds of thousands of women and families since its publication, nearly forty years ago. In 2006, a Brooklyn friend passed the book to filmmaker Sara Lamm, who was expecting her first child, with the words, "This is the ONLY book you need to read." Lamm in turn passed it to another filmmaking friend, Mary Wigmore.

Both mothers with young children, Lamm and Wigmore traveled to The Farm many times over the course of the two years they were shooting this film, often with some or all of their young children in tow (an infant, and two two-year-olds). They relied on doulas, husbands, friends, and each other for support, and were grateful to be making a film about midwives. Who better to understand the challenge of juggling cameras and breastfeeding than Ina May Gaskin and her colleagues? (Wigmore gave birth to her second child one week after the film premiered at the LA Film Festival—it was the fifth baby born to a member of the Birth Story production staff since the start of production-all of the babies were born without intervention.)

At first the filmmakers weren't sure how they would ever convince a woman to let them film her birth for inclusion in the film, but in the end, it turned out to be fairly simple: a trusting relationship with the midwives led Lamm and Wigmore to several clients who were motivated to help others understand more about natural birth and midwifery-led care.



He also cared for a younger friend's orchard, creating the biggest, juiciest prune plums I ever tasted. He owned a small dryer and dried his surplus vegetables, apples, and prunes for winter eating. He kept several hives of bees and harvested raw honey with a taste of beeswax

He liked to go into his garden and pluck a ripe tomato from it's vine and eat it right there. He pulled carrots, brushed the dirt off, and ate them truly fresh. He grafted seven varieties of apple on his one apple tree and enjoyed them as a snack any time from late August through November. He peeled, sliced, and dried the extras. My tiny lot has little space for growing anything edible except herbs in pots, but I buy the freshest vegetables and fruit I can.

Dad fished for trout, cleaned them, and froze them in milk cartons filling the space around each fish with water. He did not eat low fat. He put a cube of butter on each roast as he cooked it, "to season it," he said.

Copious quantities of butter in his cooking and slathered on his bread supplied Omega-3 fats though I doubt he ever heard of them.

My favorite foods are: Almonds and walnuts, apples, blueberries and oranges, beans and peas, kale and spinach and green leaf lettuce, carrots and parsnips, cabbages and broccoli, yams, dried kelp granules, steel cut oats and brown rice, chicken, fish and lean red meats. Today, I'm cooking split pea soup. You need to start it 3 ½ hours before you intend to eat it. Soaking the peas overnight cuts cooking time by an hour. A crockpot works well. I just simmer it in a covered saucepan on the stovetop, stirring occasionally, while making dinner and on into the evening to eat next

> Slow-cooked SPLIT PEA SOUP

4 servings

½ cup green split peas 4 cups chicken or vegetable broth

2 teaspoons kelp granules 1/4 onion, chopped

1 red potato, thinly peeled and diced

1 rib celery including leaves, sliced

Dash dried thyme

1 carrot, chopped

5 to 6 ounces diced ham or 1 cup diced large sausage, optional

Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste

1/4 cup minced parsley or 1 Tablespoon dried parsley.

Bring the split peas, broth, and bacon bits to boiling in a 6-cup saucepan. Reduce the heat to medium low and cover. Simmer 3 hours, or until peas are tender. Add potatoes, onion, carrot, celery, herbs and meat if using. Simmer 30 minutes more. Add meat, real or soy. Taste and add salt and pepper as desired.

"Turn your wheels to the right" he said as I descended backwards toward the Sound. I tried not to think about that scene where Ashley Judd smashes the car off the end of the ferry to escape, I think it's Tommy Lee Jones, in 'Double Jeopardy'.

'More', he said. 'Stop! Turn to the left. Your wheels are up against the curve.'

I could feel the weight of my family friendly van pulling me backwards against my straining brakes. I prayed prayers I don't remember now. They had to do with being able to get through the window and not freeze to death in the night waters. I suppose more prudent prayers would have been about making the turn.

"I've got her' spoke the young female deck hand. 'Let me finish this. I can do it.'. Ah...praise God. The female bonding experience born of an understanding of what terror looks like in a woman's eyes. See, guys, women acknowledge the fear and do it anyway. You guys just will yourself into success. We have to maneuver ourselves into it.

Actually the female deck hand was the first one to deliver the bad news.

"We were told you were Vashon. You're plugged by Southworth. We can't call them all back to their cars, so we're going to back you down the ramp after we dock. It'll be OK."

Well...it wasn't. But make it I did thanks to two deck hands working together and my trust in their expertise.

Parenting is like backing your van down the ferry ramp towards icy waters with only a net fence behind you, relying on the expertise of others when your sideview mirrors won't go down low enough and you've never done it before and if you don't succeed your either teetering toward imminent death or drowning.

That explains the first third of my new parenting lecture now, and workshop or parenting party later if you like. Someday it will be a book which Adrienne asked for and Audrey will encourage the writing of, but not read because she thinks – well thought – that parenting books would mess up her instincts. They are both right.

The first third of "Of COURSE You Know What You're Doing...and if you don't you can figure it out' is about the metaphors that will help you to find The Quick Fix when that's what you want in a parenting situation. For example, learning that sometimes your child or teen is a stroke victim and sometimes they're a foreign language student and sometimes you're a tour guide and sometimes you're a drill sargeant and learning when to use what. This is very important. ALL OF THIS STUFF APPLIES TO ALL PARENTS OF BOTH TYPICAL AND SPECIAL NEEDS KIDS FROM PREGNANCY THROUGH THE

END OF ADOLESCENCE.

The second third, reminds me of the battle of continually teaching children and teens about sleep, it's necessity, it's effect, and the process of slipping into it. Brain science, developmental issues and physical development all play a crucial part. Sometimes you need to look at or review The Educated Fix. For you as a parent, understanding, no...rather remembering, that you are a person, too, with needs and notions is helpful during this kind of fix as well.

And then there is that moment in your parenting when you think to yourself, 'Ohmygosh! I given birth to Uncle Charlie, or Aunt Levinia...the curse continues!!' and you're wanting to break the cycles in the next generation that have bound you or weighed you down and you're taking a look at The Enduring Fix. That's the third part of the lecture.

All of this will be presented at the Vashon Land Trust on Saturday 9 March from 6-7:30 PM. It's coordinated with the childcare option at Playspace if you are parents of young ones who need looking after. It's cheap. \$15 for singles and \$25 for couples and if you can't afford it, come anyway because parenting can feel more confident and you are parents who want the best for your children and teens. Come if you've taken every course there is to take and come if you've never cracked a book. Come if you feel totally on top of everything and come if you feel like they buried you a year ago and you're just faking being a parent.

I guarantee as the mother of four, two birth and two older adopted, and the child of a pretty typical dysfunctional family with lots of fun memories and times of stress all around, happily married for 23 years...well 19... and divorced for 18, a pre school teacher, youth minister, and now a grandmother and still working with parents in their homes to increase their family pleasures, I've seen it all, experienced most of it, and still have a smile on my face and would do it all over again.

a situation that overcomes the performance artist's high expense- low income cycle.

In September, 2011, Haas's dwelling took to the road, and has travelled from Urbana to audiences in Chicago, Detroit, Tennessee, Kentucky, and Texas. Haas' exterior is complete; she is still working on its interior. Islander Dave Singer, Aldrich's high school classmate and self-taught carpenter who resides on Vashon, was an integral actor in the first steps of the prototype's build. He travelled to Urbana and worked a week of 12-hour days under Illinois' punishing sun, instructing the co-founders and local volunteers on build techniques, and consulting on design choices. The cofounders believe that his week of work on the project proved more helpful than three months of advice received from a local architectural designer and professor.

Aldrich's dwelling is affectionately named "Foxy", after her favorite flower, Foxglove. Aldrich bought Foxy's materials in the Midwest, where EcoDance began. Her travel trailer was built in Missouri, her SIPs (structurally integrated panels) in Illinois. Foxy's build started on Vashon island last September, when Aldrich returned to her hometown to establish a home-base. This January, 2013, Foxy relocated to Open Space for Arts and Community on Vashon after Aldrich worked for a year under a tarp tent in the woods.

Steel fabricator and metal artist, islander Randy Kirk, is helping Aldrich with the remaining steps of her MPD prototype. His expertise in custom design and structural fabrication works well with an MPD. Kirk decided to donate his skills because he admired Aldrich's attitude "She took on a crazy project and an improvisational process she had never done before, had no experience in. I liked that." The customized and ambitious build reminded him of work he did (and now misses) for employer, David

Gulassa, a Vashon islander now deceased. David, founder of Gulassa and Co., was a designer who built high-end customized homes and buildings for the Northwest's most affluent. Kirk and Aldrich are aiming to complete Aldrich's prototype with livable/workable space, indoor/outdoor space, mobility agility, eco-friendly construction and operation, and aesthetic beauty that departs from the standard RV's racing stripe exterior.

Once Foxy is completed, Aldrich begins the second stage of the EcoDance mission—she will activate her artist commerce model. Aldrich will present her choreographies in her MPD during gallery hours, guerilla events, and regional residencies. For gallery hours, the MPD is set up just like an art gallery, with designated business hours. During that time, Aldrich and Incite Company, her dance company, will perform—similar to art hanging on walls for public view, live performances will be viewable on the stage (and unlike a gallery, an MPD gallery is mobile). Dance will happen, and then Foxy will fold up and drive away.

EcoDance addresses the artistic individual's age-old problem: How to balance creative freedom and financial sustainability. Cofounders believe that creativity is our natural state of being, and this fragile state is too easily regulated and exploited in social climates of industry and economy. Alternatives such as EcoDance's artist commerce model can make an enormous impact on the health and creative force of creative individuals like professional performance artists, and thus the communities that they serve. By providing individual artists with the power to afford basic needs for healthy living and artistic production, EcoDance expands an artist's options for performance production, and places the power in the creative hands of the artist rather than in the industrious pocket book

have provided.

Local energy production is also now a reality. State incentives to encourage renewable energy investment have facilitated the installation of our first community solar array by Vashon Solar LLC. The first phase of the project, a 9 kw installation, is online and is predominantly owned by Vashon investors. The second phase could be as large as 31 kw depending on how fully it gets funded. That is where all the rest of us come in. If you are like me, you have considered the possibility of installing photovoltaic solar on your home. The two biggest obstacles are cost and suitability. PV solar is expensive and, if you have trees around your home, you may not get enough sun to warrant the investment. Investing in Vashon Solar LLC allows you to reap energy savings as if the array was located on you own home, but for a lot less money. As a Community Solar project, Vashon Solar LLC gets state incentives and savings that a private owner would not qualify for. Additional savings come from the fact that you don't have to apply for the permits or exclusively own all the peripheral equipment you would need to process that electricity and divert it to the grid. That is a fixed cost that you would have to pay even with a very small system. That cost is shared by all the investors in this project. Thirdly, you don't have to worry about maintenance. Owning a share of this project would entitle you to your share of the revenue from power sales to Puget Sound Energy.

A single share in this project is \$5000. If you are like me, you don't have \$5000 to spare. You can own part of a share by bundling your money with friends.

Five people could put up \$1000 apiece, ten, \$500 apiece, and so on. The only caveat is that the dividend would have to go to one individual in your group who would then be responsible for dividing it amongst your group.

The final deadline for investment is March 31. This is an investment in a clean future, and in the resilience of your community. This is real transition in action and you should seriously consider it! Always wanting to create, Donna was making mix-tapes galore and the



obvious next step was to learn to DJ. Encouraged by a great community of artists and friends in Portland, Oregon, she put the needle on the record and never looked back. Now living in Seattle, where the music scene is legendary, she is still committed finding music that inspires her every day and sharing that with as many people as possible.

VHS Musical In the Heights

The 2008 Tony Award winner for Best Musical, and 2009 Pulitzer Prize winner for Drama, In the Heights, has been selected for this year's VHS musical theatre production. A unique blend of traditional Broadway fare, rap and salsa, the show, as one of its lyrics says, "lights up the night sky."

The show is set in the Washington Heights area of New York, a Latino barrio, with Dominican, Puerto Rican and Cuban residents. The New York Times theatre critic Christopher Isherwood wrote: As you watch 'Usnavi' bound jubilantly across the stage, tossing out the rhymed verse currently known as rap like fistfuls of flowers, you might find yourself imagining that this young man is music personified - a sprightly new Harold Hill from the barrio, where this sweet, sentimental musical is set... when this musical erupts in one of its expressions of collective joy, the energy it gives off could light up the George Washington bridge for a year or two.'

Probably the most challenging show VHS Drama has undertaken since Chicago in 2007, the story centers around Usnavi, the owner of a small bodega, Nina, the daughter of the Rosarios, Vanessa, a hairdresser, Abuela Claudia, everyone's unofficial grandmother, and Benny, who works for Nina's father. Usnavi dreams of selling the bodega and going to the Dominican Republic, the home of his late parents. He also secretly is in love with Vanessa (in one of the songs, the other women in the beauty salon say to her, "haven't you noticed you get all your coffee for free?") Nina has returned to New York from California. The one who "made it out" of the barrio and got into Stanford, she has dropped out of school. Nina hasn't told her parents, who spent their life savings so she could attend college. Benny, a dispatcher for the Rosario taxi service, is in love with Nina.

In the end, the show is all about how a person defines "home." Is home

where your parents came from when they immigrated to the United States, but a place you've never seen? Is home the barrio? Is home a place you can only dream of?

Stephen Floyd and Susan Hanson are co-directing and producing the show. Maggie Laird is the musical director, and Sarah Seder is the choreographer. The show opens on March 8th and runs for three weekends, closing on Sunday, March 24th. Evening performance tickets: Adults \$20/Students & Seniors \$15. Sunday matinee tickets: all seats \$12. The first Saturday, March 9th, is a benefit for the Junior Class, all seats \$20 (includes a dessert buffet and silent auction). The second Saturday, March 16th, is 'Rotary Night,' all seats \$20 (a portion of the proceeds benefits Rotary service projects). Friday and Saturday performances are at 7:30 pm. Sunday matinees are at 2:00 pm. Tickets at the Vashon Bookshop, VHS office and at the door.




