King County seeks public comment on continued Island Center Forest deer hunt

Maintaining its commitment to continuing a dialogue with the completed, King County Parks is community, King County Parks wants to hear from the public on a proposal to continue a limited deer-hunting season annually at Island Center Forest on Vashon Island.

King County has set a public meeting for Sept. 19 on Vashon Island; an online civic engagement forum; and a two-week public comment period all to help Parks managers determine if limited deerhunting seasons should continue as they have since 2011 at Island Center Forest.

In a plan created with community input and with public safety in mind, a 17-day-long deer hunting season was first set for 2011 in Island Center Forest, while all other recreational access to the King County-managed land was restricted.

Following another round of public feedback after the first limited hunting season, King County established a fiveyear pilot project of hunting seasons beginning in 2012, during which time Parks employees monitored hunter use, harvest rates, and other facets of the limited seasons.

With the five-year pilot project again seeking the public's opinions on continuing the limited deer hunt in Island Center Forest.

If approved, the 2017 deer-hunting season at Island Center Forest would run from Oct. 14-31.

King County has established several ways for the public to learn more about the proposal, and to provide feedback:

A public meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, Sept. 19 from 6:30-8:30 p.m. at McMurray Middle School, 9329 Cemetery Rd., Vashon.

The deer-hunting proposal will also be a highlighted topic through King County Connects - an online forum for civic engagement that gives participants the ability to read what others are saying, and submit their own statements. Parks managers incorporate them into our decision-making process. Learn more about the proposal at kingcounty.gov/ islandcenterforest.

King County will also solicit public input on this proposal through the Continued on Page 4

With opening set by Jacob Bain



The Road to Resilience **Bread for Circuses** By Terry Sullivan,

(This is a reprint of the column I wrote over six years ago, July 2, 2011. In the light of our red sun and our affairs with Harvey, Irma, Jose, and Katia, I wanted to write about why we are acting like deer in the headlights. In the last six years, how much would you say we have progressed in our response to the biggest threat we have ever faced?)

"In addition to our personal and local work, we need to keep pushing for day, but you can't help thinking about the creation of a sustainable, low-energy economy. I've been wanting to write about why we, as a species, fail to plan ahead, in the light of the very probable disastrous consequences of climate change. A little story might help you see it the way I do. "Imagine that you are rafting on a beautiful, serene river on a beautiful day. The guide is at the helm, and you don't have a care in the world. Suddenly, someone on shore yells out to you that a landslide has occurred downriver, creating a huge waterfall, and urges you to land and portage your boat. Dismayed, you look to your guide, who assures you that no such thing has ever happened before and not to worry about it. 'It may be a class 2 rapid, nothing more, nothing we can't handle', he says. You readily accept your guide's assessment because the alternative

would mean quitting this beautiful drift, going ashore where it is hot and buggy, and slogging through the brush carrying this boat instead of it carrying you. As you continue downriver, more people urge you to land your boat, you notice that the current has picked up a bit, and occasionally you hear a very deep roar, not unlike a large waterfall. This is really putting a damper on your wonderful the possibilities. If you stay in the river until you actually see the falls, it will probably be too late to get out of the river in time. You know your guide is experienced and competent, but all these people on the shore say there is danger and some of them probably have a better vantage point than you do. It would be really embarrassing to wimp out and go ashore if there turns out to be no danger. On the other hand, if there is a waterfall, you will very likely die. This sort of landside has never happened before... Why should you believe it could happen now? Meanwhile, it is a beautiful day, and your mind wanders off... "We are cruising down the middle of the river on our wonderful highenergy lifestyle with more miraculous and wonderful things to be had all the time. Meanwhile, the supposed dangers ahead are not only unseen, they have



his music resists any easy categorization or comparison. While referencing multiple Cape Verdean genres (batuku, funaná, finason, tabanka, morna and coladera), Tcheka's music is also a busy intersection of Caribbean, Brazilian and African pop and traditional forms, folk, jazz, blues, rock, literature, anthropology and film. It is never just Santiaguense, never just Cape Verdean, and never just music. Perhaps what Tcheka presents is an entirely new vision of what it means to be Creole in the age of globalization: to be a hybrid product of the historical forces of slavery, colonialism and national independence, but at the same time, to be deeply affected by post-modern forces as well - by the growing inevitability of travel and trans-national encounters, by the emergence of new regimes of knowledge, art and capitalism and by the increasing inseparability of technology and the human imagination.

State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA). The SEPA document will be available Friday, Sept. 8 on the King County Parks' website, kingcounty.gov/parks/ publicnotices.

the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife's annual four-month-long deer hunt from Sept. 1 through Dec. 31, which included separate seasons for archery, muzzleloaders and modern firearms.

To accommodate hunting and nonhunting activities in Island Center Forest, King County proposed a limited hunting season to coincide with the state's modern firearm hunting season when all firearms can be used, except rifles. This reduced the state's established four-month-long hunting season at Island Center Forest to a season that encompasses the last three weekends of October. King County Parks manages Island Center Forest in collaboration with community partners who make up the Friends of Island Center Forest, a diverse group that includes the Vashon Forest Stewards, Vashon-Maury Island Horse Association, Vashon Sportsmen's Club, Vashon-Maury Island Land Trust, Vashon-Maury Island Audubon, outdoor enthusiasts and other community members.

King County Parks and Recreation Division

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King County took over management of the former Washington State Department of Natural Resources lands, now known as Island Center Forest, in 2005. At that time, the Vashon community requested that all historic uses of the site be allowed to continue, including hiking, biking and horseback riding, forest management and deer hunting.

Increased year-round use of the land by non-hunters raised concerns about unsafe conditions in the woods during

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Island Life An Embarrassment of Hubris

In a time when I have been sitting on butt a lot while working on things in my magic computer box, to say that I walked uptown and back twice in one day is a bit of a something. To say that I did it to be interviewed for a live broadcast from the expansive studios of our own Voice of Vashon and for an article in the Beachcomber is something else. And to say that I did it in order to get the word out about two video projects of mine that will be screening at our own Vashon Theatre within the next couple of weeks is all bordering on something that I'd almost rather not be congratulating myself about. One of the things that I am slowly learning though about this new game in town that I seem to be playing is that hype of a self-congratulatory nature is a somewhat necessary part of the action.

Another thing that I am learning from this process is that it requires thought and articulation as to what the hell you are doing and why the hell you have done it, which is something I thought I was covering here already in this space, although it also seems that what is required on the outside in this process is more self-aggrandizement and less selfdeprecation. Talking up a photograph is one thing- it is a moment in time that you decided to grab out of the continuum and call your own. A film or video project is a collection of those moments intended to convey, in somewhat the best of ways, a story, through what one would hope is a coherent and cogent arc. That would at least be the case in a documentary- the other thing I have attempted here is to imagine a visual for a piece of music, or in this case twelve songs in a row. There could be a story to be told along with the lyrics of the music, or it could just be a visual augmentation to ride along with the song- it seems that both came into play with my second project.

My first ever idea for a music video will probably continue to remain unrealized. For some reason that I cannot explain (other than perhaps I should have been listening to my create urges a long time ago) my first inclination to do a film illustrating a song was way back when I first heard the Beatles sing about an eggman and a walrus. For some reason I began to create in my head a filmic visual for lyrics like "sitting on a cornflake, waiting for the van to come." I don't know why. My unrealized super 8 interpretation never happened, although I still, very briefly and soon passed, sometimes wonder what I would have come up with if I had had access to the video ease of these modern times. And then, with the onset of cable and MTV came the actual music videos, at which point I decided that my earlier notion of cinematically illustrating a song may have been completely off. Along with my fascination with cable and MTV and v-jays, I came to see that while the music videos were intriguing and another way to become familiar with songs, my problem was that the visuals involved soon became my only visual construct that was permanently ingrained in my brain, so that was the only thing I saw whenever a given song began to play anywhere, even without the visual accompaniment. Given the popularity of MTV and their format,


this did not however seem to be an issue with most people.

And so it was in these times of now, when I was asked to create twelve videos to accompany twelve songs written and performed by Ike Harmon and others on a soon to be released CD, the creative challenge that presented far outweighed my misgivings about the genre. And so it was that a little over a year ago we would meet every couple of weeks in various places around the Island and stage various types of lipsync pageantry in order to produce visual imagery for the entirety of the album which is soon to be released at the Vashon Theatre on September 30th at 1pm.

While the musical part of this endeavor involved many multiples of takes and mixation overlays, pretty much all of the videos we did were achieved in a single take, sometimes with multiple cameras. This of course makes for a certain degree of pressure on this person here to get it all right the first time through. To coordinate the desired recording so that it looked mostly like Ike was singing, we had off camera recorders of various sizes playing the tracks so he could look like he was singing along in real time. Along the way there were intentional fires and lights and drone flights and all hopefully fitting in with the recording that had gone on before. As I was finally assembling all of this a few weeks ago it came to light that one of the songs had changed so much along the way that I could not get what we had previously video recorded to reconcile with all the new audio, so we restaged what had gone before and everything happily merged in a new, updated version.

There is in all of this a reality of scale that one finally has to account for. While previously existing as imagery on computer monitors and our big screen TV here at home, I finally did arrange a test screening up at the Vashon Theatre this past week and, as with everything else, this was a multi-layered learning experience. Although it should have been obvious going in, with a really big screen and a big sound system, everything becomes a larger presence. This was particularly emphasized in the audio department, where slight variations and deviations from the established norm of -12db become very large swings in what is heard on the soundtrack. Ever since then I have been retweaking the sound on my documentary. I was pleased to see that the visuals there, particularly the color on Chris Gaynor's photographs, were all close or on parallel to what I had seen on my large screen TV and my editing monitors. I am also now aware of sound issues on Ike's CD release video, something which we will address once the Soldier Boy screening has happened.

And that is why, in part, I was pacing up and down the highway a couple of times today, as I expect to be in the Vashon Theatre on both the Greentech night of 19 September at 6pm and the CD release party on September 30th at one in the afternoon. I do not expect to be able to sit still at either screening. What will be on display from my perspective is a merging of both my early and current attempts at documentary filmmaking, along with my latest efforts to create a visualization for songwriting and musicianship. Admission for 'a Soldier Boy Hears the Distant Guns' is free or by donation on this Greentech Tuesday, and for the Ike Harmon CD release it is \$25, which gets you in, a free CD and free popcorn. I will be at both events- hope to see you there.

What Happens Once I Enter the Clinic?

There will be a large number of patients. You cannot get both dental and vision care on the same day.

Patients can wait in line for an admission ticket on another day for additional services.

We will collect basic personal information including name, age, height, weight and medical history.

In each service area (dental, vision or medical) you will wait your turn in line and will be seen on a first-come, first-served basis.

You will be given a pass when you enter the Clinic. This pass will allow you to leave and re-enter the building for that day only. However, if you are in line for a service, you will lose your place in line if you leave the building. You will need to go to the end of the line for that service when you return.

What Services Will NOT Be Provided?

DENTAL: Bridges, complex extractions including wisdom teeth, dentures, implants, orthodontics, root canals on molars, sedation, teeth

How Do I Get Into the Clinic?

Get a ticket at the Fisher Pavilion at Seattle Center. Fisher Pavilion opens each day at 12:30 AM (see seattlecenter. org/patients for a map and details).

A limited number of tickets will be given out each day starting at 5:00 AM. The ticket is only good for that day. One ticket per person.

The first patients will enter the Clinic in Key Arena at 6:30 AM. Entrance will be in order of the number on the ticket.

How Should I Prepare for the Clinic? This will be a long day. Come prepared to take care of yourself.

Bring food and beverages and any medications you may need throughout the day.

DO NOT fast for lab tests.

To get dental care, you must have blood pressure and glucose within whitening

VISION: Contacts, sunglasses

MEDICAL: Biopsies, casts, CT scans, stitches/sutures, immunizations for children under 18 years of age, admission to a treatment facility, MRIs, new prescriptions for behavioral health medications

Narcotics will not be used or prescribed. Authorization for medical marijuana will not be provided.







Island Legends: The 3 a.m. Boat

A couple of weeks ago, Dona Bradley, Michael Shapiro, and I went over to Gig Harbor on a Tuesday night to play at an open mike that is run by Thea Wescott at a place called the Markee.

Dona, Thea, and I got to know each other back in the seventies.

Dona was singing in bands with David Conant and later Fred Schactler. Thea and Steve Fearey were working as the duet Bodacious when I met them. Rick Tuel, Chris Howie, and I worked together as Kanout Manufacturing in the early seventies.

As Dona, Thea, and I talked on that recent Tuesday night in Gig Harbor, the 3 a.m. ferry kept coming up. The 3 a.m. ferry was the boat that musicians took home. You played until the bar or club closed at 2 a.m., then you packed up your gear and beat feet for Fauntleroy.

If you missed that 3 a.m. boat, you either had to nap in your car or go find



That singing was probably more fun than the gigs we played, come to think of it.

I remember being hit one night by the realization of what a miracle it was to be able to sing like that, to be part of making such a beautiful noise, to be filled with it, and carried by it. I was free of my own lousy self-opinion long enough to realize what a gift I had been given.

Thea and Dona have that gift, also.

I always had the greatest respect and admiration for Thea and Dona, because I thought of them as real professional musicians – they worked regularly with their bands and they toured around the northwest, and up into Canada and down into California. That's what I thought of as the real thing.

I thought of myself as a folkie, playing irregularly at coffee houses and folk clubs and occasionally on the military bases for soldiers who for some reason were unable to get off base that night. My work paid a little, not much, but I thought of it as professional musician light, not like Dona and Thea, who were out there doing it.

We talked about musicians and other

someplace to eat and hang out until the first ferry left in the morning.

A musician named Michael Murfin who lived on the island at that time had a '58 Chevy from which he had removed the back seat. He put a mattress that went from behind the front seat into the trunk, and napped on the ferry dock when he missed the last boat. I thought that was ingenious but was not prepared to remove my '58 Chevy's back seat.

Later he moved to the city and joined the Love Family and his name was changed to Asaph.

But I digress.

Back to the 3 a.m. boat. Rick, Chris, and I would go upstairs island people we knew forty-five years ago. Where are they now? We know where some of them are and what they are doing. Some of them we know are gone now.

The 3 a.m. boat was discontinued at some point, and many musicians moved off the island at that time. For those of us for whom the island was home, moving off was never an option.

The island music community is now booming more than ever. We have an embarrassment of riches here in singers, songwriters, and musicians. I am reminded once more that all art happens despite everything. I do not write because I'm organized and have a perfect little studio that's all set up, for example. I write in

Important Medical Decisions Should Never Be Rushed

On August 30th, a front-page article in The Beachcomber reminded our community that the Neighborcare School Based Health Center (SBHC) is now operating at our island schools. This article made it clear that you, as a parent, are encouraged to promptly sign and return legal consent forms which allow your child to be treated at the SBHC.

Do you feel strange about the idea of your child meeting with a brand new doctor by herself? If so, you are not alone. Do you believe a parent's presence leads to better informed medical decisions, treatment choices and health care outcomes? You're in very good company. Do you want to know more about this program, before you sign up? Sounds like you're a typical parent who takes parenting responsibilities seriously.

Unfortunately, the way this new opportunity has been presented to the community creates an undeniable sense of urgency which is entirely unnecessary. Signing legal documents, before you fully understand the ramifications of your decision, is more than unnecessary - it's literally a form of "uninformed" consent.

Have you ever been in an ambulance or headed to the ER with a life-threatening emergency? Didn't have time to read the entire release form? I understand. I was in that very situation this past April. Like most people, I scanned the document, asked a couple questions, and then reasonably signed it and crossed my fingers, trusting that I was in the "caring and capable" hands of people committed to "doing their best."

Starting the school year, on the other hand, is not the same as being rushed to the ER in an ambulance. Unless you've struggled to gain medical care for your child (and this new SBHC can help you overcome a critical health burden)...you have time to consider your actions. Plenty of time, in fact, so take it!

After exploring further, parents should obviously feel entirely comfortable accepting, or rejecting, this new option for their child. However, I'd like to ask you

because of our long-shared past.

And Michael? Yeah, he was there, too. He was a kid, maybe twenty-one when we met him. But he had big aspirations. And I must say this: he has always had excellent taste in women.

That open mike in Gig Harbor is every Tuesday night at the Markee on Olympic Boulevard. Sign up at 6 p.m. We'll be going back. See you there maybe. to consider the following statement, by Sarah Day: "It is important that we get the paperwork signed," she said. "We are lucky to have the clinic. Let's make it successful."

Hmmm. Since when did it become your responsibility, as a parent, to make this clinic successful? I thought your job was to prepare your child for school, ensure a supportive home environment, and make careful, thought out decisions? As a result of this idea that family participation impacts success of the program, we actually have island parents pressuring other island parents to sign up. It's subtle, but it's there, and it's not helpful. So, let me be clear: the success or failure of Neighborcare's SBHC should never be tied to your medical consent decision as a parent.

The truth is, you can put this decision on the back burner and wait a few days, a couple weeks, maybe even a month or two. Go ahead and focus on getting your children settled into school and your family schedule evened out. Eventually, things will slow down again and you can devote time to a family discussion. You can also make a few phone calls, read the paperwork carefully, and otherwise get your questions answered. Maybe Timmy and Sarah don't want to go to the doctor alone? Perhaps your family medical background is complex enough that your presence is absolutely necessary? Or, maybe it's perfect for you. Maybe you love it!

Whatever the final decision is, make sure that no person, organization or institution is pushing you in one direction or the other. It is both your right, and your responsibility, to know what you are doing when you sign a legal consent form on behalf of your child.

Long story short: When it comes to legal contracts, you deserve to sign on the dotted line with confidence.

Molly Too Needs A Home...



Something **Special from** India

People from India are noted for their high intelligence, for which they credit turmeric. It's the spice that gives Indian dishes their yellow color. The intricate blend of other spices gives Indian cooking it's mysterious and delicious flavor. Most gourmet cooks believe that, if a dish contains coconut in any form, it's from southern India. Not so: Malai Murgh, or Chicken in Coconut Sauce, comes from northern India. The word murgh means chicken.

In the recipe below, you are not expected to eat the cloves and the cinnamon stick, but "if you swallow a clove, no harm will come to you," says my Indian cookbook.

The original recipe contains cardamom. Not being fond of that spice, I leave it out. Suit yourself, and don't let the long list of ingredients scare you. The intricate blend of flavors produces a splendid dish that requires only a bowl of cooked rice, long grain preferred, plain or honeved yoghurt, and a small dish of sliced and salted cucumber to complete the meal.

> Chicken in Coconut Sauce Makes 4 generous servings

2 pounds boneless chicken meat, cut in bite size pieces 3 to 4 Tablespoon coconut oil

1 cup chopped onions 4 to 5 Tablespoons finely

chopped ginger root, peeling on 3 cloves garlic, minced

8 green cardamom pods, optional

12 whole cloves

1 cinnamon stick 3 inches long 1/4 cup almond meal

never before been seen by any human being. We do know that the temperature of the Earth has risen one degree Celsius in the last hundred years, and, with the output of greenhouse gasses growing every year, it will take considerably less time to reach 2 degrees. We hear from the experts that we may be able to maintain some semblance of the world we now have if we can keep the rise within 2 degrees. The problem is that we have yet to experience the extent of climate change due to the concentration of gasses that we already have. If we immediately returned to our production levels of 1990, as is recommended, we would still have more warming in the years ahead. Perhaps it is no longer possible to keep the change within 2 degrees. The gasses [CO2] do not dissipate readily;

> 1¹/₂ cups coconut milk ¹/₄ teaspoon turmeric ¹/₂ teaspoon red pepper flakes

or to taste

2 teaspoons salt

2 tablespoons snipped cilantro leaves

Heat the oil in oil in a very large, heavy-bottomed pan. Over medium-high heat, stir-cook the onion, ginger, and garlic until onions, though still pale, are limp. Add the cloves and cinnamon and continue cooking for about 5 more minutes.

Add the almond meal, stircooking about 2 minutes. Add the chicken in a single layer. Reduce heat to medium. Let cook about 1 minute. Turn the chicken pieces. Let cook until the meat turns white.

Add the coconut milk, turmeric, red pepper flakes, and salt. Stir-cook until the sauce has boiled down and thickened. If it has not thickened enough, you can either stir in more almond meal or let the sauce boil down until it has thickened.

If the sauce gets too thick or the oil comes to the surface, either add more coconut milk if you have it, or stir inn a little water. Transfer to a serving dish. Enjoy!

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the past has shown that it takes about 1,000 years for those gasses to get reabsorbed by the Earth after cessation of output. The consensus is that if we want to keep the temperature rise within 3 degrees in 2050, we need to start decreasing our output of gasses by 2015[two years ago!], very little time for such a radical change.

"Will we really give up a high-carbon lifestyle that will likely lead to our ruin? Will we have the courage to abandon our growth economy and invent a new steady-state economy that pursues happiness and wellbeing rather than wealth and excess? Will we radically reduce our energy usage so we can generate all we need from renewables? Will we start to work with the web of life instead of trying to master it? This is where you write or call your representatives to tell them that the situation is not business as usual - and you will personally support extensive life-changing measures to lower our carbon footprint. Let's try to shake this lethargy before it's too late.

"Folks, this is the most serious challenge our species has ever faced. Many other species have faced similar challenges, and most of them are extinct. The difference between us and them could be our mind, which allows us to plan ahead. Do we have the courage and wisdom to use it?"

We've been hitting the "snooze button" since I wrote this piece. Time to wake up!

The name Kuinka (coo-WINK-uh) comes from the Finnish for "how"; how does a band bristling with spirited creativity continue to evolve artistically and challenge themselves while staying true to their own roots? For Kuinka, the answer comes in the form of letting go: a joyful acquiescence to their cumulative love of songwriting and shared experience, regardless of genre or instrumentation. Brothers Zach and Nathan Hamer, along with Miranda Zickler and Jillian Walker, came together in 2014 to form a unique breed of string band; one proudly defiant of preconceived notions of what fits under the label 'Americana'.

Their 2014 debut The Wild North, which propelled the band out of the woods and on to stages across the country, was followed by their 2016 breakout LP The Heartland. 

A Soldier Boy Hears the Distant Guns- Christopher Gaynor: a **Vietnam Experience**

From 1967 to 1968, Chris Gaynor was a soldier "in country" in the Vietnam war. While there, he took pictures and wrote letters home. Through some of these photos and through letters he both wrote and received from home, he tells of his experiences during the war, and ties those experiences to the group known as the Vashon 12, the twelve Vashon sons who were lost to the Vietnam war.


