Peter, Wendy, Tinkerbell, and Nana the Dog, along with over 100 additional dancers, take the stage in Vashon Dance Academy's 15th annual performance, Peter Pan, Friday, June 24 - Sunday, June 26, at the Vashon High School Theater. Show times are Friday and Saturday night at 7:30 PM with matinee performances at 1:30 PM on Saturday and Sunday. Tickets are available at Books by the Way.

While the story of Peter Pan is familiar to most, Vashon Dance Academy is known for its creative interpretations and imaginative characters. This year's cast lives up to the studio's renown, with dancers performing the inventive roles of Pirate's Treasure, Pan's Music, Mermaids, Water, Stars, Never Wood and Never Birds, Tinkerbell's Little Sisters, Tiny Indians, and Forest Folk, among others. Vintage, still located in a repurposed old garage behind what used to be Old Dreams which then became the Vashon Wine Shop and is now Urban Cottage, has opened a new satellite retail outlet in the main downtown Vashon commercial corridor immediately next to Robinsons Furniture, and which will formally Vashon Vintage Uptown officially opened its doors on June 3, Vashon Island's traditional "first Friday".

The original Vashon Vintage, which opened its doors nearly 3 years ago, while doing very well and which will remain open, is perhaps not the most ideal location for a retail outlet. Ms. Oldham decided she needed "...more of a retail space, less of a garage, something in the

The Monster of Florence was a heinous serial killer who mutilated his female victims and terrified Tuscany from 1968 to 1985; it is now the most famous cold case in Italy. Here in the Puget Sound, we knew this fear from the 70's to the 90's as two serial killers left their mark upon our lives, but we never expected a twist of fate to link us

to a foreign murderer.

Our connection to the Monster of Florence is the Perugian Public Minister Giuliano Mignini, the man who wrongfully prosecuted and convicted Amanda Knox and her friend Raffaele Sollecito of the death of Meredith Kercher in 2009. His lurid tales of satanic rituals, sex, drugs and his parade of tramp witnesses were so far fetched that it set off alarm bells all over Amanda's Seattle community. Fear replaced alarm when we discovered that this was not the first time Perugia's PM had used these same tactics, in the decade prior to Meredith's murder he had become notorious as a wily and ruthless prosecutor.

His path to glory using the Monster of Florence case became our path to

In 1995 Michele Giuttari took over the MOF investigative squad and by 2002 he had joined forces in a holy war against the Order of the Red Rose (a medieval satanic sect) with Mignini and Gabriela Carlizzi, a spirit channeler. The lawyer, the cop and the psychic concocted theory after theory featuring mentally challenged persons, tramps, addicts and prostitutes as witness/informants. They wove elaborate tales about the modern doings of the ORR, whom they claimed had infiltrated Italy's elite. Then they laid waste to a select few as they tried to prove that Satanism was alive and well in Tuscany and Umbria.

A year and a half before Meredith's murder another American crossed paths with Mignini for writing about the case. In their book, "The Monster of Florence," authors Doug Preston and Mario Spezi describe their interrogations at the hands of Giuliano Mignini. He accused Mario of being Il Mostro because he had been reporting on the investigation for decades and had amassed an impressive set of files on the case; Mignini imprisoned him, 'confiscated' his files and subjected him to an outlandish trial. Doug was chased out of Italy.

Doug and Mario were now victims of a different Monster of Florence, an investigation that had become a juggernaut, a destructive force.

invented to move people over land at the local level. Biking is the predominant mode to transport people in the world. It can get you where you want to go, bring home the groceries, keep you in great shape, provide a lot of fun, and, in our case, cut your carbon footprint way down.

350.org, a group working to bring the carbon content in our atmosphere back to 350 ppm (parts per million), the amount that would have maintained the climate we've enjoyed for the last 10,000 years, is setting aside September 24 this year for people all over the world to make a commitment to curb climate change by getting out of their cars and onto their bikes. For those of you still in the contemplation stages, or maybe not even there, the outset of summer is a great time to experiment with bike riding.

A bike can be had for as little as \$5 at Granny's or as little as \$40 or so for a

The bicycle is the simplest, most functional used bike at the Bike Shop. Jeff efficient, and elegant machine ever at the Bike Shop is a very understanding and pleasant guy to deal with and will get you what you need and want. He can also refurbish that Granny's bike (be sure to have him check it out). You may want to get a bike with electric power assist (\$1400), The important thing, for a good first experience, is to have a good workable bike.

Having been an on and off bike rider for 30 years, I believe I understand the tortuous inner struggle with the resolve to ride the bike. Riding for the first time in your adult life, or at least after many years, can be hard. As you make your way gasping, with leaden legs, up those hills, you look for excuses never to do this again. However, along with an intimate awareness of slopes, you will experience the Vashon roadscape that you never noticed before: the birds, trees, water views, and things! If you wait another six months before trying it again, you will be back to the arduous square Continued on Page 8

Spring on Vashon

Now is the time of year that mother wild animals are having their young and raising them. Often wild mothers leave their young alone for stretches of time. So don't panic if you see a baby fawn or seal pup alone. You can call me any time for advice. But most often I will ask you these questions.

Is the baby crying?

Is it thin?

Is it wounded or in a high traffic area.

If the answer to any of these questions is yes, we will come out and check up on it. But also realize if you stay around a healthy baby its mom will hide! This often causes problems.

Baby birds are learning to fly. These 'branchers' are not abandoned and mom is watching and still feeding them. Watch a a safe distance. Same questions apply to baby birds.

We will often ask you to bring a small animal to us to cut down on our huge fuel bill.

Please don't try to rehab wildlife yourself. It is againest the law and you run the risk of spreading disease and imprinting wildlife.

Right now we have a young elephant seal molting on our beaches. It looks bad but is perfectly normal. Please stay 100 yards away from any marine mammal.

Did you know that Wolftown is run by private donation? And the staff are unpaid volunteers? Did you know we are the main rehab for Kind county?

Please donate! We need to buy feed, medical supplies, building materials, bedding, keep our rent and insurance up so we can give tours. Without you we won't be here!

Did you know our main job is education? And we do alot of it! Look for Wolftown at Mother Earth Fair in Puyallup.



Festive Cruise Planned Aboard Historic Virginia V

Join the Vashon-Maury Heritage Association when it takes to the water for "The Gatsby Cruise," an around-Vashon Island trip aboard the historic steamboat Virginia V on Sunday, August 21.

Think of that calm era nearly a century ago, a time between world wars and before economic collapse. Think of a time when clothing styles were freer and less confining—for both men and women. For the first time, women wore trousers and did not wear corsets. Think of Jay Gatsby and his exuberant parties. And think of a romantic afternoon with summer sunlight, gentle breezes, and a picnic lunch, then join us on board.

The cruise will begin and end at Vashon's north end passenger ferry dock, adjacent to where the ferry from Fauntleroy docks, so visitors coming from Seattle can walk on board the ferry from Fauntleroy, then walk on board the Virginia V. Boarding will begin at 12:30 p.m., departure is scheduled for 1:00 p.m. with return approximately 5:30


p.m. Bring your own lunch (no alcohol allowed) and wear soft-soled shoes.

The Virginia V, the last boat Vashon Islander Nels Christensen (of Lisabuela) had built, was launched in 1922 and is the last surviving wooden-hulled member of the "Mosquito Fleet," so named because all the little steamboats reminded someone of a swarm of mosquitoes. The Five—Christensen's boats were all named Virginia and he called them by their numbers—ran freight, mail, and passenger service, plying the waters from Vashon to Seattle and Tacoma for 16 years. Today she is owned by the Virginia V Foundation and is used for charters and excursions.

Vashon Park District to hold a Groundbreaking Ceremony for the Vashon Fields

The Vashon Park District will break ground on Saturday, June 11th at 10:00 a.m. at a gold shovel ceremony to begin the construction of the Vashon Fields. The project is a 4.59 acre renovation of the fields adjacent to the Harbor School to be used for soccer, baseball, softball, football, and lacrosse.

The development of the fields will relieve a critical need on the Island for sufficient playing fields. Sports teams who want to use fields on the Island are often hard-pressed to find an available fields to use. As a result, the current inventory of fields is deteriorating from overuse.

In addition to the need for more fields that can stand the wear and tear of an active sports community, the fields also address other youth needs on the island. Twenty-six percent of youth in King County are obese or overweight and get less physical activity than their peers in the State. And data from the Healthy Youth Survey also shows that the isolation and lack of healthy activities on the Island lends itself to higher rates of drug use among teens, even as early as in eighth grade.

The \$1.3 million Vashon Fields project is primarily being funded by state and county government grants. In fact, the current State budget has discontinued the Youth Sports grants under the Washington Recreation and Conservation Office, so Vashon Island is lucky to have applied for and received the grant when it did. Many community members have also stepped up to provide matching grants for those who donate from the soccer and lacrosse community, and to make significant donations to the project in cash or by purchasing pavers.

The park district sent out requests for bids for construction and is currently reviewing those bids, which include an in-kind component required for the grant match. Once the bids are vetted and approved, the district will know the exact amount remaining to fundraise from the local community. It is estimated to be about \$200,000.

Those funds will be raised primarily through selling pavers to the community that will be placed in the plaza around the concession stand. Pavers are 12" by 12" and are \$225, or \$150 for text only. The funds will also be raised through naming opportunities for structures and key facilities, such as dugouts, bleachers, and a batting cage. Most of the structures are \$10,000 and would be great way for the corporations with a local presence, or businesses to contribute to the project.

Advocates for the fields are steadfast in their hopes to complete the project on time and under budget. King County has lifted the stop work order after settling that the original permit was acceptable for the project. And now that they gray skies are parting, literally, the district is anxious to start construction so that disturbances to the already strained sports community are minimized.

The project means to be a community gathering place for families and friends. It will be the only athletic field site on the Island with real restroom facilities (as opposed to port-a-potties). Plans for the site are not only cost-efficient, but incorporate aesthetic qualities as well. It will be a great place for the whole family to spend the day supporting youth development and healthy, active lifestyles.

I remember how the meaning of words began to change.


Valerie- from V for Vendetta

Perhaps I was more acutely aware of a vocabulary of time and place because I had just spent the weekend immersed in words. A random occurrence of synchronous events tends to be one of my secret amusements. What I am thinking of here relates to the realization, upon walking into a record store the other day, that the song that had begun precisely as I crossed the threshold was the title song of the film I had watched the night before. It was a film I had not seen in a long time, and unlike some others, it had stood its ground through the passage. I listened some more as I walked through the store, thinking that perhaps it was just a minor coincidence. But as the last notes of Yellow Submarine faded and Only a Northern Song cranked up, it became obvious that the entire soundtrack to that animated classic was on for the duration, and of course for my private, coincidental entertainment.

In sharing this bit of serendipity with the person at the front counter I found that what I had thought to be a bit of clever banter between the cartoon characters representing the actual members of the Fab Four in the film was neither scripted nor spoken by any of the Beatles, and that the only real Beatle sighting in Yellow Submarine was the live action bit

at the end, with all four of the mop tops inviting audience members to join in song while exiting the theatre. While slightly disappointing, this bit of trivia did not diminish the power of the film for me. The power of the images and the words that went with them still stood tall in my mind. The strongest image that remained was the visual of a giant blue glove flying through the air over Pepperland, sent on a mission by the Blue Meanies to stamp out all that was good. The most powerful graphic event in this regard was when Glovie encountered the monumental, three dimensional four letter word in the landscape- KNOW. While it had crashed and smashed through a number of other such word structures along the way leaving total destruction in its path, the glove in this case chose to only take out the K and the W, leaving a much greater sense of loss by virtue of what remained.

As luck or the fates would have it, I was watching the news not long after my submarine ride when a glove of another type, actually a Mitt, appeared behind a mic at a public appearance somewhere, apparently to officially declare his intent to run for the office of President of these United States. As we all no, I mean know,

for you and me. Unlike another president who made an art form out of lying at the time that the Beatles were breaking up, the Mitt looked pained in his efforts to twist and mangle the truth. If he really wants to occupy the highest office in this land, the Mitt is going to have to learn to take the gloves off and truly lie like a Dick- you know, Nixon and Cheney.

On the other hand, we could may be seek out, look for, aspire to something better. As was stated back at the beginning of this ramble, I spent last weekend immersed in words and surrounded by those who were using them well. At the second Vashon Island Poetry Fest, what became readily apparent from the very start at the Young Poet's Center Stage through Sam Hamill's festival closing reading on Memorial Day at Ober Park, was that here and here and here were places where words actually meant something. The only thing that approached a deception was Tom Pruiksma's Poet's Magic, where sleight of hand and spoken word met to reveal, rather than conceal, a truth about poetry. After wallowing in the rut dug by a seemingly endless barrage of mainstream media fist pounding, that looked and sounded pretty good from here.

Vashon Island Ultramarathon & Trail Run

Vashon Island has a history of sport and athleticism, from the founding of K2 Skis and involvement in early hydroplane development to being the home of an annual 10k and 5k run, two triathlons (road and Xterra), and the annual Dock to Dock Half Marathon. The Island presents a great environment for many outdoor activities, from open water swimming to horse back riding.

ut until 2010, there had never been an organized trail run or Ultramarathon that took advantage of the great trails on Vashon Island. With the advent and explosion of interest in ultramarathon events, runners on Vashon Island were inspired to show off what they have known for years - that linking just a few of the various trail systems on the island provides an ecstatic trail running experience.

With the overwhelming success of the 2010 event, the Vashon Ultra is back for a second year.

The race will take place Saturday June 18, at 8:30 a.m. There is no early start.

The 50k and 10 mile races will start at the same time at the start line/finish line location in Paradise Ridge park. The 10 milers will run out of the park south to the road (220th) and west along the shoulder to Old Mill Road (literally an



old dirt lane). Meanwhile the 50k runners will separate from the 10 milers inside the park and run a full 1-mile loop of the perimeter of Paradise Ridge park before exiting out onto 220th and following the 10 milers up Old Mill Road.

All runners will continue north up Old Mill Road to 204th - where they will follow 204th east to Singer Road (another dirt road). From Singer Road runners will continue north onto the trails looping around the Vashon Cemetery.

Runners will then cross Cemetery Road and head up 115th (a gravel road) into the trail system of the King Continued on Page 11

A simple backpacking trip can quickly turn into a physical and emotional challenge if one is not prepared for the physical demands of the hike and the emotional fall out thereafter. Being overly sore or developing an injury



because of poor conditioning can take weeks if not months to recover from. The emotional fall out that follows is the realization of the condition and the physical capacity of oneself.

Simply going to the gym a couple of times a week, randomly selecting exercises and performing them without focusing on physical body awareness is a fruitless approach to prepare one for life's challenges.

Spending 45 minutes a few times a week on the elliptical machine or the treadmill is not sound preparation for carrying a 40 pound pack on your back, setting up a tent, gathering wood, building a fire, sleeping on the cold ground, being aware of your body's nutrient, hydration and caloric needs or the recovery process of such an

A fun summer backpacking trip can easily turn into several weeks of frustrating recovery. Just pushing hoards of weight around in the gym and aerobics classes will in turn yield similar results.

One would be wise to think in terms of awareness and physical conditioning. A program with such an agenda would include energy system conditioning, total body strengthening and flexibility training, balance and coordination, proper nutrition and rest/recovery cycling. All of these efforts should be done with conscious attention and body awareness.

Being prepared for life's activities so that one may enjoy them while limiting potential threats and frustrations requires a new approach to thinking and doing. Get prepared then go have fun.



Waiting for the **Test Results**

My birthday was last week, and a couple of people wished me "the happiest birthday ever." Oddly enough, that is exactly what it was.

I had some biopsies done six days before my birthday and I was waiting for the results. Many of my friends and family members have had cancer, and I thought it might be my turn.

If you have waited for test results for a biopsy, you can testify that the waiting period is not fun. You imagine all kinds of things. You go from planning your funeral and writing letters to the kids telling them you love them, to thinking maybe you're fine and wondering, since all your friends and family are sweating out the wait for test results with you, "Will I feel embarrassed after all this fuss if I don't have cancer?"

Then you go back to thinking it probably is cancer. Or maybe not. But it probably is. But it might not be.

And so on.

As the days crawled by for me, I'd go for minutes without thinking about the tests and wondering what the results were, but then I'd remember with a thud. I took deep breaths and tried to relax. I used what I call "the power of positive denial." I told myself that as long as I didn't know for sure, I could enjoy my ignorance. One morning I realized that having cancer is a lot like not having cancer - you're still alive, you're still you.

That was good to know, even before the test results came back.

I sang, and wrote, did a few crosswords, watched a little TV, and laughed with friends. It all worked for a while, then I'd remember that I was waiting.

Finally, on my birthday, the call

"Are you sitting down?" the woman on the phone asked. It did not seem like an auspicious beginning to the conversation.

"Wait," I said, and sat down, ready, I thought, for whatever it was.

She told me I didn't have cancer.

I have to tell you that when I heard the words, "You don't have cancer," embarrassment was the last thing on my mind. I was more like, "Yay, wahoo, whoopee!"

My body relaxed like a rubber band that had been twisted tight, and for the rest of that day and part of the next I walked around feeling loopy. I had a silly grin on my face, even though I did hear the rest of the test results: the cells that were biopsied are indeed whipping up bad craziness. They are almost cancer, but haven't quite gone over to the dark side. They must be removed.

So my summer plans have been simplified: surgery, followed by recuperation from surgery. I'd rather fly to Maui,* but oh well.

The big hitch in the plan is that I don't have medical insurance. I lost that when my husband became ill and couldn't work full time anymore. I had a plan to stay healthy until I was old enough for Medicare, but that has not worked out so well. Before I get to see a doctor I'll be speaking to a financial counselor. Once I've been financially counseled, and fill out several reams of paperwork, I shall be treated. So they tell me.

Right now I'm happy to be alive, and kids, I do love you, even if I do have to send you a notice on Facebook to remind you when it's my birthday.

*Actually, I wouldn't rather fly to Maui, or anywhere. For over three decades I've had a severe fear of flying. But I've been thinking since this biopsy thing came up, what the heck. I might like Maui. So look for gratuitous mentions of flying to Maui in future columns. It's going to be my fallback fantasy this summer.

one. However, if you stick with it, you find fairly soon that it becomes easier. Before long, you won't have so much trouble on those hills and you will realize that you can go anyplace on this island with impunity. This is a truly empowering feeling, not only physically but also to know that you have an option and don't have to depend on gasoline. Ride with friends; working up hills is a lot easier with company. Take your time. If it is too hard, get off and walk. Form a riding group and try to ride once or twice a week.

Alert: biking provides you with a whole new world of ...accessorizing! If you are planning on bringing something home, you will need a way of carrying it. I have plastic bucket panniers that clip on to my bike rack that are really convenient and easy to use. There are all kinds of baskets and panniers. Some folks use a back pack, but I think it is easier to let the bike carry the load. Besides carriers, there are helmets, mirrors, lights, toolkits, dingalings, bikewear (I don't go in for that myself), and god knows what else.

Starting to use your bike in lieu of your car is another stumbling block. Sliding into that comfortable car seat, turning the key, turning on the radio, and cruising to your destination is hard to pass up. Try to start becoming conscious of the amount of money you are spending on gas. Remember those times that your car broke down? Instead of a moving pleasure palace, you now had a one ton pile of you-know-what, and, whatever you were planning on doing was now superceded by the task of getting the car(cass) off the road and to a repair shop? That should help you to start putting things into perspective.

Then, you don't have to completely ake your car. Pick a nice day for your bike expedition. Try out your accessories. Strut into Cafe Luna with your bike helmet and have a good visit with friends (Save that stop at the tavern for when you are a little more seasoned). After you get your moves down and your accessories fine tuned, you can ride in for your errands more often. SPECIAL TIP: The Strawberry Festival is a great time to ride into town. There is something about gliding serenely into town past all those people hiking in with all their gear from far off parking

being the Monster or being connected with the Monster have had their lives destroyed as they and their families suffered from slander, finger pointing, shunning, imprisonment, lost jobs and ruined careers. The sixteen families who lost loved ones have waited for decades hoping that Il Mostro would answer for his crimes and although the police investigated 100,000 Italian men, most without their knowledge, the real killer remains elusive.

In the past decade, Perugia's Monster hunt effectively steamrolled anyone who got in its way. In an unbelievable spectacle of accusations and legal actions more than 20 people found themselves entangled without a shred of evidence. No theory was too outlandish as Mignini, Giuttari and Carlizzi played off of each other. The mutilations became 'obscene wafers for Satanic Rituals.' An actor, writer and tramp were accused of being Il Mostro. The rich and famous were ORR Masterminds. A body was 'switched twice' by the ORR to fool authorities. On May 21, 2008 Mr. Calamandrei was found innocent and "acquitted for the reason that the Allegation is Nonexistent." That means, in Italian Law, that the crime had never occurred and Mignini failed to prove Satanism in court. Six and a half months later he would try again when he prosecuted Amanda and Raffaele for murder and accused them of being Satanists.

But on Oct 31, 2007 Mignini had been indicted for Abuse of Office and was awaiting trial. Calamandrei's trail had just started. He was dealing with Carlizzi by himself. Giuttari was gone, sent back to Rome in shame. And a few powerful locals were not happy about the ORR/wealthy Old Italian family theory he had floated. Mignini's career was on shaky ground and he needed a distraction, a sleight of hand, to shift attention away from himself

November 2, 2007 the distraction arrived in the form of Amanda Knox.

The night before, All Saint's Day, Rudy Guede killed Meredith Kercher in a botched robbery/rape. Meredith's murder is thirteen years to the day when Pietro Pacciani was convicted of being the Monster of Florence. Pacciani was the only person ever convicted of the crime, he was exonerated on appeal and all charges dropped in 1997.

Mignini and Scientific Police Chief Edgardo Giobbi (Giuttari's replacement?) colluded to charge Amanda and Raffaele with Meredith's murder, along with another innocent man, Patrick Lumumba. Mignini theorized Satanist involvement because of the proximity to Halloween and Carlizzi predicted that both girls belonged to the Order of the Red Rose. "One came to murder and one came to be the victim, neither knowing who would fulfill what role," she mysteriously proclaimed.

November 2nd, All Soul's Day, would begin an unending nightmare for three innocent families as their children gave up their lives to murder, vanity and avarice. Meredith dead, Amanda and Raffaele trapped in prison by corruption.

Amanda would bear the brunt of the international hate created by the PM and his henchmen while the official slight of hand deftly scooped up and imprisoned Rudy Guede, conveniently shutting him up with only a rare comment from his lawyer. Guede is the young man who's DNA, fingerprints and shoeprints were all over the crime scene. All over Meredith. In 2010 his 30-year sentence for Meredith's murder was cut to 16-years when he was 'encouraged' by his lawyers to write a letter of apology to the Kercher family for sexually brutalizing their daughter and then slashing her throat when she fought back.

A near perfect description of the 1938 Reefer Madness trailer on Youtube is what Mignini described to the press in 2007 and to the court in 2009. Complete with young adults chain smoking joints, cackling maniacally, crazy dancing, knife welding, unabated sex, wild abandon, why Mignini even created "dialogue" for Meredith and Amanda's fictional catfight to enthrall the court. "All that was missing was the video camera," he said. Actually, I think the video camera in his head is worthy of a few flavorful expletives from a horrified mother. He needs to wash his brain out with soap.



Cooking Chinese with Xiao Ning (Shi-ah-o Ning, said fast)

The joy of cooking this spring has been enhanced by my Chinese daughter-inlaw's eagerness to learn to cook American foods and her willingness to share her Yunnanese style recipes. A field trip to a Chinese market makes her day. So does a trip to Thriftway, though her hometown of Jinghong has several supermarkets now. There you can buy sweet, tender bamboo shoots, lotus roots, pig's feet, and pig's skin and vegetables that have no English

Xiao Ning has taught me that every vegetable side dish needs a little meat in it. She says the meat protein helps you get more good out of the vegetable protein. She tells me Chinese medicine teaches that pig's skin prevents wrinkles. Every Chinese meal begins with a thin soup to prepare our stomachs for solid food.

Chinese cooking is thrifty of ingredients and of heat. Usually, much more kitchen time goes into cutting up vegetables than in actual cooking. Chinese cooks do make long-cooked dishes: Hong Chao Ju Rou, Red Cooked Pork Meat, for instance in which chunks of pork stew with cloves

She regrets she cannot make for us long-stewed pig's foot with daikon, a Japanese root vegetable that has caught

I've taught her a smattering of French, Italian, Creole, Azerbaijani, and other ethnic and regional dishes. Today, I showed her how to make a Mirepoix, the basis of so many French soups. It's just chopped up onion, carrot, and celery, stir-fried in oil. Adding any stock or broth creates a simple soup in itself. For a heartier, main dish soup, add a can of red, black, or white beans, 1/3 to ½ cup Uncle Ben's 10-minute rice, bring to a boil, reduce heat, and cook covered for 10 minutes. Back in China, she can reproduce a near duplicate of this soup by making a Mirepoix, using any cooked beans available and adding a cupful or so of leftover cooked rice.

Xiao Ning loves to harvest handfuls wild fennel for soup and in cooking fish.

Chinese meals most often begin with a soup, and the soup with a home made broth or stock. She asks me, "Mom, do you have bones?" Even bones with no meat left on them have a place in her inventory of possible soup stock materials. They yield magnesium, calcium and other minerals, and a surprising amount of flavor.

Xiao Ning says, "Bones are good for your bah-dee."

XIAO NING'S FENNEL SOUP

4 servings

4 cups any soup broth or stock

2 cups snipped, washed fennel

4 green onions, sliced

1 fresh red ripe tomato, diced

Bring the stock to a boil. Add the remaining ingredients. Bring again to boiling. Reduce heat. Cook 5 minutes. Serve hot as a starter course.

One day Xiao Ning and my daughter, Suzanna, Leigh went to Seattle, shopped at a Chinese grocery, and brought back several big lotus roots. Xiao Ning sliced the lotus and soaked the slices overnight in vinegar water—about 2 Tablespoons of vinegar per quart of water. We found a frozen cooked turkey drumstick and some bits of pork in the freezer. With those plus some chicken stock, several slices of lotus root cut in bite-size pieces, a generous handful of frozen cut green beans, and a little leftover cooked rice, she created a delicious, nutritious soup for lunch for four people.

XIAO NING'S LOTUS ROOT & BEAN

Serves 4 to 6

1 large fresh lotus root, sliced and soaked several hours to a couple of days

2 Tablespoons apple cider vinegar and water to cover

3 cups water

Any meat bones on hand

110-ounce can Campbell's condensed chicken broth

> 1-inch ginger root, minced, optional 1 clove garlic, chopped

Drain the lotus root slices and cut in quarters. Bring all the remaining ingredients to a boil. Reduce heat and cook gently for up to 1 hour. The lotus root will still be crisp like water chestnuts. Add:

1 ½ cups frozen cut green beans or fresh green beans cut in 1 ½-inch lengths

Bring again to a boil. Reduce heat somewhat. Cover. Cook briskly for 10 minutes, but not so briskly that the pan boils over. Add: 1 to 1 ½ cups leftover

Bring the soup to a boil again. Taste and add salt and pepper as desired. Serve hot.

Vinegar soaked lotus root can also be cut in bite size pieces and used in salad as you would water chestnuts, and as Suzanna Leigh does.

And here we are today, waiting patiently (sorta) and praying for fair play. That's all anyone has ever asked for, Fair Play. We are cautiously optimistic as Judge Hellmann's courtroom has been determined and insightful since fall and we applaud the court's efforts to gain access to contested evidence in order to conduct a fair DNA review. Barring any other delays, we will know his ruling in the fall.

The judge is no doubt keeping his eyes upon developments in Italy. A coalition led by The Honorable Rocco Girlanda came before the Italian Parliament on May 20, 2011 with a petition asking authorities to launch an investigation into Public Minister Giuliano Mignini's office. Mr. Girlanda became a supporter of innocence after he began paying visits to Amanda at Capanne prison in his official capacity as the Italian-American liaison.

Obviously the Italian-American liaison was the only one in the chain of command who saw a problem with the Perugian court system wrongfully persecuting innocent university students. Thank you kind sir!

Mr. Girlanda is part of a groundswell that started in Seattle in 2007. More and more people are speaking out for innocence, the press included. In 1991 that was going to be \$80,000; down from \$119,000 at the time of purchase. You remember those days don't you? A five bedroom home in the Greenlake corridor for \$119,000? Note to self. Don't tell unmedicated bi polar mom who holds the purse strings she has to go get some help. She yanked the deal.

I was a homemaker and a student then. The adoption agency required one parent be home full time. Life was going to begin again for my own personal gain when Caity, the youngest, graduated from high school. Creating a home was my art form. C S Lewis said, when you get lost, go back to the last spot where you knew where you were. I would add, but face towards the future. This is like the house we left when we were all home together. But it's on our favorite family spot on the Island. Something new.

Home is where they root for your highest and best. Home is where they know who you were, who you are, and who you can be and love you unconditionally. If you do not have a home, I hope you find one. If you are in charge of creating one, embrace the job with passion. There is no higher calling.

₩e've Go# a Lo# of Kids Tip Your Children's Teachers

Our kids all attend Vashon schools, Chautauqua Elementary. Two are going into first grade next year. Our older two will be in third and fifth grades.

Like many families, we live on Vashon in part because of the schools. The Vashon Island School District provides a great education to children of any family that wants it, plus it's a nice-sized school system with a well-mannered school board, mostly free of creationist agendas or embezzlement scandals

Like most school districts in the State of Washington, our school district is funded primarily by property taxes. Schools are often funded by property taxes because a well-funded and well-run public school system makes an area attractive to families and real estate more valuable, and conversely a poorly-run or poorly-funded school district makes an area less attractive, and property less valuable.

It's like the Wild West of the late 1800's: frontier towns sought families to put down roots, because strong families (of all shapes and sizes) tend to take care of a place, work hard, and create social structures that benefit the whole community, which in turn builds a place where more people want to live. A great school system brings great families, and great families help create great communities.

Because of a speculative housing bubble that burst in early 2008, everyone's property on Vashon is worth less, something like twenty percent less than the peak in early 2008. Because property taxes are based on the assessed value of the property, and property values all have gone down, the only really good part of the real estate debacle is that everyone's property taxes are a little lower in 2011.

The bad part is that because everyone's property tax bill has gone down, plus precipitous drops in new construction fees and sales taxes which also help fund local schools, the school district has a lot less money with which to run the schools.

Lower taxes are a good thing, especially during a recession. Economists say lowering taxes can result in a faster return to prosperity, because more investments are spurred by less taxation, and more investment means more jobs, and more jobs means more spending, and so on

I've talked with a few good friends

in the lower-my-taxes-now crowd who've eyed the school district's budget hungrily, wishing their tax burden weren't so large; well, they've got their wish, in some small way. Our friends often insist that schools don't need all that money and instead simply need to correct their priorities; here's the test of that theory. Vashon schools will have the better part of a million dollars less next year to fund the school system.

But rather than simply tighten belts, face hard facts, cut the fat and run leaner as my friends in the lower-taxes-now club expected would inevitably happen, in fact, it's clear that instead of cutting fat in the district budget, meat and bone will necessarily be cut in the face of such drastic shortfalls of cash.

When my brothers and sisters and I were growing up on Vashon, island parents supported the schools; they stood in the rain holding cardboard signs at the four-way stop uptown asking voters to approve the yearly levies, they got new buildings built, and hired the best teachers they could find to live and teach on the island, and we got a great education.

So now, we're those island parents. Our family supports Vashon schools by being active and engaged school parents, by paying taxes and donating time and money to our island schoolchildren, and holding cardboard signs in the rain asking for financial support of Vashon schools. It's the right thing to do from lots of angles, not the least of which is to help pay back what the families of a generation ago did for us and the community of Vashon

As home owners, this year we'll pay about \$3500 in property taxes. A couple of years ago it used to be higher; and how one counts it is really complicated, but through a series of failures including a massive international real-estate investment scheme that went horribly awry, today our house is worth a lot less, and we pay a lot less property tax to fund our school's operating budget.

To restore the funding that has been lost, we can write a check directly to Vashon School District for ten percent of that \$3500, that's about \$350. It's complicated, but we calculate that's roughly the drop in revenue from the Pottingers that the school district will otherwise do without next year.

If you own your home, and ten percent to make up the difference is too steep for your family this spring, give as you should, as we will. Be sure that you give something. I'm sure our school district would be happy with a couple crisp fivers rather than nothing. Tip your children's teachers.

It's for the kids you see in Thriftway, or washing your car in the parking lot, or your neighbor's kids waiting for the school bus in the morning. It's for our kids, but more importantly it's for Vashon Island. Dig deep.

entering the park runners will turn east onto the trail system known as Valley of the Firs. Everyone will exit the north end of the park and run a short paved section of 115th out to Bank Road.

At this point runners will cross Bank Road and run down the grass shoulder of 115th to the entrance to Fisher Pond Preserve. Runners will then turn west into the Fisher Pond Preserve trail system. Runners will circle the pond (approx. a 1-mile loop), exit the nature preserve, re-cross Bank Road and navigate south back into the Island Center Forest.

Once back in the forest - runners will run the trails west and southwest to the southwest corner of the park where they will then leave the park, down to Cemetery Road. Runners will then cross Cemetery Road, heading south, back to Old Mill Road where they will face the only two way traffic of the event. They will continue south along Old Mill Road south to 220th and then along the

shoulder of 220th back into Paradise County Park's Island Center Forest. Once Ridge park. At this point the 10 milers will finish and the 50k runners will turn and head back out onto the loop.


Yesterday morning [i.e., Sunday May 22nd] we brought our instruments and sound system, our coffee pots and snacks, our Bibles and bulletins, and took time as a family to set up for church, worship the living God together, and take everything back down again. This morning as I read my Bible, I was struck by God's commandments to the Israelites as they prepared to build the Tabernacle - basically a mobile temple made of wood and animal skins. God commanded that the donations for the Tabernacle, the priests' robes, the gold utensils, and the altars be on the basis of "everyone whose heart stirred him and everyone whose spirit moved him" (Exodus 35:21). People needed to give, and craftsmen needed to build, and the skilled women needed to weave and create, but God wanted it all to be done by willing hearts. And God stirred in our hearts yesterday. What a blessing.


VAA Garden Tour offers new event







Chautauqua music teacher Andy James and his Chautauqua student production team have produced a new CD based on West African folk tale, Nana Miriam; the story of a magical girl who saves her people. "...Students thought a lot about the monster. In the real story Nana Miriam smashes the monster against




the rocks, but this wasn't satisfactory for my students," explains James. "So they changed the end of the story, but I'm not giving it away!"

story while showcasing choreography they helped develop this Spring.

The entire performance is the brainchild of Cheryl Krown, Artistic Director of Vashon Dance Academy, who believes the show will be enjoyed by all. "Peter Pan is a wonderful story about growth and trust and friendship, yet sill with enough conflict and excitement that anyone will be entertained."

Co-instructors Julie Gibson and Francois Serre y Berga were instrumental in developing choreography and storylines and in preparing the students. We all have crazy ideas, but we are encouraged to say them anyways. I've learned that it's important to hear everyone out. Last year we said, 'Wouldn't it be cool to make a human staircase!' We all laughed for awhile, and then seriously made a human staircase which was breathtaking – and back cracking! – in

A handful of dancers in this year's show recall performing in the 2004 Peter Pan show. Chloe Zimberg says, "Peter Pan is my favorite story of all time and getting to watch it come together when I was younger and to now have the opportunity to really be a part of that, especially with the role of Peter, is really special and rewarding. A highlight in 2004 was being old enough to pay attention and know the sequence of the show and to know the older girls' dances and to idolize them at the same time. This time around I get be in some of the dances that I absolutely adored when I was in fourth grade. That has been a blast. This year has also really pushed me in

my dancing. The choreography pushes the edge in a lot of places.

"Patience, dedication, hard work, and daring are all major things that I have gotten from dance. Dance has shown me how much is possible. One year we decided to 'build a human tree' and another it was 'build a human staircase'. Never would I have imagined that possible had I not been a dancer."

Co-producer Annette Spencer adds, "A huge part of the show each year is seeing the kids who have been dancing with Cheryl for many years rise through the ranks -- from starting as a creative movement dancer to taking on a principal role. It's really special when you see the kids who were younger in prior years achieve the level of the dancers they always looked up to."

Says Krown, "As a teacher, a personal highlight for me, and there are many, is to see a child grow through this process in confidence from year to year and to be able to watch them be able to embody different characters and to express that character to the audience with such grace. That is what motivates me as a teacher."

Let's Do The Time Warp Again!

Vashon's own Drama Dock is currently in rehearsal to present Richard O'Brien's technically and artistically demanding musical "The Rocky Horror Show" at the VHS Theater.

Most islanders familiar with the show will know it through its 1975 film adaptation of the original 1973 British classic rock musical stage play which premiered at The Royal Court Theatre in London. The film, originally a crashing failure by any movie industry standards, quickly picked up a cult following and has achieved the distinction, 35 years later, of being the longest-running theatrical film release in history and has taken in approximately \$140 million so far at the US box office alone, a stunning accomplishment given its original estimated budget of \$1.2 million. The movie has been playing every weekend at some theaters for more than 35 years

On the surface, the plot line is apparently a sendup of science fiction B-movies. The initial musical number of the show, "Science Fiction/Double Feature", alone mentions such science-fiction classics as "The Day the Earth Stood Still", Flash Gordon, "The Invisible Man", "King Kong", "It Came from Outer Space", "Tarantula", "Day of the Triffids", "When Worlds Collide", and "Forbidden Planet", not to mention many other indirect science-fiction B-movie references. The overall plot line thread itself is clearly a reference to "Frankenstein".

Campy, over-the-top, and literally filled end to end with very catchy rock 'n roll tunes and ballads, potential theatergoers need to be aware that, while very comedic, the show does contain many strong adult themes and a definite portrayal of gay and trans-gender culture, and is considered by many to be a movie symbol of LGBT themes as well as other sexual elements. Though parental guidance is recommended, it should also be noted that as of 2005, the film version of the show has been preserved in the National Film Registry by the Library of Congress for being "culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant". The Vashon production will include all the songs and characters of the original show and movie.

Known to be appearing in the program are Marshall Murray, Stephanie Murray, Stephen Floyd, Lissy Nichols, Bryanna Savelesky, William Wassman, Ari Ashkenazi, Jon Whalen, Arlette Moody, Stephanie Murray, Zoey Rice, and Richard E. Montague. Christopher Overstreet provides projection art, and set design is by Lillian Ripley, who also provides the very demanding costume design for the production. In addition to appearing in the show, Arlette Moody also provides choreography.

Quoting Elizabeth Dinan-Slack, "Both Fridays (July 8 and 15) and Sunday (July 17), the show begins at 7:30 pm. Saturday (July 9) there will be two shows 7:30 pm, and 10 pm, and Saturday, July 16, one show at 10 pm. The 10 pm shows are for you Rocky-o-philes! Those who love to dress up and participate are encouraged to dress up as your favorite character from the movie and feel free to join in with call and responses the film has given birth to... "Say it!" And, of course, get to your feet and dance the Time Warp! Although we can't throw rice and toast in the VHS Theater, there will be soda pop, candy and popcorn available in the lobby." For those unfamiliar with the established culture of Rocky Horror, Ms. Dinan-Slack is referring to long-running traditions of audience participation by fans of the show.

the rest of the story. Their energy is what gives me energy."

Principal Maria Osborne sums up the outcome of all the hard work, "Dance has been absolutely invaluable to me. It's taught me, among other things, a meticulousness and patience that have been key in other aspects of my life. Dance has shown me that hard work and commitment can pay off in enormous ways. It has also brought out a kind of confidence in me that I would have never discovered without it. It has shown me the inevitability of making mistakes, and helped me learn to persevere in the face of setbacks. Dance! Vashon is the producer of the show, providing support for costumes, set, volunteer coordination, tickets, and other production details. Lanier acknowledges the vast help from the community, as well as parents. "Businesses like Granny's Attic are generous with lending us items to use

as props. The receipt programs at Vashon Thriftway and Vashon Market contribute significantly to our scholarship fund, which more and more families rely on.

"We have a tradition that everybody pitches in. We can find some kind of job for anybody, and people always know there is some little piece they can add to make the show happen. In this way we have almost 100 percent family participation in making the show come together. Planning happens six months ahead, and the show would not be possible without the help of everyone pitching in."
