We obtained our first VHP recording of the fall season on October 14, a rainy night, between 6:45 and 7:30 PM. A highly vocal superpod of J, K, and L Pod orcas ventured into north Colvos Pass after dark. In addition to the opulent array of calls emitted, the orcas' echolocation clicks and buzzes signified enthusiastic chomping of chum salmon. A soggy VHP Welcome Committee kept vigil on the deck, listening for blows and percussive activity such as tail slaps. Alas, those wild killer whales changed direction before reaching Chez VHP. From the

abrupt cessation of calls in the recording, we surmise the orcas rounded the north end of Vashon and journeyed back to East Passage shortly after 7:30 PM.

The photo accompanying my article suggests one momentous reason for the orcas' excited chatter: the Southern Residents are celebrating a new relative! Earlier on October 14, VHP associate Maya Sears (Mark's daughter) captured this endearing image of Baby L116 traveling beside Mother Kasatka (L82),

Care Packages Sought for Fallen Soldier's Platoon

When Vashon's 1st Lt. Robert Bennedsen was killed in Afghanistan last month, he had only been in the country three weeks, but he had already come up with a plan of support for men and women under his command.

He told his family that while he enjoyed care packages from home, many in his platoon never received anything. He hoped the people of Vashon would change that.

Bennedsen's family and friends wish to fulfill Bennedsen's plan and ask that Islanders donate cash to the cause or give items the men and women there have requested. The list includes mechanic's gloves, green uniform socks, sunscreen, hand warmers, preserved foods, powdered Gatorade, cans of tuna, toothpaste, toothbrushes, razors, reading material, flip flops and hard candy, according to Lauren Chinn, who is helping to organize the effort.

Head Lice 101

lately outbreaks seem worse than usual. So, endure the Heebie-Jeebies and read on, help is out there. First and foremost lice don't care how old or clean or rich you are, they are equal opportunity bloodsuckers. There are three human types: head, body, and pubic. Each prefers its own habitats and the body louse is the one that spreads disease.

The Life Cycle is about 30 days on a host and about 55 hours without a host; nit to adult takes about 14 days. They feed about five times a day, light colored after hatching; they darken after a bloodmeal. They look like of a grain of sand or small freckle. Feeding is itchy (they attach to one spot for hours) and tickly as they move around. They do not jump, fly or live on pets. They breathe thru holes in their sides and can close them for several hours, so smothering agents must be left on for 8 - 10 hours. Shampooing will not kill them.

Females lay eggs during the adult stage, about 4 daily that hatch in about 7 days. The nits are light colored and resemble dandruff except they are attached firmly to the hair. New eggs are laid very close to the scalp and nits one or more inches away have hatched or the embryo is dead.

Sensitive to heat and light, they prefer the dark, warm area at the back of the head and around the ears. The lifespan, movement, and nit hatching are all dependent upon body heat: faster in the summer and slower in the winter.

They spread thru head to head contact, brushes, combs, clothing, or public seating: schools, planes, busses, cars, restaurants, or theaters. Girls are three times more likely to be affected than boys because of longer hair. Small children are more affected than older children or adults because they snuggle and often can't articulate discomfort

Consistently Methodical is the best strategy, whether treating the person or the environment. Make scalp checks part of the daily routine and teach kids about prevention don't share personal

Vashon has always had lice, but items, hang coats on separate hooks at school, and avoid head-to-head contact. A buzz cut eliminates most nit laying, while pony tails and braids literally shed light on a problem area, the back of the head, and make it harder for lice to climb

> Recurring outbreaks mean: 1) The method is ineffective, 2) Bugs or nits were left on the scalp, or 3) Contact with an infested person or environment.

> **Scalp Check:** Wet hair is easiest. Part hair, bangs to nape, and pony tail one side out of the way. Part hair, crown to nape, in a $1/8\square$ section and spread the hair to either side along the part. Visually check the entire length of the part for nits and lice. Repeat the process from back to front, then secure that section in a pony tail and do the other side. For short hair, use the palm of the hand flat against the scalp and move in the opposite direction of hair growth.

> Nit Pick by sliding the nits down the hair shaft with a nit comb or your fingernail. Remove from fingers and combs with a bowl of rubbing alcohol or hot water and bleach. Catch lice with fingers or tape, sticky side out.

> Smothering: Put the smothering agent around the edge of the hair to stop bugs from escaping. Use the parting technique above and put the agent liberally along each part, then add enough to coat the hair to the ends. Nit pick as needed. Cover with a plastic cap (or wrap), pat to get air out and leave on for 8 to 10 hours.

> Smothering agents must be thick enough to stay on the scalp. Oil products and conditioners have been used with some success. Mayonnaise is not recommended because of salmonella concerns, nor is Vaseline because it is hard to remove. Cetaphil Cleanser must be dried into the hair with a blow dryer, see nuvoforheadlice.com for complete

I voted for John Spellman, and yes it was against Booth Gardner. In many ways it was a vote against change. Spellman was against the Northern Tier pipeline, which seemed a sensible, environmental stance to me. There were other things he said and did that sat well with me. And every so often he would appear on a now defunct radio station in Seattle and spin jazz discs on a Sunday morning, and he would speak enthusiastically about them. This was an act that seemed to transcend politics and at least give the impression that he was truly a governor of the people. At the time of that election, we had a choice to move Washington forward, and I seem to remember Mr. Gardner being an advocate of this. We are always told the progress fable and warned of the consequences: "We must move forward or they will get there before we do", regardless of who "they" are. As it is, as we "move forward" we are at the same time looking back to the "better times" of yesterday. We forget that we had a choice in the matter, which is always an all too convenient out- the forgetting that is.

One could say that the Spellman defeat was the beginning of my disillusionment with politics, but that wouldn't quite be true. I really didn't have any political capitol invested in that election at the time other than the time spent on that brief foray to the ballot box, back when we had a ballot box to foray to. It wasn't till the years of Bush II that I felt like I was owed at least somethingsomething remotely resembling the truth. It was a time of the awakening of the documentary film as the new medium of newsworthy expression and true information dissemination, as it was also the time when what were formerly

And oh, you want your home back? Sorry Dorothy, I don't know how this thing works. I would like to believe in the wizard, but I know he really sells snake oil. I would like to believe that the horse of a different color offers a change of any kind for the better, but from where I'm standing it's business as usual and that business is a smelly mess. Will I fill out and send in my ballot? Maybe. But if they ask me to come to Tukwila again to verify my signature I think I'll take a pass on that golden opportunity.

contains a neurotoxin, like Lindane or Malathion. Read and follow the directions CAREFULLY and never use on children two years or under.

Never use gasoline or kerosene; many children have been critically burned. Any alcohol based product should never be used with a heat source.

Clean environments regularly by vacuuming, heat, isolation and smothering, use water at least 130 F. Put items in the clothes dryer for at least 30 minutes. Use a black plastic bag for smothering and seal the bag tightly. Leave the bag in a hot car for 12 hours or sealed for 5 days.

Carpets, furniture and mattresses should be vacuumed and isolated for 5 days, cover furniture with sheets that are washed daily. Wipe floors, counter tops, etc., in hot water and bleach. Brushes and combs can be soaked in hot water with bleach. Don't forget the car.

Bufflehead Back Around the Island

Bufflehead returned about on time this year with the first showing up in Quartermaster Harbor near Portage on October 19. The third week of October proves to be their usual return date for the Island. Their characteristic big bulky head with the large white patch in the males and distinctive bright white and black sides stood out from afar from the surrounding dark scoters and grayish grebes. The attending females appeared much less flashy with their grayishbrown bodies and only a small, oval white ear patch. The name Bufflehead comes from a corruption of the name "Buffalo head," the blocky head of the males earning that name from their first scientific description in 1791. Over the years others called them Butter Ball, Dipper and Hell Diver. Many of the diving ducks received the "Hell Diver" in the past.

Buffleheads are easily the most common diving duck seen around Vashon. Groups of 50 or more occur during spring migration and now, as the fall movements continue, many groups of 5-10 might be found around the ferry docks, bays and inlets around the Island. As winter comes on, Bufflehead appear in ones and twos or even large groups of 10 or 20 around the length of the saltwater shore. One or two will

show up in about every freshwater pond bigger than a mud puddle. One winter, I received a report of one in a driveway puddle after a big rain.

Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife reports indicate that a 20% increase occurred in the Bufflehead population in the north Puget Sound area based on the Marine Ecosystem Analyses of 1979-80 and the Puget Sound Ambient Monitoring Program surveys of 1992-99 (Nysewander et al. 2001). Numbers in the central Puget Sound, the area including Vashon, showed a smaller increase (Nysewander 2003). Vashon Christmas Bird Count data look more complex with an increase in the first half of the decade followed by a decline for several years and ending with an up tick (Trevathan 1999-2009).

The overall stable population of the Bufflehead contrasts with that of the scoters, goldeneye, scaup, loons and grebes which all show significant to drastic declines in numbers. It's thought that a difference in prey populations and the wider habitat use of the Bufflehead play a part in its better survival rate. The other diving birds mostly winter on saltwater and depend on various fish stocks at several points of the fish life cycle. Bufflehead utilize freshwater, where they prey on insects and larvae








and occasionally weed seeds, as well as saltwater where they concentrate on crustaceans and molluscs such as shrimps, crabs and snails.

Other waterfowl continue to return with Barrow's Goldeneye near Portage in Quartermaster Harbor on October 20, shoveler in Fisher Pond also on the 20th, Northern Pintail and a hybrid AmericanXEurasian Wigeon seen by the monthly Audubon field trip on the 9th and Black Scoters and heard in Dockton regularly since mid-September by Bob Hawkins. Mike Feinstein reported that the Harlequin Ducks arrived in late September as well along Luanna Beach Road. Zillah Copper recently gave a rare fall Townsend's Solitaire that died as a window kill to Gary Shugart for the Audubon and Slater Museum collection. On a Cub Scout boat trip on October 18 from Dockton to the entrance of Quartermaster Harbor, I saw a number of Common Loons in mid-harbor and several Pacific Loons in the channel entrance across from Manzanita. It's Good to be Back

The island is an amazing place. I really love it. Having spent the last several years living over in Seattle and the last two working over there, I have developed a new appreciation for the island. After high school, about twelve years ago, I moved to the city for a few years to work and play bass "professionally" in a blues band. Those were fun years, and we did actually get paid to play, even though I was too young to drink and the waitresses had to turn a blind eye to the underage guy wandering around the bar between sets. I moved back to the island the first time because I was broke and needed to save money. Mom and dad's house can look pretty good to someone in that position. No rent. Free food. What's a ding in the old self-esteem now and then when you don't have to pay for your own cereal? The island absorbed me back into its rhythms after not

The second time I left the island was from burnout. My mom was sick with breast cancer and my dad was struggling to make ends meet. I was working at Thriftway part time and at my church part time, which together made for a fulltime paycheck and an eighty hour week. There is really no such thing as working for a church "part time." When you are laying awake at three in the morning praying about the next day's events, are you "on" or "off" the clock? At this point, I had been back on my own feet for some time, and because of my parents' situation, they had actually come to live with me. In many ways this was really a beautiful time. Eventually, though, the emotions brought on by everything became too much. I moved myself and my folks off to West Seattle, gave my church one year notice I was leaving, and began investigating colleges. I had never gone to school and now was the time.

Well, we don't order our own steps as much as we would like to believe we do. I'm back. I'm married. I'm a year away from my BA in Religion from Faith Seminary, Tacoma. I'm working for my old church. I'm excited to be here. I love the island. I'm so happy I am back.

I think that Christians in particular don't appreciate Vashon the way we really should. Because of our belief in the Bible, we often find ourselves at odds culturally with much of what happens here. We can agree with our neighbors that loving others is the most important thing in life (Christians and some others would add, "second only to loving God"). We can agree that the world is hurting, that people are hurting, and that something needs to be done. We could all live somewhere else but we all choose to live here, so we must all agree that the island is a place worth living, too. I am a political skeptic and tend to be offended by both the left and the right, but I know that many of my Christian brothers and sisters would be considered "conservative" and often feel alienated by things like the pro-Democratic Party floats during the Strawberry Festival parade.

At the heart of the Christian faith, too, is an alienating message. After all, Jesus didn't get crucified for being a nice guy and talking about love. He was crucified for being offensive, for calling himself God, for eating with prostitutes and telling religious people they were going to hell. Jesus' message was inclusive precisely because it was exclusive. Anyone can come to Jesus because everyone has to repent. Anyone can be born again because everyone must be born again. As Christian believers, we often forget that we are sinners too. But just like everyone else, Christians have a lens we view the world through that determines how we see life. No one can view the world around them without viewing it from somewhere. Christians, at our best, are viewing the world from our relationship to Christ and through the "lens" of our beliefs. And one of the things we believe is that faith, while personal, is not a private matter. That's the sticky thing about claiming something is true. If something is true, then one way or another it affects everybody. So I guess we are left either to talk to each other or about each other. What will it be?

I have to say that I am really excited being back on Vashon. I love it here. I love how quirky and odd we islanders can be. I love knowing hundreds of people by name, as opposed to being surrounded by thousands of people I will never meet. I love the churches on Vashon Island and I am excited for their future. I know some of the things I have said relate more accurately to the "evangelical" churches like Bethel and VICC, but I have friends in almost every church on this island and I love them all.

It's good to be home.



Life for the Pumpkin after Halloween

Were you lucky enough to find an edible pumpkin for your jack-o-lantern? If so, you can peel it, cut it into 1-inch squares, and steam it. When it's very tender, puree it in a blender or food processor to a smooth pulp. Now you can turn it into Pumpkin Bread, Pumpkin Soup, or Pumpkin Pie.

My breads have to be gluten free. You can substitute all-purpose flour one-for-one in this recipe. Or use one cup white flour and 3/4cup whole-wheat flour.

Gluten Free SPICY PUMPKIN BREAD Preheat oven to 350 degrees Beat well: 3/4 cup brown sugar 5 Tablespoons butter, softened 2 eggs

Combine and stir in:

1 cup home-cooked, pureed pumpkin or 1 cup canned pumpkin pulp

1/3 cup milk (dairy, soy, or almond)

Sift and mix in with a wooden spoon

1 /34 cups sorghum flour ½ teaspoon baking powder 1 teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon cinnamon

1 teaspoon ground ginger

1/4 teaspoon ground cloves

1/2 teaspoon salt

Stir in, optional: ½ cup raisins

Oil a 9x-9-inch baking dish. Preheat it 6 minutes. Pour in the batter. Bake in the center to 1 hour. This is a very moist,

steaming: 1/2 cup pumpkin pulp

2 teaspoons chicken granules or 2 bouillon cubes

1/4 cup hot water

2 teaspoons curry powder

2 Tablespoons water or milk

north of Seattle. L116 is the first known calf of 20-year-old L82. The Center for Whale Research initially observed L116 with L82 near San Juan Island on October 13. Baby L116 still had fetal folds, indicative of recent birth.

Working judiciously under a research permit that allows close approaches to killer whales to collect samples and take photos, VHP associates Mark and Maya Sears, along with NOAA Fisheries biologist Brad Hanson, had fruitful encounters with approximately 50 widely scattered Southern Residents on October 14 and 15. From a NOAA research vessel, the trio collected orca poop, fish scales, prey remnants, regurgitations, et al, and obtained ID photos. They conducted most of their work in north Puget Sound, near the confluence of Admiralty Inlet and Possession Sound.

The orca chow (chum) are jumping in Colvos Pass -- to the delight of eagles, sea lions, gillnetters, and seiners -- however the Southern Residents have yet to return to Vashon-Maury during daylight.

Each pod lost family members in the past year. The five Southern Residents who died: Lummi's presumed daughter, 77-year-old Georgia (K11); L114, a calf born in February 2010; three young males - 14-year-old Keet (J33), 24-yearold Flash (L73), and 24-year-old Saanich (L74), both of breeding age. These losses hurt. Ouch.

In our limited human way, and with the help of Mark's stunning photos, Odin and I will pay tribute to these beloved, departed orcas during our free Audubon presentation, "Kéet Shuká: Killer Whales from Native and Western Perspective," November 17, 7:00 PM at the Land Trust. 


