## Road to Resilience

#### Climate Forecast

in the Pacific Northwest are relatively benign compared to most of the rest of the world. According to Cliff Mass, climate scientist at the UW and weekly commentator on KUOW, the increase in water vapor in the atmosphere due to higher average temperature, will mean a predominance of offshore marine air for us here in the Northwest. That means cooler and wetter weather. The only change for the worse might be that the increased rainfall we are expected to get will fall more in shorter, harder rains. That means that it will not be able to percolate into the soil as readily as our lighter rains do now. Another possibility is that we may not be able to maintain adequate snow pack during the summer leading to summer shortfalls. We on Vashon, having a sole source aquifer, supposedly do not access water from

As much of the world is warming and drying out, water will become an

snow pack, so that doesn't affect us.

The predictions for climate change even more precious commodity, and we can expect refugees from areas with more or less permanent drought. Historically dry areas that depend on imported water, such as all the Southwest and most of the state of California are in immediate trouble. The tens of millions living in the Southern California basin are dependent on water from the Colorado River. I expect that the Colorado's waters will be co-opted by its users upstream. Right now, the Colorado is basically gone before it gets to its historic mouth at the top of the Bay of California in Mexico.

The drying up of California has repercussions for us because a great deal of the food we consume comes from irrigated fields in the interior valleys there. For this reason alone, we need to step up our efforts to grow more of our

We know as well that stronger, more destructive weather events can be expected. Again, it appears that we will Continued on Page 10

There are many studios to visit, a few of which are profiled below.

Roxy Hathaway and Nancy Scott Wienker of ReGenr8 (#34 on the brochure) make artful handbags created from found materials. "We use everything we find that we can turn into a beautiful artful handbag." This year a very talented group of friends will join them and be offering items including jewelry, re-surfaced menswear, collaged cards and encaustics, organic skincare and even scented fans! All will be in the Two Door Gallery hallway for the December First Friday.

Mary Hosick (#28 on the brochure) is a potter and a painter. Her colorful still life paintings line the entryway of her comfortable home. The view from her front door is of her kiln shed, a pleasant pavilion where she fires her clay art. Down the stairs into the studio it is all business. Unfired pots line the shelves and souvenir posters from her time studying pottery in China cover the

walls. Mary is a talented artist whose fascinating wares and interesting studio will tempt anyone on the studio tour.

Mike Magrath (#33 on the brochure) is a sculptor and a teacher. His spacious, airy studio is located at the Beall Greenhouses. "We offer classes here in sculpting and drawing, and I do figurative bronze and public art as well as commissions. I'm also a teacher at the Gage Academy in Seattle. There's a large number of people on Vashon who take classes at the Gage and we've been offering some similar classes here. In terms of my own work, I work in clay and bronze and other cast media as well. When people come by they'll see me working on this sculpture of children jumping into a swimming pool."

David Erue and Bobbi Arnold (#4 on the brochure) have very different artistic interests. Bobbi is a felter who describes her colorful and tactile creations with a magnetic passion. Their house is filled with her wearable and displayable handcrafted objects made from many exotic wools and other fibers. If you live on Vashon, you already know Dave's metal art. He made the Giraffe across from Subway downtown as well as many other Vashon landmarks. Dave also teaches classes in welding in his no-frills workshop next to their lovely home. 

## Give Thanks for the Beach and Stars

This Thanksgiving, share a memorable and truly Vashon experience with your loved ones. The day after the big feast day, bring your friends and family to see the wonderful creatures of the Puget Sound shoreline by starlight and flashlight. Vashon Beach Naturalists will be offering a free guided walk along the north end ferry dock beach from 9 to 11pm. The tide will be withdrawing to minus 3.4 feet at 10:45pm, which will expose a broad swath of the lower intertidal zone filled with many species of animals who are uniquely suited to thrive in this environment despite its big waves and moving stones.

The life forms that populate the pilings and beaches are as strange and wonderful as a miniature Jurassic Park. Among the colonies of spiky white acorn barnacles, there may be encroaching armies of soft, speckled half-inch long barnacle-eating dorids, resembling caterpillars but able to penetrate the tiny castles of the barnacles. Clinging to pilings or rocks deep in the intertidal there are knots of white flexible tubes that look like bits of leftover electrical conduit, but these can transform under water into beautiful fans of blue and maroon plumes when the feather duster worms comes out to sift food from the water through their feathery radioles. Along the beach west of the dock, the cobbles increase in size and harbor dozens of species. On top there may be gardens of rockweeds

brown or white scaleworms may rest beside bright orange sea cucumbers, with nearby flattened mauve porcelain crabs, a speckled black clingfish guarding its eggs, and a small black-clawed crab with a bright blue carapace. Red rock crabs the size of an adult's hand can be spotted prowling through the undulating eelgrass in the shallows, while a sharp-eyed beach naturalist may discover evidence of a moon snail just under the sand sneaking up on a buried cockle, one of its favorite meals.

The Vashon Beach Naturalists are volunteers who have undergone a series of classes and field trainings to learn about the intertidal life of Puget Sound. In return, they present walks such as these to

sheltering frilled and channeled dogwinkles, limpets, barnacles, chitons, blue mussels, and/ or jingle shells. Underneath, brown or white scaleworms may rest beside bright orange share what they have learned, and to initiate others into the spell of the mysterious shallows whose many inhabitants are usually only glimpsed from docks or boats.

The Starlight Beach Walk will run from 9 to 11pm on Friday, November 25. We will park in the ferry lot on the hill and meet by the dock. There will be an illuminated canopy with tea and hot chocolate available while we gather and talk about the beach for a few minutes. Then naturalists will guide little groups of participants onto the beach, walking carefully to avoid crushing animals as much as possible. The VBN recommends warm and rainproof clothes, gloves, snug hats, rubber boots, bright flashlights and spare batteries. ## Island Life All Right?

For them that must obey authority That they do not respect in any degree Who despise their jobs, their destinies Speak jealously of them that are free Do what they do just to be Nothing more than something they invest in.

Excerpt from It's Alright, Ma-Bob Dylan

I'm not really sure why it popped into my head as I was contemplating this particular meditation, but it did. At the time of those times of Dylan the Younger, when the other major groundswelling of activism pulsed through my generation, I was living in Leave it to Beaver land, where protest consisted of refusing to eat that liver no matter how "good" it was for me, secretly not wearing my retainers for three nights in a row and faking sleep and exhaustion when the call came down for everyone to get in the station wagon to go to church. I did, however, proudly wear a Cub Scout uniform and march in formation in the Memorial Day parade. On the other hand, the day after one particularly wild Halloween in the neighborhood when I decided to take it upon myself to drag my red wagon around the block to pick up all the shaving cream cans that had been emptied on mailboxes and smaller, weaker goblins by the big kids with bully budgets, I learned that being proactive about the environment was bad, as my mother put it, because doing something about it implied that I had something to do with creating the mess in the first place, and "what would the neighbors think?" In some ways, I've had some unlearning to do.

In spite of those times, Dylan and protest were not a big part of my sixties experience, so I'm not sure why I picked this particular song title to play on my brain loop. I certainly wasn't familiar with the lyrics, except for that one refrain about it being alright. The bleeding part, I'm only bleeding, only appears as a parenthetical addition to the it's alright, ma of the title. It is perhaps



that the reference to blood, combined with the title's overt weight of irony, was what triggered my memory vault while watching the multitude of police state brutalizations being acted out in response to the various Occupy occupations, with Free Speech TV and Democracy Now, at least, doing their best to contradict the late Gil Scott Heron's claim that the revolution will not be televised. It was with a bit of stunned amazement that I read the entire lyric sheet for Dylan's song, and was made still by a shock in the recognition of its stark relevance nearly five decades later. This should have not been such a surprise, as this activist déjà vu has been anything but a singular phenomenon. One of the best examples of this for me was in finally seeing Hearts and Minds a few years back. I had heard about this Oscar winning documentary from 1974 for many

years, but it wasn't till I brought it home and watched it that there was a palpable chill rising in my spine, along with the realization that one needed only to replace references to Vietnam with the names of Iraq or Afghanistan and one wouldn't know for certain whether one was in the Nixon or Bush era. The more it changes, the more it stays the same.

The Occupy movement was still eight years away when the Oscar nominated documentary the Weather Underground was released. This film contained many revelations for me, along with another spine-tingler at the end when Weatherman and student leader Mark Rudd was asked in a contemporary interview what he thought he had accomplished. His look and length of time to answer spoke volumes. Googling him earlier today, it seems that the Occupy clan has given him a brighter perspective on things. In being asked what advice he had for the Occupy movement, Rudd applauded the adherence to non-violence, now regretting his own turn to bombing and destruction. He also lobbied for seeking alliances with politicos, something else he now regretted not doing back then. One can only do one's best to sidestep the irony here as well, since it was a Dylan lyric- "You don't need a weatherman to know which way the wind blows..." that gave the Weather Underground its name. And the last refrain in It's Alright, Ma suggests that Dylan had thoughts of anything but a peaceful means to better ends. As the Occupiers have already noted, the politicos are already owned by the residents of Wall Street, so joining forces with them seems a less than prudent venture. And with the president of these United States just announcing that he is sending troops and advisers to Australia, one can only shake one's head in bewilderment at how history threatens a rerun in the South Pacific, while congress proclaims a pizza to be a vegetable as they puzzle over how a spending limit of \$10 will affect their choice of baubles for the congressional secret Santa gift exchange. If it were me, I would be advising

a move to occupy the MBA programs around the world, as that is where the keys to greed are being cut and handed out. And of course, they/we should occupy the media. And you know, we should dispense with the irony and tell it like it is, which it seems like what this whole Occupy thing is about. It is, after all nowhere near alright, ma- I'm just sayin'.

A few years ago David and Jane Shepherd told me I should look up Susan's column and get in touch. They thought we'd like each other. They knew Susan because their daughter, Laurie Heath, who is one of the world's best photographers, had known and worked with Susan for years.

So I did look Susan up, and read one of her columns and liked it very much and wrote to her to say so. She wrote back, "Let's be friends." We ended up emailing each other almost every day for the last four or five years.

We had a lot in common: both of us had adult sons living at home, and had a grand child who lived with us or had lived with us. We were both writers, and smart asses. We both liked to knit.

She became a good artist in the last couple of years, working with acrylics mostly. I sent her pictures taken here on the island, and she sent me a painting kitchen wall.

I'm a singer, and hey wow, she really liked music. She even included a song I'd recorded in a Christmas mix she made for people last year - or maybe the year before. It kinda runs together.

We called each other FASTOBs, meaning: fat, average, sarcastic, tough old broads. We told each other our sorrows and our joys, we told stories of our lives, we discussed music - man, did she know music! What a memory she had for artists and lyrics.

We talked about our families, past and present. Her love for her family was so much a part of her. It was huge and awesome and solid. She understood my own soft-heartedness toward my own

What can I say? She was funny, and brilliant, and talented, and loving, and I'm going to miss her every day for the rest of my life. I haven't really had a good cry about her passing yet. Knowing me that will come a few weeks down the road. Right now I'm still on auto pilot. I know my friend is gone, but it hasn't sunk in, you know?

It's odd when someone you love who is far away dies. All that has really changed about the relationship is that she's gone to a different far away place a better one, I believe, where she suffers no more of the pain and fear she went through the last few months. What will make her passing real for me is that I will get up in the morning and check my email and there won't be an email from Susan. Every morning. From now on.

Her husband, Micheal, who is another one of the world's greatest photographers, took this picture of Susan in a porch swing with her grand son Ian, last summer. I love this picture because it shows so well who she was, and what she meant to her family.

Spare a prayer or a thought for her husband Micheal (yes, Susan told me, that's how his name is spelled because that's how his mother spelled it when she named him), their sons Sean and Eric, and their grand sons Ian and William. They have to get up every morning and not have her there, and that is so hard. Please send them blessings and peace. Thank you.

Love and appreciate each other, now - you never know.



#### **Turkey Revisited**

This column will reach you a bit too late for presenting ideas for stuffing a turkey, but just in time for ideas on what to do about the leftover meaty carcass.

First, I pick off all the meat bits the Thanksgiving feasters left on it. I freeze them in plastic packets. Then I break the remaining meaty skeleton into at least two or three plastic freezer bags full of turkey parts.

Later I make Turkey and Peas in Cream Sauce, Turkey Tetrazzini, or a Spanish whole meal in a pot called Pote Gallego. My cream sauce is enlivened with chopped green onion and parsley and tarragon. The Turkey Tetrazzini is a Turkey and noodle dish finished off in the oven. I given that one in this column last year

#### TURKEY BROTH

Turkey carcass, or part of it water to cover

- 1 bay leaf broken in bits
- 12 peppercorns or several fresh grinds of pepper
  - 2 teaspoon dried tarragon
  - 2 whole cloves
  - 1 to 2 teaspoons sea salt
  - 1 yellow onion, chopped
  - 1 long carrot, sliced
- 1/3 cup minced fresh parsley or 2 Tablespoons dried parsley

Bring all the ingredients to a boil, reduce the heat and simmer about 2

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hours, or until what meat was left on the bones has fallen off. Store in sterilized jar, tightly capped. Refrigerate. If not used within 4 days, reboil or freeze leaving 1 inch space at top to allow for expansion.

#### POTE GALLEGO

Serves 4 to 6

- 1 15-ounce large white beans
- 1 to 1 1/2 cups diced turkey or hicken meat
  - 1/2 cup diced smoked ham
  - 6 garlic cloves
  - 1 onion, quartered
- 2 cups coarsely shredded cabbage or kale
  - 4 potatoes cut in chunks
  - 3 turnips, diced
  - 1 teaspoon salt

1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon coarse black pepper Water or turkey broth to cover

In a large saucepan or stove-to-casserole, put the above ingredients. Cover with cold water. Bring to a boil. Cover, reduce heat, and simmer gently 30 minutes, adding boiling water as needed to keep the level the same. Taste and adjust seasoning. Before serving stir in:

1 Tablespoon Vinegar + 1 Tablespoon Dlive Oil

Chopped Fresh Parsley or Dried Parsley.

Strain cooking liquid into soup bowls. Garnish with chopped parsley or green onions.

Serve the vegetables, meat, and beans as a second course.

A salad of leafy, green lettuce and diced fresh orange, plus wholegrain bread and butter complete the menu.




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## Positively Speaking

## \$35,000 Worth of Raising Cain and Passing the Buck

I can write it now because nobody cares about this story anymore.

Let's just say I had friend....
This friend drove out to
Point Robinson Park about two
years after it happened, where
it happened, and was happy to
see that the look out bridge was
broken in two and there was
heavy overgrowth all around it.
Metaphorically speaking it looked
like it couldn't happen to anyone
else ever again. It looked like the
moment was closed.

That bridge, that look out spot, is the place where she stopped after a hard week of work and paused to reflect. He had said to her, 'Come take a walk with me.' It seemed slightly less innocent than when he said 'Let's throw the ball around ' and started to throw a football. That moment had seemed slightly less innocent than when he said to her at the Malt Shoppe. 'I have knots in my stomach and I don't think I want to go home.' The week had been filled with more of the vague disenchantments he always shared about how he didn't really care for his wife and off handed comments from him about kissing and condoms. Each time she rebuffed them trying to allow them both their dignity by shadowing with humor. 'I don't ever want there to be a cautiousness between us' he had stated. To that, she ardently and stridently said, 'Look, I'm here to work'. She was, at the time, married and regularly intimate with her husband with whom she was very much in love. But let us also note at the beginning of this story that she did not take care of herself very well, or hold herself in any kind of high regard.

Nonetheless, there on that bridge, my friend suddenly found he had moved behind her and was massaging her back as if it was an appendage of his. You know, that one that can get stiff if a hand touches it.

She froze. "Don't turn around" she thought to herself. Whatever you do, don't turn around". It seemed like hours before he stopped. She has never doubted what would have happened if she'd turned around. She'd been raped when she was eight.

He was waiting for her to protest so he could get her into position. He was going to pull a Herman Cain and a Penn State with a pass completion.

Because they had worked together for years, she gave him the benefit of the doubt. She had been well groomed. Confused and conflicted doesn't even begin to describe what she felt. She



reported it to two of his ranking superiors immediately. And she went out to meet with his wife and him to tell them to stop dragging her into their mess.

By now she felt like someone had put her in a washing machine on spin and kept lifting the lid. What did this have to do with work? How could she have not seen this coming?

Suddenly she was offered a position from the organization in which they both worked. A great position. A position that was going to put her in the position of breaking a gender barrier. And if she didn't want that one, "We've got three others from which you can choose".

Innocent that she was she didn't realize it was hush money. The position was with an organization that had gone through huge turmoil in the previous years. She sorted things out at the local level but then the short men decided she was a threat (she being tall) and after she told one he couldn't kiss her, and another woman she would be better off not having an affair... well the brown stuff hit the fan. She was not at all hushed. Both of those people, by the way, were victims of childhood sexual abuse. It's the gift that keeps on giving if you don't deal with the trauma.

This part is important because when she filed a formal complaint they used a bunch of that stuff against her. That's what they do to victims who complain. They discredit, malign and shut you off at the pass. The larger organization had over three hundred complaints of assault and harassment the year she reported. No one at the top did anything. In fact the biggest sex offender embezzled the money they gave him for therapy. When they found out what did they do? They threw him a beautiful going away reception when he resigned as they asked him to. Why? Because "He's such a nice guy and we really like him" was the response from the regional supervisor. The man had not only sexually assaulted hundreds of women but also all four of his daughters. He was a professor of Hermeneutics and Homiletics.

Please understand Herman Cain really believes he didn't do anything. It's called dissociation. That Sandusky guy really believes it was just horseplay that got out of hand. And they are all really nice guys. That's how they operate

And the women that knew? They're just as bad. In my friend's situation there was one enormous woman whose career was her life and she was eager to label my friend a 'man hating feminist'. Later the men made her the executive of the organization (after the guy who had assaulted my friend and was promoted to supervisor of the region moved of to other parts of the state. Years later the guy's wife was arrested

and convicted for embezzling \$15,000 from a Senior Citizen's Arts Fund).

Two more women reported to this female executive. The same man had raped them both. She stepped down from any decision making process because 'she had a conflict of interest'. No sh\*t Sherlock. The husband of the executive's secretary was the man accused of the rapes. But the real reason was she had no cahones. Is that how they're spelled?

The therapist who headed the investigative committee, did he offer support? No, actually he circulated one woman's documents to the population she served outside of the investigative committee. Shameless. All of it shameless voyeurism.

It's time for men and women to step up to the plate. Take Herman Cain into account.

To those men who fired some men at Penn State, it's a start. Unfortunately we don't know if that was just public pressure or some clear sense of morality and justice.

But you ordinary men have to raise your consciousness. Don't go out in the woods drumming or read 'Iron John' again. That got no one anywhere. Just own up to your own sexual desires. And no ancient feminists, it's not about power to them, it's about sex. Men love to have sex. To men sex is life, not power.

My friend? She spent 15 years being blackballed in the cruelest way possible. They kept telling her 'if you do this, we'll correct all this'. When she would accomplish that task they would move the bar again. They did that for ten years. And then she dropped the rope. She had another degree she could use in early childhood rather than her theology degree.

Five years later one man apologized and to this day is actively seeking to bring her career, her calling back into active service. God bless him.

Her children were irretrievably damaged with a dozen lost years of their lives in the ensuing turmoil. She received no compensation. She gained eighty pounds so she wouldn't be attractive to a man (dumb meaningless solution to 'not the problem'). And nowadays... she's more wary.

If you're a victim, RECOGNIZE, RESIST & REPORT. If you're a man... man up, police yourselves. Call each other to higher ground from childhood. And if you're a woman defending one of these men... stop it.

How does this person I know feel today? For the first time since August 1991, I feel free. I just wish I would have known I could have gotten \$35,000.

escape the worst of that. We do have severe weather that causes flooding and wind damage, but nothing that holds a candle to the more destructive cyclones and hurricanes that others face. We do have an occasional tornado, and I've noticed, for the first time, hurricanes in the Pacific approaching Mexico from the west. I don't know if I've just not noticed them before or if it is something new. I suppose the warmer ocean temperatures could bring hurricanes farther up the coast. It's still a long shot for us.

We need to understand that any change in climate will put a lot of stress on all life forms as they struggle to adapt. The web of life is so complex and finely balanced that the appearance or disappearance of some seemingly insignificant microbe could have huge ramifications; we really can't predict such things.

What can we do to lessen the severity of climate change? Put as little carbon as we can in the atmosphere and sequester as much as we can. We would need to get to 350 ppm of carbon in the atmosphere to support the climate that we know. However, we can't remove the carbon we have already released. Scientists have determined from past events that it has taken

about 1000 years to scrub carbon out of the atmosphere after the inputs have stopped. We are now approaching 500 ppm. The media and our government tell you that we have 20 or 30 years to reduce our output. We don't! We have yet to see the effects of the carbon we have already put in the atmosphere. That carbon is there to stay for many lifetimes ahead, and we will not be returning to the climate we know in less than geologic time. We can lessen the severity by drastically reducing our output right away. Don't expect your government to act on this; their actions thus far have been dismal. The impact on our fossil fuel economy is simply too great to allow our government to take appropriate steps. What the government can't ask of us, we can ask of ourselves. We have the intelligence to see trends into the future and to modify our behavior accordingly. For those of you who are not yet convinced that humans are causing climate change, I suggest that you hold on to your hats because the change that has occurred thus far will continue with or without us. In any case, we can all agree that we don't want a future scenario in which our grandchildren have to ask us: "Why didn't you do something while you had the chance?"







## **Thomas Marriott Performs** December 2nd

Trumpeter Thomas Marriott is one of the most exciting musicians to emerge on the national jazz scene in more than a decade. The seven-time Golden Ear award winner is a skilled instrumentalist, composer and producer, always seeking to expand the boundaries of jazz music in all its forms.

After winning the prestigious Carmine Caruso Jazz Trumpet Competition in 1999, Marriott headed east from Seattle to New York where he gained initial acclaim through his work with Maynard Ferguson's Big Bop Nouveau band. Marriott completed 3 world tours with Ferguson (who called Marriott "a truly great jazz trumpet player"), and then continued to work in New York and on the road with the likes of Rosemary Clooney, Joe Locke, The Tito Puente Orchestra, Brian Lynch, The Chico O'Farrill Orchestra, Eric Reed, Les Brown and the Band of Renown, Kenny Kirkland, Charlie Hunter, Ritchie "Alto Madness" Cole, and many others.

Marriott's diverse interests and skills are reflected in the range and success of his albums. His 2005 release on Origin Records, "Individuation," was named among the top 10 jazz records of 2005 by WBEZ radio, Chicago. 2007's "Both Sides of the Fence" received over 3300 spins nationally, pushing his album into the top ten on jazz radio. The album "Crazy: The Music of Willie Nelson," was released in early 2008 to wide critical acclaim. Jazz Times Magazine declared Marriott a "first-tier trumpet player" with "serious chops and a luxuriant trumpet sound....This album is a kick in the pants."

"Flexicon," released in April of 2009 on Origin Records, also made it into the top-ten on the national jazz radio airplay charts as did 2010's "East-West Trumpet Summit," a collaboration with trumpeter Ray Vega. The album made it all the



way to number one the charts and was featured on NPR's "Morning Edition."




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## **Care Packages Sought** for Fallen Soldier's Platoon
