



Cold Weather Tips to Keep Your Pet Safe

Here are some suggested cold weather tips for pet owners, courtesy of King County Animal Care. Your tax dollars at work!

- 1. Wipe pets' paws after a walk through the snow. They can have frozen fur in between their foot pads and track in chemicals from deicing fluid that can make them sick if ingested.
- 2. Check outdoor water bowls, as they may freeze and prevent your pet from drinking.
- 3. Make sure pets are wearing at least two forms of current identification. This could be any combination, such as a pet license and microchip or a pet license and personal identification tag.
- 4. Ensure your emergency disaster kits include at least three days of pet food, supplies and medications for all the animals in your household. at the age of 8 or 9, along with hundreds of other young men, in the midst of a civil war. His father was killed, and he assumed the same for his mother and siblings. Along with thousands of others, he walked hundreds of miles, in constant danger from the elements, animals and soldiers. Many of the boys and men died over the course of the next several months, and many thousands eventually made their way to Ugandan refugee camps. Jacob spent the next 15 years living and growing up in refugee camps.

Just over a year ago, Jacob discovered, through another lost boy who traveled to a Ugandan camp, that his mother and siblings were still alive! With the help of the Group, Jacob has applied for travel documents to go and see them. As a refugee, Jacob needs very specific travel papers in order to go and then return to the US, which is his intention. In this political climate, receiving refugee travel documents to African countries is a long, unpredictable process.


needs, as well as the successful transport of his mother and several siblings from the Ugandan camp back to their village in Sudan. Small monthly payments have also been made through wire transfer for their ongoing support. They are living in the homes of friends and relatives: they still do not have a home of their own. One of Jacob's primary goals is to help build a simple home for his mother, the same type that is common in their village.

Until now, the Group has had a very hard time knowing for certain the any money sent to Sudan would arrive in the right hands and how it would be managed. The same concern has existed for the efforts to

Jacob ran away from his village build a house. We have been researching local NGO's (nongovernment agencies), church groups, UN, etc that might be near there, but because of the many difficulties in that part of Sudan, there are very few groups "on the ground."

> But there is a great new development: One of Jacob's best friends, Madit Arop, another Lost Boy from the Seattle area, just went to Sudan, and plans to be in a town very near Jacob's family for the next 2 to 3 months. Madit is a very mature and responsible young man, who's very interested in helping support the effort to build Jacob's mother a house - setting up the project, receiving the funds, managing the beginning of the process etc. This is a great opportunity to accomplish Jacob's goal, and have the process handled by someone "on the ground" whom Jacob knows and trusts.

The Jacob Acier Group would like to invite Islanders to contribute to this exciting and worthwhile cause. Killer Whales Come Lately

Southern Resident orcas finally returned to Vashon-Maury waters on December 2. Historically, they first appear in late October or early November. The orcas' late arrival this year is unprecedented. Migrating chum salmon

attract these killer whales to lower Puget Sound in fall and winter.

Mark Sears, Odin, I observed approximately whales from J, K, and L Pods foraging and socializing between Dolphin Point and the Vashon-Fauntleroy ferry lanes. That day, the meandered between Vashon and artist. Buy this piece and proceeds benefit Bainbridge Islands, so worthy causes on Vashon. ferry riders got an eyeful of fins and flukes.

Mark Sears and other NOAA researchers obtained ID photos and

collected samples of fish scales and orca scat. The samples provide invaluable clues about diet, stress, disease, and parasite loads in our endangered Southern Residents.

Odin and I watched a Young adult male Blackberry sprouter (J27) with podmates near (adolescent male) swimming Piner Point. Photo by Mark in a tight circle around a research boat, presumably

because he chased a chum salmon under the hull. At the stern, he rolled his large head sideways to gaze up at the crew. Orca thought balloon: "Why are you twoleggeds scooping our poop and food

Please support the work of the Vashon Hydrophone Project (VHP): REPORT LOCAL WHALE SIGHTINGS ASAP TO 463-9041. Our underwater microphone in Colvos Pass identifies killer whale pods by their distinctive vocalizations. The VHP aids in Southern Resident recovery by recording orca calls to supplement photo-identification and other data. Follow the links at www.vashonorcas.org to learn more. On December 3, Mark Sears had another productive encounter with the Southern Residents north of the Kitsap peninsula, but they did not return to Vashon waters for several days. Remarkably, on December 7, the orcas slipped into lower Puget Sound undetected. Thanks to Ruth, an alert spotter at Luana Beach, the VHP was first to notify researchers that morning of Southern Residents in East Passage.

Odin and I did not catch up to them until they were approaching Brown's Point. Members of J, K, and L Pods foraged outside of Commencement Bay for more than an hour, providing better viewing for folks in Tacoma. The orcas dallied about in Dalco Pass and then returned to East Passage late in the day.

More than a dozen recreational boats noticed the killer whales off the Tacoma waterfront and near Point Defiance. From our distant vantage point, boaters

appeared to be complying with the Marine Mammal Protection Act (MMPA). The only boats allowed close to the Southern Residents are small research vessels, which are clearly marked. Report other boats harassing whales to NOAA Enforcement at 1-800-853-1964. As of mid-December, orcas have not returned

to Island waters.

Living the Boring Life

One day a man who looked Gabby Hayes, or prospector straight out of the Gold Rush, came walking down Beach Street leading a donkey that was carrying a pack. This would have been in 1962 or so. I was curious, but I never found out who he was or why he and his donkey walked by the high school. He was a character, no doubt, one of the people at whom we rolled our eyes and twirled our fingers around our ears to indicate, "crazy." In 1962 there weren't many characters. Characters came in a few years later when we all decided to let our hair grow.

I wish I could say that I saw other interesting things while

WATER: If you do nothing else, stock water & encourage your neighbors to do likewise!

1 GALLON OF WATER PER PERSON PER DAY.


(Store a minimum 3-day and preferably a 10-day to 2-week supply. Do not use milk jugs; 2-liter pop bottles can be used or food-grade plastic drums. Rotate every six months OR purify immediately before use, as described below.)

WATER PURIFICATION PRODUCT OR BOTTLE OF UNSCENTED LIQUID CHLORINE BLEACH TO PURIFY WATER.

(Use only regular household liquid bleach that contains 5.25 percent sodium hypo chlorite. Do not use scented bleaches, color-safe bleaches or bleaches with added cleaners. Add 16 drops of bleach per gallon or 8 drops of bleach per 2-liter bottle right before you use it, NOT before you store it. Add drops, stir and let stand for 30 minutes. If the water does not have a slight bleach odor, repeat the dosage and let stand another 15 minutes.)

Both water and bleach must be changed out every year; strength of bleach deteriorates over time.

Store a minimum of a 3-day supply (and preferably a 10-day supply-2 weeks supply) of foods requiring no refrigeration and little to no preparation or cooking. Be careful of high salt content, increasing thirst. Use a marker to date items. Inspect regularly for spoilage.







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SORE THROAT TIME IS HERE AGAIN.

As winter and cold weather settles in, more and more people are complaining of being tired and have sore throats. If those sore throats are not taken care of quickly, most end up with a cold. Most colds begin with early symptoms of fatigue and a slight scratchy, dryness in the throat that soon evolves to a seriously sore throat, followed by the usual cold symptoms. There are good herbs for sore throat-type colds.

When I wake up a bit cranky or have a slightly scratchy sore throat, I always turn to echinacea to prod my immune system into action. This herb works best if you take small, frequent doses and if you taste the herb rather than swallowing it in a capsule. The lymph tissue in the back of your throat keeps track of what is coming in to the body and covered with a layer of mucus. The sounds an early alert to the rest of the system when something seems amiss. Your immune system will respond more quickly if these tissues are directly exposed to echinacea and other plant remedies you are taking.

Another great throat herb is red root (*Ceanothus spp.*). The Eastern version of this plant is called New Jersey tea and its leaves were substituted for true tea in the aftermath of the Boston tea party. The root is very red (hence its name) and very astringent. It tonifies lymphatic tissue and improves the flow of lymph. Red root is helpful in ailments that involve lymphatic congestion ranging from hemorrhoids and varicose veins to fluid-filled, tender breasts. It is stellar for the throat's lymphatic tissue. prevent secondary throat infections The eclectic physicians favored red root for the swellings of mumps and tonsillitis.

I add hyssop (Hyssopus officinalis) to my sore throat mixture because it has very strong anti-viral properties that are needed to fight off a cold effectively. I also use yerba mansa (Anemopsis californica) because it draws out fluid from boggy throat tissue and is very antimicrobial. I have people gargle the mixture and then swallow it every hour or so. It is an amazingly effective combination.

But not all sore throats signal a cold. Some sore throats instead follow in the wake of a cold. These sore throats are usually secondary bacterial infections. We have all sorts of bacteria in our mouth, and for the most part our immune system and our structural barricades keep these bacteria from moving




deeper into the body. However, after a viral onslaught, the immune system and the structural barricades are weakened, making it easier for bacteria to move in. That is why some people end up with strep throat after a cold.

Our mouths and throats are mucus is a barrier that helps keep bacteria out — the bacteria get stuck in the muck. Viral infections often damage the mucus-secreting cells and, while they are in recovery, the mucus membranes are not as functional, making it easier for bacteria to gain access into the body. In addition, our bodies use hyaluronic acid to 'glue' our cells together in tissue layers. Some bacteria produce hyaluronidase, an enzyme that dissolves hyaluronic acid so they can more easily squeeze between cells and move more deeply into the body. Echinacea has an anti-hyaluronidase action and helps off-set the bacterial hyaluronidase. It is one of the ways echinacea works in the body and one of the reasons why echinacea can help after a cold.

Another very simple way to help the body is to drink a cold infusion of marshmallow root during a cold. Marshmallow root used to be the main ingredient in marshmallows and contains long-chained sugars that turn gooey and gelatinous when heated. A cold infusion is an extraction without heat, so the marshmallow drink is not thick and icky to drink. However, once in the body, its sugars coat the mucus membranes damaged by the cold virus and create a false mucus barrier that helps keep bacteria from invading the throat and bronchi. Marshmallow also somewhat stimulates white blood cells. It is a very safe, inexpensive medicine that can be used during a cold to prevent secondary bacterial infections from developing.



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
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

He means it. He will. His yoke IS easy. His burden IS light. It IS by Grace we are saved and not what we do ourselves. Stewardship is not


