The Road to Resilience

Market Madness

When it comes to real estate, we on Vashon, like the rest of the country, have a schizoid relationship. We seem to cheer on the rising property values as a sign of prosperity while at the same time worrying that housing prices are ever more unaffordable for a larger and larger segment of the community. About 145 years ago, the American politician, writer, and activist Henry George wrote a book, Progress and Poverty, that proposed that individuals or groups own what they create but land belongs to all equally. At a time of dramatic growth, urbanization, and industrialization, a parcel of rural land that was purchased for a pittance could be worth thousands of dollars a front foot as a city grew around it. George's main argument was that the owner of that property did not earn the appreciation on his property. It was the people and businesses that moved in nearby that created the value. Although his book was very popular in his day, he was promoting an idea that was, and still is, anathema for wealthy speculators and it was quickly forgotten. When George died in New York in 1897, tens of thousands came out to pay him tribute. But his ideas went against the grain, and I would be surprised if anybody reading this column

has ever heard of him. I was introduced to him by a big fan of his, Rose Ballen, back in 1990 when we, as original board members, incorporated Vashon Household.

Rising property value in the housing market is directly responsible for the housing unaffordability crisis we are facing today. Until the last 50 years or so, there were still plenty of options for a home buyer, and as the supply decreased, the population grew, and real estate values went up, many a speculator traded their way into wealth and have continued to do so. The problem now is that demand greatly exceeds supply, so those of modest means entering the market for the first time can find nothing they can possibly afford.

The great advantage of being a homeowner is that you have the opportunity to build equity. For a middle-income person, a home is usually the largest asset they own. If your parents did not get on the gravy train early on, then you may have no assets to build on and will be effectively denied an opportunity to buy a home. The inequality in our country is directly related to assets. When the stock market goes up, 75% of us do not participate in any significant way. For older Americans, 28% rely on social security for 75% or more of their income.

During the housing crash of 2008, many thousands, maybe millions, lost their homes and their only source of equity. These were forced into the rental market where their money simply gets consumed by a landlord and no equity accrues at all. I would imagine that many who are homeless today as a result of the pandemic had mortgages on homes in 2008, and their fortunes may have been very different if they had been able to weather the crisis then. Today, 11% of homes are vacant. *Continued on Page 6*

Island Life The Big Lie

One of my go-to movies that I go to when I need to get away and don't want any surprises is 'Sneakers' with Robert Redford, Sidney Poitier, David Strathairn, Dan Akroyd, Mary McDonnell and others. I think what keeps me coming back to it is the band of misfits thing- and that they are able to hold it all together to outsmart the layers of stuff that gets thrown at them. For those who don't know, it is kind of a hacker movie where they wind up with the ultimate translator chip that breaks all secret codes. It kind of falls in the timeline of things about midway between 'War Games' from way back in 1983 and the very early inklings of internet dalliances, and 'the Matrix' in 1999, which to me was a bit disturbing and earth shaking in its revelations about another reality at the other end of a phoneline that I won't go into. The line from Sneakers that keeps coming back to me is from when Redford's character is riding in a car in San Francisco with a member of the Russian consulate there, and they are pulled over but what appears to be agents from the FBI. Gregor, the Russian, implores Redford to not get out of the car by saying "you won't know who to trust...'

There is a nice bit of twisted irony in that, and a somewhat scary prescience relating to the former occupant of the White House and his inclination toward believing in all things Russian, as opposed to anything our own intelligence services might have to say to the contrary. With the casting of doubt into the truth behind the results of the 2020 presidential election, the Mar A Lago menace has sown the seeds of distrust into the core of our democratic beliefs. He has done that with virtually no proof-just his "belief". Certain national news organizations that have bolstered and amplified his claims in the past have continued to do so, again without any proof of fraud in the election, except for maybe the few instances where dead wives or mothers have been shown to have cast posthumous ballots in favor of Hair Twittler. This contrived view of a fabricated reality makes logical and coherent discourse about these things impossible. At least in the movie, Neo is given a choice of whether or not he wants to find out the truth about the Matrix in the form of choosing to take one or the other of two different pills. The blue pill allows one to wake up the next morning and carry on as one always has- the red pill takes one on a ride to a different reality, and opens up a window or a door there to actually see "how deep the rabbit hole goes." Trump acolytes have embraced the blue pill, while it still remains to be seen if the Kool-Aid they are washing it down with will be terminal for the Republican party, or if it will just sustain them indefinitely on a delusional sugar high.

What is fascinating about the cast of the Matrix is that in some ways it is similar to the cast of Star Trek- they are both basically gender and race diverse, and seemingly neutral to their

differences. Neo and his tribe are there to free minds from the enslavement of the machines. Kirk and Spock and the rest are on a mission to explore new worlds and do it under the guidance of the prime directive of non-interference into how those worlds go about their existence. On the other hand, what we are having to deal with in the Big Lie and its spin offs is the underpinning belief that there are lesser human beings out there, and that they are the source of all our troubles. Some might say that that is an oversimplification- I would disagree. The most disruptive bit of the Trumpian agenda manifested itself on 6 January 2021 in what has been called many things, but most accurately one can name it what it was- the Capital Insurrection. The people that were there have stated many times that their sole reason for participating was to "take back our country, and election, that was stolen from us", and they were doing it because Trump had told them to.

Following their multitude of losses sustained in the 2020 election, it is people of color that the Republicans are targeting with all their new efforts to restrict and curtail voting rights, as well as the xenophobic fear of the other that is on display in the insane breach of voting security going on in the farcical recount currently happening in Arizona. It is there that the snipe hunt search continues for the bamboo paper ballots that some claim were flown in from China in order to stuff ballot boxes full of illegitimate votes aimed at denying Mar-A-Lardo the continuance of his emperorship. 



The Sky and Eye



The constellation Aquarius or water bearer in Latin, was recorded in the second century by the Greek astronomer Ptolemy.

"Lift that cigar higher and take a big draw!" I said to Seán as we sat out on his Indian Point deck, waiting for the late April 'pink' super-moon to rise. His glowing cigar tip would look just like the moon images we saw as kids in homemade telescopes from 'Things of Science' or 'Edmonds' scientific of comic book fame. I took a picture of his bright-red Dominican cigar tip against the Eastern horizon above Maury and across the outer harbor. The picture did not come out well. "We better try for the real super moon," I said.. "Let's try our new sky program! .. " and Seán promptly aligned his smart phone and we could see exactly where to look for the moon rising as well as a whole bunch of constellations and planets that we were not even looking for.

"Years ago we would have to ask our dad or a scoutmaster to show us what there was to see.. Now, it's just a smartphone and you can ask that smartass Siri you always talk to..!" I commented..

We had both gotten astronomy merit badges and I had actually built a crude telescope from one of those kits called 'Things of Science'. I think I saw moon craters and fuzzy images of Venus on a shaky tripod.

Both Seán and I looked up a lot.. And we both were 'ground observer corps' members and had earned the cheap pewter-badge that said so!

"Nice cigar" I said.. "Pour a glass of that fair-to-middling red wine, and tell me more about your career in the ground observer corps!"

"And be sure to tell about your UFO sighting! You know, I once saw a UFO, and there was some suspicion that it was a wayward used-up weather balloon... but it sure looked ufo'y to me!"

As we sat on the deck waiting for the moon to rise, Sean related his ground observer career, a good story.. and here it is:

I was hanging out on a different rail, the cat walk of the Ground Observer Corp's tower on Sunrise Ridge. It was made of wood and I was still sweating for what I had done hours earlier. Mom had caught me carving my initials in the wooden hand rail guiding you up the many stairs. She told me, "Don't you ever do that again, you are defacing government property." At 12 years old, I was so proud of my ground observer corps badge that I tried to pin it to my Boy Scout uniform when they told me I couldn't do that because; one was US government and the other civilian.

It was cold standing at the rail of our watchtower, describing aircraft activity to Mom who stood with the telephone in her hand, ready to give our call sign: M R Cocoa 2-2 Black to the people at Sea-Tac plotting center and pass on a description of the aircraft. "Due East about 15 degrees off the horizon, flying NW and believed to be a DC 4 with two engines. There was

a poster on the wall beside the telephone desk that had all the silhouettes of both our planes and the enemies'.

I wasn't allowed to call in aircraft descriptions and identifications, only Mom could do that. That didn't stop me from standing my watch, many times at night where the sharp autumn air made the stars sparkle on a moonless night. I was looking for unidentified aircraft and these ground observer towers stretched between here and the East coast and most were manned by volunteer observers, like Mom.

Spotting a UFO or unidentified flying object rarely happened. I was cold and on the east side of the catwalk when I saw something rise from the Cascade Range to the east, at an accelerated rate, faster than any plane we knew of. At 45 degrees above the horizon, it was joined by two other fast moving objects and they came together and all three shot off into space in a matter of seconds. I was very excited when I told Mom, who came out to the rail too late. Never-the-less, she called Sea-Tac and reported a UFO.

At show and tell, the next day at school, I related of my having seen a UFO, I was so proud and all the kids laughed and said that I was seeing things. Even the teacher explained that I had probably seen search lights from one of the used car lots. It was common for the car lots to rent huge WWll anti-aircraft search lights to advertise a big car sale and I was flabbergasted that nobody believed me.

The Ground Observer Corps was quite old and came before the Nike missiles and radar sites on the mountain tops across the country, about the same time as the AAA batteries and the "open houses" they had for Vashon people. The army guys let us kids sit in the seat of the quad 50mm machine gun and then they would start the ten horse Briggs and Stratton that allowed us to move the barrels up and down or across the sky to find the imaginary enemy planes. We lived on Beall Rd. and the 150 mm howitzers were just across the wire fence and in the next field west toward town; where the local Eagles Aerie has their clubhouse in the old mess hall. The army never shot their howitzers on Vashon, but would trail the big guns all the way to the Yakima Firing range for their yearly

Uncle Bruce, our scoutmaster introduced us to the sky at night, by showing us the location of the big dipper, Orion's belt and the star Arcturus, and neat constellations that the ancient Greeks had given names to. Uncle Bruce would then describe their different functions in mythology.

The direction North was determined by lining up the two stars on the far end of the dipper and then tracing a line from the bottom star, through the top star to a brighter star, Polaris or the North star. Uncle Bruce's lessons were valuable

In the 1920s out of segregated Washington DC, a self-taught Afro-American pianist, composer and band leader, Edward Kennedy Ellington, embarked on a career that would last into the 1970s. By the late 1920s Duke Ellington was performing in Manhattan's Cotton Club. By the 1930s he was playing to sold out crowds in Paris, London, and cities throughout the US. In 1938 Ellington met a 23 year old, gay Afro-American musical prodigy, Billy Strayhorn. For the next 30 years Ellington and Strayhorn formed Jazz's great partnership producing such great songs as "Take the A Train", "Lush Life" and many other famous hits.





Marj's Home Remedies Part 2: Burns

Of course, your best bet is to avoid burns in the first place. I keep hot pads in the kitchen drawer next to the stove, and know from experience to use them.

Burns, first degree: Red and painful Douse the heat. My remedy is to swing to the sink, run tepid (not cold) water over the hand that brushed the hot rack above the cookies while pulling their rack from the oven. I aim to remove the worst of the

heat without shocking my nervous system. 2. Dry hand. Apply aloe vera lotion

3. Apply package of frozen peas to the burned area. It will mold to your hand. When one side heats up, reverse the package and apply the still-cold side. Apply more aloe vera.

4. Still uncomfortable? Take out another package of frozen food that comes in bits, blueberries for instance. Restore the peas to the freezer if still partially frozen. If totally thawed, put them on the menu for the next meal. When you do that put a pat of butter on the peas. Don't put butter or anything greasy on the burn. It just holds the heat in!

When you should consult a doctor or consulting nurse:

Second degree burn, or any burn that blisters, is bigger than a silver dollar, or is severe enough that you can't tell whether to call it a first degree or second degree

For chemical or electrical burns. (Don't touch victim until power is turned off.)

If a contact burn covers more than 10 percent of the sufferers body.

If a burn doesn't heal within 10 days or two weeks. Actually, with frequent applications of coolness and aloe vera lotion, most of the burns I've got while cooking have healed in three days. Once I spilled a whole kettle of just-off-the-boil soup on a bare foot. The resulting blister took a month to go away. I called a doctor who said to bring it in an he'd take the lid off the blister "so it would not get infected." That sounded counter-effective to me, so I didn't. The blister gradually resorbed. The body knows what it's doing.

Another time I had a smaller blister on the top of one foot. A doctor took the lid off it, and the resulting ulcer took three months to heal.

If clothing sticks to the burn, see a doctor. I've never had that happen so I can't advise you.

If the burned area shows any sign of infection, like a blister filled with greenish or brownish fluid, see a doctor. A blister with clear fluid is okay; it's the body's attempt to protect the area. As it heals, the blister will shrink and go away. If it springs a leak, I'd cover it with a sterile dressing. Keep it dry.

For a burn severe enough to seek professional medical care, don't put any lotion, antiseptic, or spray on it. Just gently wrap the area with a sterile dressing and take it to a doctor.

Sunburn: Take a tepid shower. Or soak 15 minutes in a cool bath. Sooth pain or itching by putting baking soda into the bathwater. Pat, do not rub, dry. If it's on your back, get someone else to gently patting, not rubbing – go over it again and again with soft, cool, used tea bag. The tannin in the tea will take the heat out and begin the cooling. Sleep on your stomach for a few nights.

that with all these explorer guys out there looking for stuff around this world, that they should probably have some sort of definition that delineated what might happen with what they found along the way. And so, in a somewhat sweeping and superior way, it was affirmed by Papal decree that any land not inhabited by Christians was available to be discovered, claimed and exploited. all homes are in the \$750,000 range and another third are above that. Only 6 % of homes are valued at \$300,000 or less, only 2% a \$100,000 or less. These figures are now probably too modest as houses all over the region are being furiously bid up above the asking price. Right now, the only landowners that are not wealthy are those - or their families - that bought land 40 or more years ago.

Our mission at Vashon Household was and still is to create a community in which people at all income levels would have the opportunity to obtain a secure place to live. In the twenty years I spent with Vashon Household, it seemed to me that we could only apply a Band-Aid to the problem. Certainly, we built housing for hundreds of people now living in VHH projects, but they all involved massive subsidies and strict requirements for the recipients. With the

Roseballen project, we did create a limited On Vashon, as of 2019, a third of Community Land Trust that allowed us to sell homes to those below the existing threshold for home buyers, and we were partially successful in limiting the profits from appreciation on the later sales of those properties. At least that was the case when I was last involved fourteen years ago.

> Today, the housing affordability crisis is even worse than when we formed Vashon Household thirty years ago. Certainly not because of VHH, but because we as a society have not decided to give up the windfall profits of land speculation in favor of seeing to the needs of all the members of our community. There are solutions but they are institutional changes and all outside the box. Next time you consider cheering about the rising property values, think about what that means for our propertyless fellow islanders.
