VIGA Wins Grant for 'Vashon Fresh'

The Vashon Island Growers Association (VIGA) was just awarded \$41,300 to develop and pilot a mobile website in summer 2017. Dubbed 'Vashon Fresh', it will enable commuters and residents to order fresh, local customized produce and products and pick them at day's end. It was one of eleven projects across King County funded through King Conservation District's Regional Food Systems grant program. Vashon Maury Island Land Trust also received funding to ready the Matsuda Farm for production.

'Vashon Fresh' will be similar to web-based services like Amazon Fresh and Blue Apron which enable customers to order food from their smart devices. The big differences will be that 1. all the produce and value-added products will be from Vashon growers opening a new market for local farmers and residents and 2. Vashonites will pick up their customized orders at the end of the day on their way home from work.

On-line ordering is a fast-growing segment of the food industry. VIGA wants to demonstrate that it can benefit local farmers and local residents not just giant corporations like Amazon



and Safeway. About half of Vashon's population, 5400 residents, commute to work offering a substantial number of people that would take advantage of the convenience of an order-and-pickup service. If it works on Vashon Island, the concept could be replicated in other communities in the Seattle metro area. Partners in Vashon Fresh's development, implementation and possible replication include Seattle Tilth and the University of Washington.

VIGA is a non profit membership organization of farmers and eaters whose mission is to promote farming, access to healthy food, and a sustainable agricultural economy on Vashon Island through education, advocacy, and a vibrant farmers market.

Gram Parsons Hootenanny to benefit Voice of Vashon

Gram Parsons was a Southernraised, Harvard-educated young man of 21 when he moved to Los Angeles in 1967, taking with him a passionate love of both rock and roll and country music. Through his work with The International Submarine Band, The Byrds, The Flying Burrito Brothers, his solo albums, and his collaboration with Emmy Lou Harris, he created a staggering and influential body of work that helped transform California rock into a new genre. He has a rightful claim to being a "founding father" of what came to be called "Country Rock" and "Alt Country", and his work has influenced performers in Rock and Country ranging from Keith Richards to Ryan Adams to Lucinda Williams (and so many others). In his short musical career, he was like a meteor streaking across the sky. He traveled far and he burned bright.

Now, Vashon Islanders will have a chance to celebrate the music of this vital American artist (named by Rolling Stone as one of the Top 100 Rock Artists of All Time) on November 6th when Debra Heesch presents A Song For You: Gram Parsons Hootenanny at the Vashon Island Coffee Roasterie with

The Road to Resilience By Terry Sullivan, Vote!

I have been working with a group called Revolution Vashon. We are Berniecrats that are promoting the political revolution that Bernie Sanders called for. We agree with Bernie that it is vitally important that Hillary Clinton be elected president. We are also actively supporting the candidacies of progressive candidates down-ballot to win progressive majorities in Congress and state and local offices. I think we learned a hard lesson in 2008 that electing a president of "hope and change" was not enough to get it done. Although we Bernie and Clinton supporters were on opposing sides during the primaries, we want to join forces to bring about a political revolution. We also need to find common ground with our more conservative compatriots if we are to move forward. Or maybe the alternative, gridlock and dissolution, is preferable? Voting knowledgeably in the coming election is not only very important for us but for the world in general. At the same time, it is maybe a bit more difficult than in the past. In some cases, none of the candidates you have to choose from are clearly acceptable. Some of the issues are complicated and a right or wrong position on them is not clear. You can decide to pass on the whole thing because you think it is too difficult or depressing, or that it won't make a difference. That is exactly the wrong thing to do! There will be many angry and fearful people who definitely will vote this year, and you may not like the

results of their vote. Our ability to live on this planet, democracy, world order, food security, and much more hang in the balance. Cooler heads must prevail.

You may notice in the voting guide that, unlike the federal positions, all state races have only two contestants. That is the result of the "top two" primary initiative, sponsored be the Washington State Grange, passed some years ago. Critics of the initiative pointed out that it could result in voters have to choose from two candidates of the same party. Two such instances occurred this year. In our own congressional race, both candidates are Democrats: not surprising given the nature of our district. The other is the State Treasurer race in which both candidates are Republicans. In this case, the majority of the votes went to three Democrats, but the plurality went to the two Republicans. It would be best for each of us to do the research and make our own informed decisions. If you don't have the time or inclination to do that, there are groups of different political persuasions that have done the research that you can consult. If you are for the political revolution that Bernie Sanders called for, we have put together a sample ballot for you. Most of the choices on our ballot were based on ballots suggested by the Progressive Voters Guide, an 8-yearold annual project of Fuse Washington, and The Stranger, a Seattle progressive newspaper.

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

"What are cutthroat?" Cappy Berard asked. They called him Cappy because he was so big at birth, that the nurses called him Captain. Cappy was a cousin from West Seattle and didn't know that peaches grew on trees. He only knew they came from the store. "You can't go cut throating if you don't know what a cutthroat is," Cousin Jim told him.

We had to wait for the tide to come in, because a high tide brought the cutthroat close to shore to feed off the bugs and debris that fell from trees hanging out over the water. The best cut throating was down by Indian Tom's shack which sat on a wooden bulkhead near the Lagoon. His wife was called Clam Lucy. There was a huge boulder right in front of their place. We didn't know why the fishing was so good there. It was mystical.

Grandma Ada could remember when Tom was younger and he always stood up when he rowed by with a boat full of clams bound for the steamer dock at Portage; to sell at the Pike Place market. We never learned his last name.

We had two ways to catch cutthroat. One was using gang spoons with a fat worm on the hook. The other was using a lure called a flatfish which gave the trout a fighting chance. Grandma Ada's practical way was to fish from the back of the rowboat while Papa Jim rowed. She preferred a hand line to a pole; because she could feel the fish nibbling on her worm and jerk the line to set the hook. Catching a fighting cutthroat was very exciting and watching it sizzle in butter in the frying pan was even better.

We were on the beach one day,

Vashon Youth & Family Services (VYFS) is pleased to announce the hiring of a team of managers to lead its early childhood program, Family Education and Support Services (FESS). Barbara Garrett and Christine Wood joined VYFS as co-leaders of the FESS program in early October, taking over from the previous Manager, Catherina Willard.

Garrett is a licensed mental health counselor and former elementary school teacher who served as Director of Mental Health Services at Full Life Care, a nonprofit serving adults with disabilities in King and Snohomish Counties. Garrett's title is Director of FESS. She will focus on strategic leadership, fundraising and grant writing, and program development.





Into The Breach

After an eventful seal pup season and three outings to San Juan Island – the last trip to present for a marine naturalist training course, 'way cool! -- Chez VHP is back on track. We are on a roll this month for marine mammal variety: Humpback whales, Orcas, Harbor porpoises, Dall's porpoises, Harbor seals, California sea lions, Steller sea lions, and a stranded Harbor porpoise at Paradise Cove, prized by researchers.

Humpback whales are increasingly common in Puget Sound in the past decade. Odin and I saw two traveling together through Dalco Pass on October 22, and a single whale was foraging over a broad area encompassing Dalco and Colvos Passages and the Narrows for several days as of October 26. In addition, while returning home from an encounter with orcas on October 24, researcher Mark Sears saw a Humpback exiting north Colvos Pass. Reports of three whales traveling together in Island waters at the same time are, thus far, unconfirmed.

On October 20, endangered Southern Resident Killer Whales (SRKW) ventured into Vashon-Maury waters on their first seasonal visit. At 1:30 PM, our compadre Mark told us a large number ("s**tload") of Southern Residents were coming our way. Initially, the orcas were exceedingly dispersed, all across the Sound and three miles between leaders and trailers.

They traveled south in East Passage, pausing between Three Tree Point and Klahanie, or thereabouts, presumably to forage. We can only speculate on that because no research boats went out to collect prey samples. Curiously, the SRKW did not inspect Tramp Harbor.

We waited and waited -- two hours -- at Point Robinson. The orcas eventually arrived, in dramatic fashion, about 5:40 PM. At least 40 killer whales coalesced as they approached the point. Through binoculars, I spotted members of all K Pod matrilines and most J Pod families plus Onyx (L87) -- Granny's (J2's) escort. The conspicuous absence of Polaris (J28) and her calf Dipper (J54) troubled me at the time. To my relief, photos indicated that



her J17 matriline was not present.

A cargo ship plowing up the passage generated a substantial wake. The big, smart dolphins strategized and considered their options. Some surfed into the wake, where a breach-a-thon ensued. An impressive array of whales erupted from the water. Scrutinizing photos later, the number of breachers astounded me.

Though humans tend to interpret these breach-fests as joyful fun, whales are communicating vital information to each other when they breach. Breaching is a multi-purpose behavior; the context matters. Heck, the ship's wake was a blast to frolic in, but was the engine noise bothersome? Whales also breach when they are stressed, or when they cannot communicate effectively underwater. The L Pod members in Dyes Inlet in 1997 demonstrated this painful reality.

Another remarkable feature of the October 20 encounter was the prevalence of touchy-feely clusters containing male and female whales of all ages. "Group grope" is one cutesy name for this behavior. Naturalist Melisa Pinnow coined the term "cuddle puddle." Anyone for snuggle sandwich?

The welcoming committee in Dalco Pass got skunked on the 20th. The orcas turned north again after dark - perhaps near Dash Point. Mark and Maya Sears caught up with the SRKW on October 24. They obtained ID photos and collected a few scale samples - proof of foraging. Fat, juicy chum salmon sought refuge under their boat. The orcas seemed to be satiated. Juvenile whales chased fish, sometimes mouthing them without consuming them. This week's photo is ours! Odin snapped a sweet image of mother Deadhead (K27), son Ripple (K44) with his chin up, and male cousin Comet (K38) Continued on Page 8

Vashon Film Society thinks this comic tale of tragedy and taxidermy will strike just the right chord with Vashon audiences.

"Finders Keepers" will be shown at the Vashon Theatre on Thursday, November 3 at 8:30 pm and on Friday, November 4 at 4 pm.





sent to our 200 Vashon supporters. We required a 2/3 majority of survey respondents to make an endorsement. The first, of course, was the presidential election. Clinton got 54%, Stein got 27%, both short of a 2/3 majority so we made no recommendation. However, we are unanimous that Clinton must be elected and do not recommend a Stein vote if it would jeopardize Clinton winning our state.

The second item was I 732, the carbon tax initiative. In this case, most of the state environmental organizations (including Fuse), and several national organizations, have recommended a no vote because they felt that, instead of being revenue neutral, it should have raised money that we could used to finance the transition to renewable energy. We on Vashon agreed with the Stranger editorial board that something was better than nothing, and we can't afford to wait another two to four years before a better proposition might be offered. Also, voting this initiative in doesn't preclude passing a better

solution later. Our survey recommends YES on I 732.

In our congressional race, where two democrats, Jayapal and Walkinshaw, are running, we had earlier decided to endorse Pramila Jayapal. Although Walkinshaw is also a very good candidate, maybe better than any other running in our state, we felt that Jayapal was more knowledgeable, a better communicator, more competent in general.

Our recommendations for all other issues and offices are on our sample ballot which can be found at www. revolutionvashon.org or posted around town. Hopefully, it will be available at the library. 

We monitor 24/7 -- call at 3:00 AM if you hear blows! When reporting a sighting or stranding, be specific: date, time, location, travel direction, species description, regardless of immigration status.

number of whales/critters, and behavior observed. If you need help with this, we can guide you. We prefer phone reports, but if email is the only way to coax you to report to the VHP, send sightings and photos to Vashonorcas@aol.com. Your photos of marine mammals are valuable for ID purposes.

Mark Sears launches his boat from West Seattle, so timely reports from all Vashon ferry routes are extremely useful. Surely, one or two Islanders could call us when whales grace the commute. Leave a number in case we need more details. Do not assume we will find stuff posted online by chance. As ever, we are grateful to everyone who reports directly to us.



Beef Eaters Delight Fish for Memory

It is said that people who eat fish at least once a week lose their memories 10% more slowly than people who avoid fish, and that people who eat seafood twice a week lose their memories 13% more slowly than people who never eat seafood. Diners in Spain and Japan must have the most fabulous memories in the world. Some decades ago when my husband, our two sons, and I spent a month in Spain, eating out all the time, every lunch and every dinner plate contained a small piece of fish and a small piece of meat.

In Japan proper and on Okinawa, every meal contained something from the land and something from the sea. The something from the land was always rice, plus side dishes of leaves of the soybean plant, an occasional gingko nut, taro, and/ or a white sweet potato. Fish was the staple protein. On Okinawa, even dessert might be something from the sea, such as shredded kelp in sweet pineapple juice. Okinawans are among the longest lived people in the world.

The paella we ate in Seville, Spain, began with a layer of cooked rice. Topping the rice

were pieces of white chicken meat, slices of bell pepper, green peas, The paella we ate for dinner last night here at chez Watkins also contained "something from the land and something from the sea". On the traditional bed of rice, in this case cooked with saffron that turned the grains yellow, were large shrimp, small mussels, and calimari rings. It was delicious and filling and required nothing but a green salad to complete the meal. Saffron is not necessary, nor traditional. It just looks cheerful.

> PAELLA 4 servings

1 cup uncooked rice 1 teaspoon salt 2 cups chicken broth 2 Tablespoons light olive oil 1/4 cup chopped onion

1 red bell pepper, sliced and seeds and pith removed

1 scant teaspoon dried crumbled oregano leaf

1 cup diced cooked chicken white meat

12 small clams in their wellscrubbed shells

> 8 frozen large shrimp 1/4 cup frozen green peas Cook the rice in the chicken

broth. While it cooks, prepare the remaining ingredients except for the peas. In a large skillet, heat the olive oil and stir-fry the onion. Add the rice. Top it with the bell pepper slices and sprinkle the oregan over it. Add the seafood, Reduce the heat to medium. Cover the skillet Cook until the clams open up and the shrimp is opaque clear through and has turned pink. Add the peas. Recover the skillet and cook 2 minutes to thaw them, or a little longer if you prefer them cooked.

Serve from the skillet to preserve the still-life.

Community Conversations: Journalism That Matters and Big Joy: The Adventures of James Broughton

How do we make sense of the times we're living in?

Poet and experimental filmmaker James Broughton tried to give an answer to that eternal question with this poem, which he recommended to journalists. What Matters

> What matters matters but it doesn't Some of the time everything matters

Much of the time nothing matters

In the long run both everything and nothing matter a lot

We had such a great conversation on Voice of Vashon - as part of Prose, Poetry and Purpose's 2016 focus on the Political (R)Evolution – that we decided to go deeper into our exploration of both journalism and James Broughton.

In particular, March wanted to explore Stephen's non-profit, Journalism That Matters (JTM); a think-tank on the future of journalism which Stephen and colleagues created in 2001. In short, JTM seeks to foster collaboration, innovation, and co-creative action amongst journalists. The goal? Words and images used wisely to birth a news-ecosystem that builds diversity awareness in a way that allows communities to truly thrive.

Maybe you're thinking, "Isn't it a no-brainer that journalism matters? Isn't it supposed to serve as the 'fourth estate' of government, after the executive, legislative and judicial branches?"

Well, yes and no. There is always that divide between ideals and reality. In fact, many people rate journalism nearly as low as Congress on their trust rankings (yeah - it's pretty bad). Which makes sense. As happens with all positions of power, modern journalism (like politics) is struggling greatly to maintain its honor. However, as JTM illustrates: ethical journalists are working collaboratively to reclaim their vital purpose as information-bearers in service to their readers and viewers. Naturally, the plight of American journalists is not a solitary problem. Most systems in our country face severe challenges. When you compare America to most other advanced nations in the world, we fail miserably on important issues such as: health care, education, environmental ethics, politics, and public safety. Which is why JTM is so important! To improve our nation, we must first see it clearly for what it is. Its strengths, weaknesses and potential solutions. What might some of these solutions be, within the realm of journalism? For one thing, we'd like to see less lecture and more conversation. How do you feel

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when you read an article that tells you what to think? How might an article, instead, be written so that its readers become informed, curious, aware and motivated to get further involved? To achieve this goal, an article would need to be free from the monied interests of the corporate class. As in, journalism of the people, by the people and for the people.

Thanks to the internet, we are in fact seeing an explosion in "citizen journalists," and while some things may occasionally suffer (like grammar or a lack of fact-checking) there is still great benefit. Especially given that professional journalists tend to refer to themselves as cynics. Consider what happens when our storytellers view the world through a lens of winners and losers, black and white, or even Republican and Democrat? Our culture is quite more creative and complex than that, as James Broughton's story in the film 'Big Joy' illustrates.

James Broughton lived at a time when truths were hidden and lies were preferred. Yet, he was an explorer and purveyor of untouchable truths. As such, upon receiving a prestigious and rare award at the Cannes Film Festival in 1954, he refused an offer to direct Hollywood films.

"I'm a poet, I didn't want to go into business," he explained, as he chose the artistic freedom of self-employment. Unlike James, many journalists, once regularly employed, find themselves forced by editors (and advertisers) to seek out sound bites that fit a preordained story. Just as Americans are fighting to get Big Money out of Politics...so must we sever Big Money's "thought control" role in the realm of journalism.

Journalism That Matters has developed three main tenets which it shares with citizens and journalists across the country. The first has to do with listening, the second focuses on "truth to empower," and the third demands authenticity and self-representation through the construct of "nothing about us without us."

What if journalists sought to improve the world, one reader at a time, instead of viewing the audience as passive consumers? What if a story was deemed worthy because the community it was about also supplied the majority of the narrative? What if journalists spent more time listening, free from preconceptions, so that when they did set pen to paper, they had something truly new to report?

People who depend upon others to discover the world for them deserve a vibrant and multi-colored depiction of this most fascinating of planets (as far as we know now). Instead of the "same old news," imagine the impact of journalism that focused on the leading edges of society! New solutions to old problems, scientists and their discoveries, artists and their creative power, youth and their fresh new views on our world...

We sit on the edge between a brave new world of positive communication and public participation OR a 1984-style rat race of cynicism and selffocus where each person finds herself with less and less chance for economic and creative opportunity. And while we cannot claim to have an answer, we are pretty sure there is one. It lies there, within each of us, waiting to be found and shared; if we can but quiet our expectations long enough to hear our own voice.

Don't miss Stephen Silha's interview on Prose, Poetry & Purpose, where we talk about James Broughton and his vision of a world where people "follow their own Weird." Part an experience of ecstasy...part an unveiling of all that the Earth can offer us; his work both required and fostered an open heart and mind.

And now, in celebration of the beauty within each of us, we leave you with a sweetly succinct poem by James Broughton.

> Shaman Psalm: Deflate pugnacity Magnify friendliness Off with your mask Off with your face Dump the false guides who travel the warpaths Uncover your loving Discover surrender Rise in your essence to the tender occasion Unwrap your radiance and brighten your crew Value one another or fall ...





All ages are welcome, but the event is not intended for children. Stories may include mature language or themes.





Balkan Choir Dunava Debuts on Vashon

Join Dunava Balkan women's choir for an intimate evening of Eastern European folk harmonies in the magical Kudus House.

Dunava, a women's choir from Seattle that specializes in Balkan folk songs, will make its Vashon island debut with a house concert on November 5 at 7:30pm. The venue is the Kudus House (formerly David Smith's property), a 100-year-old traditional teak house imported from Java.

Dunava is made up of 11 singers with diverse musical backgrounds who share a love of the intricate harmonies and rhythms of Eastern European folk music. 
