Voice of Vashon Prepares Vashon Town Studio

Voice of Vashon will open a new satellite broadcast studio right in the heart of downtown Vashon in early 2016. Construction has already started and beginning today (Wednesday, October 28th), Islanders will be able to watch the progress through giant windows fronting on Vashon Highway at the former Robinson Furniture building. Within a few months, construction will be replaced by live disc jockeys plus radio and TV show production.

The big reveal followed a week-long secret countdown in the windows that began on the 21st, generating lots of Island speculation and rumor on what will go in the front space of the exercise studio being built by Kelly Macomber Straight and Zabette Macomber.

"This is an opportunity for VoV to fulfill its mission of connecting to the community in the most profound way possible," said Storefront Studio Project Manager Rick Wallace. "We love our current studio perched out of sight up at the back of the Sunrise Ridge property. But this new additional space puts us right in the heart of Vashon town, where we will be more accessible and more visibly fulfilling our mission to be a virtual town square for the Island."

The station plans to broadcast its popular weekday KVSH Morning Scramble show from the new studio, which will be large enough to accommodate live performing artists, entire bands, roundtable discussions, or even a small television shoot. Live Open House broadcasts during First Friday Gallery Cruise and Strawberry Festival will add to the sense of community engagement. The space will also serve as the anchor point for getting out critical information during an island emergency.

"We'll recruit and train volunteer DJs and producers so we can add more live shows at other hours across the day," said KVSH FM Program Director Jeff Hoyt. "Folks walking and driving by will be able to see the DJs at work through the windows on the sidewalk. We expect the studio to help bring in new volunteers and the heightened visibility should make it easier for us to keep adding memberships to help sustain our many services to the community."

the space because they liked the idea of a community-centric organization occupying the front of their building.

"We're happy to be able to help VoV have more of a presence on the island and we know that they will be a fun and unique addition to downtown," said coowner Kelly Macomber Straight. "And we loved Northern Exposure so it was a win-win."

Realizing that they were being offered a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity that would not likely come around again, VoV board members quietly began to reach out and float the idea to its major donors.

"We didn't want word getting out until we were certain we could secure minimum funding to start construction," said VoV Board President Jean Bosch. "The initial response was terrific and we reached our minimum funding goal rather quickly. A town location has long been on our wish list, so when this opportunity arose, we had to go for it."

Building a radio studio with a 28-foot wall of windows fronting the main artery through the island is no small challenge. Voice of Vashon hired a Seattle acoustic engineer to design a plan that would not only isolate the studio from the sound of the exercise classes happening on the other side of the studio's back wall, but shut out the most of the noise from Vashon Highway as well.

"A tiny bit of noise bleeding through from the street could add a fun layer of 'local' to our broadcasts," said Hoyt, "but we want the studio to sound as tight and professional as possible because we believe that we're creating some high quality programming right now that provides an attractive alternative to much of what passes for radio these days."

Construction is going on now along Vashon Highway in the space that sits between Zombiez and the new ice cream shop. Acoustic materials and radio equipment will be installed once refurbishment of the space is completed later this fall.

that as of Oct. 5 the County has begun collecting separated organic kitchen and yard waste at the transfer station. It is to your advantage to participate in this program because your dump fees on these materials will be almost half what you pay for the rest of your load. There will be a separate designated area to place these materials. I'm not sure what their procedure is if you are carrying regular waste along with your organic materials, so be sure to separate them as you load up your vehicle. The purpose to this study is twofold. The county wants to find out how a more vigorous composting program affects their overall costs, and they want to find out if enough waste is generated on Vashon to warrant the building of an anaerobic digester on Vashon. You may remember that the initial goal of Zero Waste Vashon was to build a digester on Vashon to turn Continued on Page 9

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Song In My Belly

Old Crooked Neck

I am grateful to Vashon Bookshop for hosting a book launch and reading on Thursday, Nov. 12, 6 PM for me to share Song In My Belly, my new book. This follows Through A Hollow Reed (2003) and Space Between My Bones (2010) as my latest hand-bound collection of poems.

Song In My Belly comprises work collected since 2010 and is by far the most ambitious of my books. It includes beautiful color photos by Candy Gamble. Completed by hand in the old practice of bookbinding, Song In My Belly is a limited edition of 150; the first 50 are signed.

One of the most wonderful aspects of bringing out this book is the collective endeavor that has brought friends together to help me. Shirley Ferris and Ann Spiers assisted me with preparation of the manuscript, much of which was originally born in Contemplative Dance Practice with Joan Hanna, Karen Nelson and others at Hanna Barn.

As with all my books, this one is finished by hand after the text and photographs were printed by Sy Novak on her laser press. Robin Gage, Anne Lohr, Shirley Ferris, Natalia Perez, Margot Burke and others helped me. First we completed the tearing and folding of large sheets of paper for covers and endpapers. Then Rayna Holtz and I printed the covers on the 1899 Chandler & Price letterpress that has printed so many Island books through our collective, Laughing Dog Press.

The process of assembling the guts of the book began with inserting the color pages and folding the four signatures. And then, we spent many hours together renewing and deepening our friendships as we completed the sewing of signatures and endpapers, prepared the covers and assembled the books. Slowly the pile of completed books has grown until we are now ready for this launch. What a gift!

The poems are personal, grounded in nature, and represent my growth as a poet and spiritual explorer. They spring from a time in my life when my focus centered on coming home to the song in my belly.

We had three dogs, one of them called Boots, because her ankles were brown and the rest of her body was mottled white and brown. Calling her Boots seemed appropriate. She was a springer spaniel while the other two dogs were both black Labradors, Pan and Mike. All three were excellent hunting dogs. I liked Pan the best because she was mine and I was going to make some money off her pups. It was my job to run and train the dogs, one of the few chores I had that I didn't really mind.

Hiding the dummy was really easy. I would drag it through the grass so they could find the scent. The dummy was a canvas stuffed tube about 12 inches long with a rope loop at either end for good throwing. I think it had some pheasant feathers stuck in it to provide the scent, but I can't really remember. At the end of his first hunting season, Mike was starting to get a little hard-mouthed, by that I mean that he would maul the birds, making them un-edible; so I buried some sharp tacks in his dummy so that he would carry it more carefully. It didn't take too many throws for Mike to learn not to clamp down.

The dummy had a second use and that was holding the lid of the trunk up so the dogs could breathe. People would laugh to see three dogs piling out of the trunk of Dad's super 88 Oldsmobile.

Being hunting dogs, they were kept in a pen with walls 8 feet high, made of sheep wire. Mike was a big dog who would climb out of anything that was lower. At 90 pounds, he was a sight to see crawling up the sheep wire and then someone would yell from the house: "Mike, Get Down" and he would. I had to stretch barbed wire around the top of the kennel to stop his climbing. Then the dogs took to digging under the wire. I took two inch planks and dug a ditch, nailing the sheep wire to the boards and buried them under the fence so the dogs couldn't dig out.


They could howl like banshees and keep us up for half the night. They loved to harmonize with the farm dogs down the road. Any siren would drive them nuts. Maybe the sound of the siren hurt their ears. So Dad had me string a line from my bedroom window on the second floor to the dog pen. On the other end were hung empty cans on strings. The command to stop barking was: "Stop that noise". Or, call the name of the offending dog or dogs and shake the cans on the rope from my bedroom window. It usually got results and I could return safely to my pillow. So, going on a hunt was a way to get out of jail and the dogs would get very excited and jump around in circles, eager to be out and working.

Boots was a great hunting dog who could run down a pheasant and flush it; making it fly into the air, so I could get a shot. Sluicing or shooting a bird on the ground was poor sportsmanship and not allowed. Boots would zig-zag back and forth at full tilt, with her nose to the scent the pheasant had left behind. The Labradors were different hunters in the sense that they ranged back and forth crossing the scent that Boots was on. The labs would wind scent rather than follow the tracks on the ground. Pan and Mike could cover a wider part of the field than Boots could. The labs were faster than Boots because she was older than both of them. On that particular day, Dad and I were after "old crooked neck", the pheasant with the broken neck that nobody could shoot. Somehow he had circled around behind the dogs and they had lost his scent. On the way back to our house, the dogs picked up the scent again and were on his trail when he jumped wild; too far out to shoot, out of range. Other people had been trying to get him for years and the Sportsmen's Club put up a prize for "old crooked neck". Mom eventually shot "old crooked neck", but when he died, his neck went straight and nobody at the Sportsmen's Club would believe that Mom had shot him; so she rammed a coat hanger down his throat and bent it, so the guys at the club would know that it was "old crooked neck".

Island Life **Only an Expert**

Once again, we here at Island Life, Ink find ourselves head-banging up against the deadline with nary an idea to sit and scribble about. In truth, we have found ourselves distracted by the ongoing transcontinental battles over the Ray family fortune and having to wade through the various interrogatories and petitions and accountings and continuances that otherwise one would not have had to have been dealing with if laws had worked, trusts and wills had been adhered to, and a sibling had not emerged as a sociopathic, pecuniary omnivore. I guess that's how life goes sometimes.

But never fear. I just opened the other Island newspaper and found that, at least according to them and the state Department of Ecology, all is well (no pun intended) with the water up at VES fields because they are monitoring things and "water quantity is not an issue." At least that's the reassuring message from the first couple of paragraphs in the article. If one skims over to the fifth column and the discussion of water recharge quantity in acre feet, it seems to be stated quite clearly that: "that translates to the park district using twice the amount of water that typically falls as rain within its boundaries, but it draws from rain in nearby areas as well." For some reason it seems appropriate that a collection of athletic fields that cost more than twice their original budget to build are also taking twice the water available to that area. Why we should expect that that rate of water usage might be able to continue is anybody's guess, and it seems that guess we will. Oh yes, and monitor we must.

Before we go any further, it should be pointed out that what we are hearing here is the old status quo argument- that everything is fine until it isn't. In fact I find no solace or, indeed, solution in the last two lines from water expert and state hydrologist Doug Wood who is quoted in the article as saying: "It's best to be prepared for the worst. We can prevent problems if it does occur." Grammar aside, preventing problems generally starts with preventing problems, not to be redundant or anything. As one of the two park commissioner candidates mentioned in the article who "have expressed concern about the amount of water the VES Fields require...", I would say that all of the commissioners should both be concerned about this over usage of an Island resource, and should work to seek a solution before the worst of problems do occur. As it was, I had a conversation with a friend and retired Seattle Parks arborist right before the candidates forum about this very issue. We concurred that, rather than continuing to maintain the sand and fast drainage up there, a program should be instituted now to start working that field back to a higher degree of water-holding organic matter. As it is, sand based fields have a life span of around ten or so years before they need a total rehabilitation at the cost of a couple hundred thousand dollars. Adding organics to the fields now would both help to wean the fields off of their water guzzling ways and avoid a costly rebuild on something that already cost too much.

To hear another quote from the article- "The fields are located in one of the few watersheds on the Island where new permits are still allowed"- has echoes of the recent Shell Oil arctic exploratory missions and the concept of drilling there because we can and we supposedly need to. What all of this is also bringing to mind is an on Island recreation of sorts of Mike Judge's film "Idiocracy". In that film, set some 500 years in the future when human intelligence has been bred down to the level of moron, all fluids from drinking fountains and kitchen sinks are a Gatoraid-like substance known as Brawndo- the thirst mutilator. When the main character, who has been awakened from a hyper-extended sleep experiment, asks for water to drink, one of the future idiots asks him, "you mean like out the toilet?" In this VES article we read that "for irrigation at VES Fields, the park district draws all of its water from a well, relying on Heights Water for use only in the restroom at the site." With drinking water going to the toilets, and a proposal to use treated gray water for backup irrigation there if all else fails, one might find some humor in the sick irony of it all, if it weren't so totally not funny. On the other hand, perhaps we are half way to a solution in just seeing the problem, as Ms. Anderson had suggested back at the beginning of this. But to "prevent a problem if it does occur" is not just a contradiction, it is too late.



Seal Pup Primer

Our cherished orcas, both Residents and Transients, are certainly newsworthy of late. With six babies and an extraordinary journey up to Springer's homeland, or Northern Resident traditional territory, the Southern Residents have generated a plethora of news. I will start locally, however, with a remarkable Transient encounter.

One Transient group that has made frequent forays this year into lower Puget Sound kept eluding us until the other day. The T101s have a penchant for showing up near Chez VHP when we are off Island or just running errands in town. When I finally laid eyes on them -- zig-zagging from shore to shore, taking long dives, and traveling minutes apart -- I fully grasped how they can slink around in here like ghosts.

Pinniped panic alerted us to the imminent approach of seal-munching orcas. Two nervous Steller's sea lions, swimming in tandem, and more than a dozen terrified Harbor seals, porpoising high out of the water, fled far away from the formidable fins. The number of seals in our neighborhood constantly astounds us.

Three looming male dorsals, graduated in size according to age, dwarfed the unassuming dorsal fin of the matriarch, T101, about 42 years old. Her sons T101A and T101B were born in 1993 and 1997, respectively. The impressively large male in this group is T102, born 1984. I suspect he is T101's brother or possibly a son, since T101 might have been born




had whipped around Vashon and Blake Islands, through Rich Passage into Sinclair Inlet near Bremerton. Before returning home, he watched in amazement as they breached and socialized upon entering Dyes Inlet. Evidently, this shallow inlet is a preferred seal café for some of our Transient families.

If not for Mark's dedication and ID photos, pertinent data on this Transient encounter would be lacking. At Loop deadline, I await a photo disk from Mark that will show me who accompanied the T101s into Dyes Inlet -- at least five other Transients. Sighting reports from several Islanders -- Carl, Bob, Kelly and Pat -- were particularly helpful. We are grateful.

Consider this an elaboration on my standard closing reminder: Please support the work of the Vashon Hydrophone Project (VHP): REPORT LOCAL WHALE SIGHTINGS ASAP TO 206-463-9041. We monitor this line 24/7 -- call at 3:00 AM if you hear blows! Mark launches his boat from West Seattle, so timely reports from all Vashon ferry routes are extremely useful. Surely, one or two Islanders could call us when whales grace the commute. Leave a call back number in case we need more details. Accuracy online is a problem, so we do not rely on social media. Do not assume we will find stuff posted there by chance.

When reporting a sighting, be specific: date, time, location, travel direction, species description, number of animals, and behavior observed. We can guide you if you need help with reporting. Phone reports tend to be more accurate, but if email is the only way we can coax you to report to the VHP, send sightings and photos to Vashonorcas@aol.com. Your photos of marine mammals are valuable for ID purposes. Since I do not have Mark's Transient pictures yet, this week's blissful photo is of the latest Southern Resident mother, Princess Angeline (J17), born 1977, with Baby J53. Princess Angeline is one of our favorite, older J Pod gals. Drone footage from summer killer whale research by NOAA Fisheries and the Vancouver Aquarium showed J17's belly bump. When first spotted on October 24, days-old cutie J53 still had fetal folds. More perspective on the orca babies next time.

A Community Conversation About Health and Responsibility: Vaccines and Beyond Informed Consent: Why Fully-Vaccinated Citizens Need **Vaccine Exemptions**

When you go to the doctor, you may take the right to informed consent for granted. The doctor makes a recommendation, which usually includes information about the risks and benefits of that recommendation. You may choose to follow that recommendation, ask more questions or decide to do more research before making a decision. Perhaps you choose to seek a second opinion. In the end, you may refuse the doctor's recommendation. These are all your rights under informed consent.

Imagine, for a moment, going to a doctor for medical advice regarding a procedure. The doctor gives a recommendation which you listen to respectfully. Before you have a chance to make up your own mind, the doctor casually mentions, "Oh, by the way." "If you don't agree to my recommendation, you will be kicked out of school and/or fired from your job. This medical procedure is mandatory in the state of Washington. But as long as you're willing to give up education and employment, feel free to make your own decision."

Would you be okay with this? Even if you absolutely agreed with the doctor's medical opinion and planned to follow the recommendation, would you be comfortable being subjected to this kind of coercion?

History tells us repeatedly that patient involvement in their own health decisions is vital for safe and effective health care. When coercion becomes part of health care, people get hurt. Even if that coercion is wellintended.

Freedom of speech protects us all, but only if we defend it universally. For instance, we don't get to pick and choose whose speech is acceptable enough to be worth protecting. That freedom is protected for all of us. To protect your own rights, you must protect the rights of others, even if you strongly disagree with them. Even if you think they're dangerous idiots. Rights are rights. The right of informed consent also protects us all. To retain this right, we must all defend it, in every area of healthcare. Allowing a profitdriven industry with known conflicts of interest to decide which areas of medicine and which patient groups deserve the benefits of informed consent is a naive and dangerous proposition. In 2015, a very small handful of representatives in Olympia crafted & tried to pass HB 2009. This bill was designed to eliminate our right

to file a Philosophical/Personal Vaccine Exemption on behalf of our families and our children. It was designed to coerce parents into compliance by threatening their child's access to childcare and public/private education.

Τhe corporate pharmaceutical companies are using powerful marketing techniques to undermine the right of informed consent. Their messages suggest that informed consent is a public health risk and that only mandates can save us all from the scourge of disease. This is fear-mongering. Such legislation will undermine public health while it increases corporate pharmaceutical corporate profit. Any medication or drug (as vaccines are classified according to the CDC) that can be made universally mandatory guarantees a universal consumer base for the manufacturer and a predictable profit. This is even more so if the manufacturer is protected from liability for any harm that drug may cause.

In 2015, corporate pharmaceutical lobbyists spent more than \$2 million on changing California vaccine laws.* Laws were passed that remove the right of informed consent for both children and adults. Vaccination is now required for all school children including homeschoolers who meet in a classroom environment. Children who are missing even one vaccine are only allowed to be educated in isolation at home or in independent study programs that involve no classroom contact. In addition, no adult in California may work in any form of childcare or preschool without proof of vaccination and this includes parent co-ops. If any money is exchanged to pay for a program, vaccines are required for both paid staff and volunteers. *Source: Sacramento Bee

It is important to note that

the California measles outbreak did not spread through schools. It happened because someone who was contagious with measles went to Disneyland where they still have a strict "norefund, no exchange" policy for any reason...including active, contagious measles. Oddly, no legislation to mandate refund or exchange policies for businesses has been introduced into the CA legislature.

In 2015, we succeeded in defending our right to informed consent in Washington, but in 2016, we expect a much harder fight in Olympia. And so, we are preparing in advance!

Please join us the effort to protect informed consent. Here's how you can help:

1. Review some of the posts on this blog. Expand your viewpoint and information base. Our legislators need to hear some new information, not repetitions of the same tired themes.

2. Contact legislators in Olympia. When doing so, think strategically. In Olympia, there are those who are committed to their viewpoint and nothing you say will sway them. So, don't waste your time. Instead, reach out to those voting members of our legislature who may care a great deal but just don't know much or those who appear to be on the fence. Remember that they have the right to ask questions and there are many great viewpoints we can offer them.

3. Talk to both your legislators and your friends about the complexity of this issue and the importance of informed consent to them and their loved ones. No matter what the news and lobbyists tell you, coercion is bad medicine and poor public health policy.

There are three of them laid away in storage waiting to be recreated by another knitter, having been worn til tattered and soiled beyond repair with designs that still make me feel like I'm wearing a work of art. From years of teaching preschool and working with children who loved the sparkly plastic chips supposed to represent rhinestones, or the sampling of possible knitting stitches in various patterns and colours, they remain favored creations. This may be the year I add to the collection by getting holiday novelty sweaters. Now that they have become "Party like it's 1999" (well, actually like it's 1984 with big hair, but...you catch the visual, right?) it would be acceptable to wear them and not look like I had put them on by accident, or had a broken down trailer in the woods somewhere with squirrel cooking on the stove.

When fall comes and my sweaters are put to the top of the pile for wearing, and store racks and mannequins are laden with new versions, the world just seems friendlier. Yes, that's it. Sweaters are like friends.

So yes, I do have friends that are with me calling me to higher ground but get a little rattled when I have a crisis. And I have friends that are just good solid, functional friends who are classics and cause no irritation and have been around for years. And I have friends who are the life of the party and remind me not to be so tightly wound as a result of challenges I face in short or long term situations. Now you might think a friend that is no good in a crisis with me is not a real friend. Well, this being the last of Domestic Violence Awareness month (and Breast Cancer and Lost Child month, all of which have touched my life through my mother's lost battle with BC and four miscarriages I experienced) and I have become aware that it is time for me to go public big time with my experiences of being abused and how I healed, let me tell you that is not true. A friend who is unfamiliar with crisis can be a





help in that they point you to new, more peaceful territory. If they are unfamiliar with what it's like to be abused, they are a help in embracing 'not trauma'. Do not discard them.

A bad friend will encourage you to lie, to not tell yourself the truth. A bad friend will lay their stuff on top of you. This is particularly dangerous when they themselves have been abused and chosen not to stand up to it and get free. A bad friend will take you on as a pity project. Ick! Run away! Run away! A bad friend will use you to meet their desires without long term benefit to you.

A good friend will listen and help you think things through but not make the decisions for you. I was once, as I so often did previous to last year, making excuses for someone who was abusing me terribly.

My good, good friend said simply "That man has his s**t all over your boots." She didn't argue with me point by point. She didn't denigrate or discount any of my behaviors I was choosing. She simply stated a fact about him I was not seeing, did not have the capability at the time to see. That's a good friend. And there have been times I have spoken reflectively into her life as well.

A good friend will call you on your b*****t as well. Gently and with love. They will also point out your strengths that you are not seeing.

A good friend in not co dependent. They don't take offense against someone just because their friend has an issue. They remain a separate person. When the pity party is going full strength, they will know you well enough to know if it's best to hold the Kleenex box or say, "C'mon. Time for diversion." (movie, board game, walk, chocolate decadence).

A good friend knows you. Really knows you. Good friends will have differences of opinion and good friends will talk it out. Good friends understand the time and distance in which you sit at the current moment. Good friendships develop and mature.

Good friends never use each other. They compliment each other.

To all my good friends, thank you. I am very much enjoying getting healed from being abused. I'm still in process. Only a week ago, a good friend said, 'We're going to help you learn to not walk on eggshells all the time." That's the final step, learning to blend being a nice, kind person with being assertive on a daily basis. It will be the next step after learning to say, "You can't do that to me". A more nuanced way to living I am looking forward to learning. One last thing. My good friends are always trying to learn and grow and be better people, increase their hearts and minds towards adding good to the world. The best way to have a friend is to be one. Women who escape and heal, not just perpetuate the story in their lives, have good friends.



Pumpkin Heaven

Your Halloween pumpkin, if bought with future culinary uses in mind, can have a second life as Pumpkin Soup or Pumpkin Pie, or if there's just a bit of pumpkin pulp leftover, you might create a Pumpkin Smoothie. If your Jack O'Lantern is not made from the edible variety of pumpkin, just skip the next three paragraphs and go straight to the recipe below, using canned pumpkin.

The first step is to cook the pumpkin. It works to prick it well on all sides so it won't explode, creating a horrible mess, and cheating you out of the pumpkin treat you meant to make. The least labor intensive way is to bake it in your oven, either whole or halved, after removing the seeds and the stringy stuff around them.

Second step: When the insides of the pumpkin are tender, scoop them out with a tablespoon or ice cream scoop. Transfer to a blender or food processor. Add enough cider to create a smooth pumpkin puree.

Third step: Measure out 1 ¹/₄ cups of pumpkin pulp for Pumpkin Chiffon Pie or 1 ¹/₂ cups for a Pumpkin Custard Pie. Pasteurize eggs to be sure they contain no salmonella. That's a bit tricky: You want them Pumpkin Chiffon Pie 6 to 8 servings

9-inch baked pie shell ¹/₂ cup coconut sugar 1 envelope plain gelatin or 1 Tablespoon gelatin powder ¹/₂ teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon ground ginger ¹/₄ teaspoon ground cloves 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

3 eggs, separated 3/4 cup milk (dairy or almond)

1¹/₄ cups pumpkin pulp

1/3 cup coconut sugar

In a 6-cup saucepan, combine the 1/2 cup sugar, gelatin, salt, and spices. In a small bowl, mix egg yolks and milk. Stir into the sugar-gelatinspice mixture in the saucepan. Cook on medium heat, stirring constantly until the mixture boils. Remove from heat. Chill until semi-solid.

Whip the egg whites until soft peaks form and bend over when you lift the beaters. Gradually add the 1/3 cup of sugar while beating the egg whites to a stiff peak stage. Fold the pumpkin mixture into the egg white. Pour into the pie shell. Chill until firm. Serve with whipped cream. Sprinkle with sugared ginger bits if desired.

Note: I always use coconut sugar because it's Glycemic Index number is only 35, compared to cane sugar's 100. Considering the vast, and increasing, number of Americans who are diabetic, pre-diabetic, or trying to keep their weight down, eating low on the G.I. and minimizing sugar intake is a good idea.

our waste into rich compost and methane gas.

The last item I want to discuss is the Vashon-Maury Grange Hall. The hall was originally a North End community hall, supposedly built in the 1940's. At some point, it was given to the Grange for use by the whole island. Through the 1970's, the Grange had a large and active membership. At some point, new members failed to join and the existing membership continued to age. I think a large part of the falloff of membership had to do with the political positions taken by the National and State Grange. Originally a very progressive organization, the Grange arose from the big agrarian populist revolution in the 1890's. It was among the first organizations to endorse women's suffrage. Through the years, Grangers' values came to be more in line with big fertilizer, seed, and pesticide companies upon which farming in the US became more and more dependent. The new people that came to Vashon in the 70's and later were more interested in local organic farming and had little in common with the political stance of the Grange. Although we still can't find any actual documentation, the story is that the hall and land would be sold to the Washington DOT to be used as additional parking space for the ferry when

the Grange on Vashon closes its doors. When I joined the Grange in the late 90's, I was mostly interested in keeping the Grange Hall as an asset to the community. The average age of the remaining Grange members at that time was about 85, and it was apparent to many of us that the Grange would not last much longer without new membership. As we expected, all of the active Grange members before we came have either died or become inactive. Of the group that joined in the 90's and later, only five of us remain actively trying to maintain the building and keeping it available to the community. We do this entirely with rental income and our own free labor; we get no help whatsoever from the Grange organization. We are neither wealthy nor young, and have many other things to be concerned with. We have made some improvements and have kept some wolves at bay, but the facts are that the building is slowly deteriorating and needs some major, costly improvements. We would like to schedule a meeting in January for all of you that love the Grange Hall and would like to help us strategize how we can continue to have it as a community facility into the future.

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




Like a Bridge: A Tribute to the Songs of Simon & Garfunkel


