Islanders responded to the recent opening of Puget Sound Cooperative Credit Union by opening accounts already totaling more than 2 million dollars. Clearly, many of us consider it important that our money be invested exclusively in our community. The Chamber of Commerce is always exhorting us to patronize island businesses so that our dollars continue to circulate amongst islanders and provide livelihoods for more of us right here on Vashon. Wouldn't it be great if we all had an opportunity to make a living without having to commute to the mainland?

Michelle Pratt contends that we have another powerful tool we can use to both promote our local economy and insure that the greatest amount of locally produced goods and services will be available to all: local currency. Say you are currently unemployed, low on cash, but have goods or services you can offer; you can receive or offer goods and services at any time: no need for US dollars or paying interest on vour credit card! As Michelle says:

"At the recent We All Belong event sponsored by Welcome Vashon, my husband Johnnie and I were able to

launch a vision we had brought with us when we moved to the island last year - Life Dollars, an alternative currency that supports a cooperative economy and builds community and resilience. Soon after our arrival on the island from Tacoma we connected with SEEDS, a local nonprofit focused on sustainability. They gave us their green map of Vashon that had 'wishes' radiating from the map of what they envisioned for the island's community that included alternative currency. We knew then it was possible. As we began to know the community more intimately, we saw how many of its members already practiced an 'assets based community' -- sharing resources such as the No Trash Bash Stash, bartering their needs and services, and caring for each other, as exhibited when John Browne was hurt last winter and the community came together to care for his needs. Everyone can contribute, young or old, rich or poor, we all have something of value to offer toward the economic enrichment of this community; and as such can thrive in an assets based paradigm.

# Amanda Knox: **Keep The Faith**

On May 6, 2011, Amanda Knox and Raffaele Sollecito will have spent 1,277 days in prison for a murder they did not commit. One week longer than Meredith Kercher's actual murderer, Rudy Guede.

May 20, 2011 will be an important day in appellate court as Judge Claudio Patrillo Hellman rules on the admissibility of challenged DNA evidence and witnesses. In late March the Roman experts conducting the independent review advised the court that there was "not enough DNA to test" on either the Knife or the Bra Clasp and the clasp was rusted from incorrect storage. We are cautiously optimistic that the judge may consider throwing out both pieces of evidence which would clear the way for Amanda and Raffaele's release.

So our hopes are that Judge Hellman will follow the law and rule fairly.

Two prosecution witnesses were also challenged by the defense. "Toto" Curlatolo, the homeless heroin addict who hangs out in the plaza above the cottage, and Nara Capazelli, a neighbor who lives across the street. Toto described for the court, six times under oath, the night of Halloween with kids in costumes getting into disco buses as he watched Our Kids "watching the cottage" until midnight. Meredith died the next evening on All Saints Day when no buses were running. The defense produced three disco owners who affirmed that no buses ran on November 1, 2007.

Then the Chief of Homicide, Monica Napoleani, "could not be found," she was to testify about interviewing Toto; the judge leveled a fine of 300 lira and compelled her to appear. The absence of Napoleani is significant as she has never missed a day in court and is a key player in Amanda's ordeal. This woman is one of the directors of the Illegal Interrogation and the source of the "cartwheel" legend.

Mrs. Capazelli, the "Ear Witness," is an elderly lady who lives across the street and claimed to hear a scream the night of the murder. When police saw her interview on TV, she was subpoenaed, but never actually interviewed by them. An acoustical test proved that it was impossible to hear a scream through her closed double-paned window. The defense witness, a tow-truck driver, was outside in the general area and never heard

Although this is good news for the defense, we do not trust the Office of Public Minister Giuliano Mignini, as they are adept at manipulating Italy's Laws. Currently he Continued on Page 8

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
# **Care Packages Sought** for Fallen Soldier's Platoon

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
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#### **Island Life** An Outbreak of Truth


I sent an email to a friend the other day. It was in response to the recent Island screening of the film the Economics of Happiness and the panel discussion that followed. As it turned out, I had seen the film a while back and had been underwhelmed by it. In the email though, I had promised I would give it a second viewing at some point. But in there I also said that what we really needed was not so much an outbreak of happiness, but rather an outbreak of truth. Given that the persistence of prevarication seemingly clouds our vision everywhere these days, it seemed that truth should take precedence over happiness. There is, however, an element of verity to Jack Nicholson's often quoted statement as Col. Jessep in A Few Good Men- that being: "You can't handle the truth!" One can see evidence of this in the day to day of things in that certain truths are being made less evident, and that the only people dealing with any sense of real truth in the media are comedians. It is easier to handle the truth when it's funny, even if it isn't. The problem is that laughing at it doesn't make it better or cause it to go away- it just gives you a pass to ignore it.

Another basic truth is that there are some things that just aren't funny. One could make the argument that the folks who have brought us Monty Python and South Park and the National Lampoon, among others, have done their best to tack on the parenthetical "and funny" to the end of the statement, "that's not funny, that's sick." A prime example of this is the Gulf oil disaster, whose one year anniversary we just observed. The South Park boys did their best to take on BP in a three part series recently, but the funniest parts involved the imagined demise of both Justin Bieber and Burning Man. While their doe-eyed portrayal of BP CEO Tony Hayward's attempts at apologizing for the environmental nightmare ("We're sorry") were biting, they were more sick than funny. The truth as it played- and plays- itself out on the water, shore and land was neither happy nor economical, so it simply had to go away. In the worlds of virtual reality and Glenn Beckian logic, this was not a stretch to accomplish- you simply made it so by saying so. If one had been living in a logical world and/or reading the Gulf reports on the website Truthout, or if one considered for a few seconds that both the Star Trek teleporters and Wonkavision are still fictions, one would have had a hard time handling this stated media truth- oil does not sink on water and being of mass and weight cannot disappear. In drinking this particular have dodged from the beginning having is the truth-I can handle it.



to repeatedly say he was sorry by simply bringing Harry Potter's cloak and wand out of the wardrobe a lot earlier with a wave and a wrist flick and a bit of gusher motion-reversing magic.

There was another story that surfaced recently that was potentially devastating in its simplicity. It had to do with author and climber and selfdescribed humanitarian Greg Mortenson. In many ways, the truth that emerges from this tale could match the exposed truths of the Gulf in their devastation of a vision, if nothing else. It is one of those things where, having read his book Three Cups of Tea and visualized through the writings the good work and deeds of building schools and bringing teachers to devastated and impoverished areas of Afghanistan and Pakistan, one feels that hearing, let alone handling, the truth is difficult at best. Pulling the strings of heart and trust are of course the realm of philanthropists and con-men alike. But then there is the side that says, why is this really happening and who has what to gain from it? Mortenson has been creating goodwill and trust for a fraction of the cost of our military operations in the region that are serving to do the complete opposite. He has been accused of extravagance in air travel and using foundation funds to finance promotion of his books. I have not yet read of any mansions or yachts in all of this, which apparently are okay perks as long as you are a high-rolling banker or wall street financier, regardless of who you ripped off to get them. I am willing to give disappearance myth Koolaid, one could Mortenson the benefit of the doubt, but avoid asking why Mr. Hayward couldn't as with any of the rest of this, all I want



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


#### Top 10 Workout Mistakes Mistakes 4-6

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4. 10,000 crunches and counting. Nearly everyone knows what a crunch is even if they've never worked out. This is an unfortunate truth and one to take note of. Attempting to crunch the belly fat away is a waste of time if you compare it to the value one reaps from performing more effective exercises. This act of performing certain exercises to reduce fat in particular areas of the body is called spot reducing. This technique is anything but beneficial and as is often the case, time consuming. Why spend time on inefficient techniques when you could be challenging your midsection with more effective exercises?

**RESOLUTION:** 

Core competencies. If you are concerned about losing belly fat then ditch the crunches, acquire better eating habits, use compound exercises to stimulate fat loss and implement exercises that will build and support the body's foundation. Exercises like the plank, side plank, physio ball exercises like the rollout and ball plank. These exercises will sculpt and support the midsection allowing you to safely perform compound exercises and ultimately keep your spine healthier

5. Unnecessary outsourcing. One of the biggest mistakes often made is outsourcing your exercises to machines. You have every resource you need to complete a fantastic workout in house using your own body weight. Underutilization of body weight exercises often proves to be the weakest link in your workout routine.

#### **RESOLUTION:**

Cash in on your assets. Always incorporate body weight exercises in your workouts. There are countless versions of body weight exercises that



also happen to be compound exercises which we talked about earlier that are most beneficial when it comes down to the nuts and bolts of your workout routine. Squats, lunges, pushups, pullups (regular or assisted), planks and body weight rows should be placed high on your exercise agenda. Not only will these exercises blast away at unwanted body fat and help you to get stronger, they are also confidence builders. With confidence comes empowerment. With empowerment comes desired change.

6. Wasting resources. Just like choosing spot reducing exercises over compound exercises is a waste of valuable time and energy, it is also true for endless hours of cardio. What you will more likely achieve with this mode of exercise is overuse injuries and burnout. The body is so well adapted to preserve itself that it will quickly adjust to constant state exercise and eventually become well suited to use fewer calories to accomplish the same workload.

#### **RESOLUTION:**

Variety is the spice of life. One of the most effective forms of cardiovascular exercise as it relates to burning body fat and improving one's general conditioning is interval training. Next time you plan a cardio session try the following

Warm up 3-5 minutes

Perform 30 seconds of intense work (effort scale of 1-10 performed at 7)

Actively recover 1:00-1:30 (effort scale of 1-10 performed at 3-4)

Repeat 3-7 more times (depending on your conditioning level)

Cool down 5 minutes

Exercise intensity is the key, not duration when it comes to fat loss and conditioning.

Opera Previews: The Magic Flute by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart Sunday, May 01, 2011 2:00 PM

Presented by Norm Hollingshead In late 1791 Mozart needed a "big hit" to pay off some pressing debts. He got it with his Magic Flute, popular from its opening night on September 30. Sadly Mozart did not live to enjoy Magic Flute's profits, dying on December 5, at the age of 35. We will follow Joe to Korea during the occupation and during the Korean War when he volunteered to be a Ranger. He will share his experiences on the front and operating behind enemy lines in North Korea as well as his experiences during four tours in South Vietnam.

We will also hear what it was like to be an assistant Army attaché in the former Soviet Union at the height of the Cold War and about life in Moscow at this time of mistrust between two nations including experiences encountered with the KGB. At that time Joe was one of only 13 US military officers in the Soviet Union who were responsible for observing the capabilities of the Soviet military. We'll hear about things which none of us living in America ever knew.

After retirement from the Army in 1978, Joe became involved in the business world. This led to even more travel and

living in those countries of the world that were emerging from command or planned economies into some form of market economy or that were undergoing major economic difficulties. Again, Joe was able to observe history in the making from a viewpoint that most Americans did not see or appreciate.

is 'assisting' the prosecutors, but by Italian law he not supposed to have anything to do with the appeal, yet he continues to work the system.

On April 20, 2011, CBS News reported that longtime Innocence advocate, Frank Sfarzo, the Perugia Shock blogger who lives and reports from Perugia, was arrested by the police, beaten up and then charged with police abuse. Doug Longhini reported that "The New York based Committee To Protect Journalists (CPJ) wrote a letter to Italy's President Georgio Napolitano expressing concern about the continuing harassment of journalists covering the Knox case in Italy. The Committee complained that journalists had been threaten and harassed by police and prosecutors in Perugia for the past several years; the worst case being Sfarzo's." PM Mignini is trying to silence him with the same tactics he used on Doug Preston and Mario Spezi in 2006. The prosecution is calling Frank 'crazy.' Sound familiar?

I cannot make this stuff up.

For the Knox family it means everything to change the perception of Amanda as the "crazy, murderous slut acting out in a foreign country because she is a spoiled, entitled American." It means everything to tell the truth about the real Amanda, the kind, compassionate, scholarly, fun-loving girl caught up in this tragedy precisely because she was compassionate and kind.

In small communities like Vashon we live 6 Degrees of Separation. (Hey, Kevin!) Close enough to make Amanda's situation relevant to thousands on Vashon, if not the entire Island. Neighbors and friends are wondering: How is Amanda doing? How is her family? Will the court be fair this time? And you are passing those people on the street everyday.

So Amanda is not just 'some girl' sitting in a foreign prison, she is Our Girl. Her family is not 'some family' in another state or another country, they are Our Friends. They are relevant to Vashon.

And they deeply appreciate the Vashon Loop editor, Steven Allen, for giving Amanda a voice in their hometown after the Beachcomber refused. The Loop is a true community newspaper for allowing her story to be told fairly and accurately from her point of view, because Islanders are sick of seeing the sordid and false tabloid trash. And the Loop did not conform to the mainstream media's derogatory, and painful, titling of 'convicted murderer,' instead we were free to describe Amanda honestly: wrongfully convicted, unjustly incarcerated, a victim. An incredibly relevant and precious gift of 11,275 words in seven issues.

Change the words and you change the message. The Loop did that for the Knox family.

"Each time a man stands up for an ideal, or acts to improve the lot of others, or strikes out against injustice, he sends forth a tiny ripple of hope and crossing each other from a million different centers of energy and daring those ripples build a current that can sweep down the mightiest walls of oppression and resistance." - Robert F. "Amanda is one of the most selfless, compassionate people I've ever known. She has been a positive influence in my life since I met her and continues to be one even now. Her optimism, kindness, care for others, and hope for this world will always inspire me. Even now, in complete Amanda-fashion, her letters home are filled with concern for her loved ones instead of complaints about her own plight. The emptiness we feel without her is testament to the type of person she

I miss you Amanda. Seattle is even more gray without you here. - Madison Paxton, a friend who moved to Perugia in 2010 to help Amanda's family care for her, AmandaDefenseFund.org.

"Meredith Kercher was murdered in Perugia Italy, November 1st, 2007. Investigators were aware early on that there was no evidence at the crime scene to suggest that Amanda Knox and Raffaele Sollecito were present at the time of Meredith Kercher's murder. They were also aware of

the fact that the lead prosecutor on the case, Guiliano Mignini, was telling them the two were involved. With this in mind, they would try desperately to find incriminating evidence to satisfy Mignini's request. This approach led to a rush to judgment long before a single piece of evidence was tested and more importantly before the real killer, Rudy Guede, had even appeared on their radar." – Bruce Fisher, moderator. InjusticeInPerguia. org, author of "Injustice in Perugia."

"None of the pieces taken from the crime scene pointed to Knox or her exboyfriend, Raffaele Sollecito - the evidence all pointed to Rudy Guede. Guede's DNA was everywhere, in the victim's room and on her body. Guede has been convicted of murder, but why they persisted in still charging and convicting Knox and Sollecito, I don't know. It's a pretty simple story, if they waited for the DNA first, they would have solved this quickly without any kind of mess." - Dr. Greg Hampikian, Boise State University, Director of the Idaho Innocence Project.

"The more I investigated, the more I realized that Amanda Knox and Raffaele Sollecito could not have had anything to do with the murder of Meredith Kercher. Moreover, one reason that they were falsely convicted was that every rule of a good investigation was violated." - Steve Moore FBI (ret), Special Agent and Supervisory Special Agent.

"If they are innocent, then how did they get convicted? Amanda and Raffaele were detained and held without charge before the forensic evidence came back implicating Rudy Guede. The day of their arrest the police paraded them through the old town with lights on and horns blaring. By the time Guede was becoming a suspect, a major figure in the Rome police department had put Ms. Knox's picture in the hallway, right next to the arrest of Bernardo Provenzano. I think it is a case where the police and Public Minister Mignini had made a bold claim about Knox and Sollecito's involvement and could not back down." - Christopher Halkides, University of North Carolina at Wilmington, Associate professor of chemistry and biochemistry, "View From Wilmington," blogspot.

"The Massei Motivation is important evidence. Very poor evidence against Amanda and Raffaele, but very telling evidence against Giuliano Mignini and the judges that made this decision. As we analyze it, we see a pattern of contortions that go well beyond bad judgment calls or mere incompetence. Instead we see sign after sign of willful and deliberate twisting to achieve a desired result. It is a critical fact for the understanding of this trial that guilt was preordained; the evidence was an afterthought." - Mark Waterbury, PhD, Science Spheres, author of "Monster of Perugia, the Framing of Amanda Knox."

"Despite Mignini's having been convicted of abuse of office for his Monster of Florence activities, he's still being allowed to participate in Amanda's appeal, a most-unusual occurrence since appeals are supposed to be do-overs. Even Amanda Knox's lawyers have not escaped Mignini and the Perugia police's legal wrath, nor have her parents, who are being sued for slander. The father and sister of Raffaele Sollecito, her co-defendant, are also being brought to court for leaking a crime scene video-despite the many, many leaks from police and prosecutors during the so-called trial of the century." - Candace Dempsey, Seattle PI, author of "Murder in Italy."

"This is going to make you laugh. Guess who the prosecution, now, thinks to be involved with the crime? Me. It's no surprise. It's perfectly consistent with everything else. The great psychologists who thought that a girl first watches Amelie and then goes and kills her housemate must of course think that the one who writes about a crime is the criminal. Five cops, then, reported to have been beaten by me and they proved it with a medical certificate. Will the great judges be fooled again by a couple of cops and a piece of paper? Of course. It's their specialty! This is the local mind. Have you all now figured out

#### The Blessed Bean

Meeting an entrepreneur friend recently, I asked her, "How's

"Slow," she said, "but we're still eating beans."

Bless the bean, so thrifty yet adaptable to a thousand different, delicious recipes. I could write a whole book of bean recipes, and did decades ago. Unfortunately "Beans, Rices, and Pastas" is out of print now. Shucks, I could write a book just on bean soups. Leaving room for other news and columns in The Loop, I'll content myself with including just a few in this issue.

Here's a slow-cooked dish for the vegans among us. I make the standard serving size, four, It serves John L. and me twice, with a few spoonfuls left over for the subsequent minestrone, and can be frozen.

#### LIMA & BROWN RICE **CASSEROLE**

Prep and cook: About 2 hours

4 servings

½ cup dry large lima beans, sprouted, or at least soaked overnight

½ to 1 medium yellow onion, chopped

2 Tablespoons canola or olive oil

- 1 clove garlic, copped
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- ½ teaspoon dried thyme
- 1 teaspoon dried savory
- 1 teaspoon minced fresh ginger
- ½ cup brown rice
- 1 large potato, peeled and quartered
- 1 teaspoon salt and several dashes pepper, or to taste

Water or vegetable broth to cover.

To sprout beans, soak them overnight starting in warm water. Drain and let breathe. Every few hours, give them a rinse and drain again. They will stick little white tails out after 18 to 24 hours in spring and summer. Sprouting increases their Vitamin E and cuts their cooking

Stirfry the onion, garlic and herbs briefly in the oil, until onion is glossy. Add rice and potato. Add salt and pepper. Add broth. Bring to a low bowl. Reduce heat and simmer until beans, rice, and potato are fork-tender.

#### **MINESTRONE**

Prep time: 15 minutes Cooking time: 15 minutes Servings: 4

Combine in 6-cup saucepan:

1 cup or more leftover Lima & Brown Rice Casserole or 1 cup cooked beans of

1 large or 3 small potatoes diced small

3 carrots, chopped

1 quart vegetable broth, chicken broth or consommé

Water to desired consistency

Another favorite, very easy bean dish:

#### THREE BEAN BAKE

6 servings

½ cup chopped onion

1 carrot, grated

½ cup water

2 Tablespoons minced fresh parsley or 2 teaspoons dried parsley

- 1 15-ounce can pinto beans
- 1 15-ounce can large white beans
- 1 15-ounce can red or pink kidney
- 2 Tablespoons molasses
- 1 teaspoon dried marjoram
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin or coriander

In a small saucepan or skillet, pre-cook the onion until transparent. Combine in a baking dish with all the other ingredients. Bake at 300 to 350 degrees for 25 minutes, or slow-bake at 275 degrees for an hour or two, occasionally stirring down the crust that forms on top.

Salad suggestions: Ranch dressing goes well with any of these.

PEAR AND CHEESE: Lettuce, diced pear dipped in salted water to prevent browning, and sprinkles of crumbled blue cheese and dried cranberries. Lay a base or torn lettuce. Drain the pear pieces and add. Garnish with blue cheese and

Or maybe it was a social cause. You had the vision. You had the energy and darned if you could get anyone to listen

Or maybe it was about health issues. You wanted to gather together some people to work on improving their health and it just didn't work.

We're surrounded by success and growth all the time on this little Island. We beat a huge multi national corporation at their own game with the help of die hards and a good recession.

Hundreds have cleaned out their bodies with gluten free anything and more vegetables on their plates than other stuff.

Our schools thrive despite cut backs because people go back and dig deep.

We haven't planted a white cross on the highway for a teenager in years because enough parents said enough kids have died.

But just as strong are the things that haven't worked. Good ideas that couldn't find an audience. Or things that took a whole lot of time. Everything in the above list that succeeded took a lot of time and patience to build.

There's one thing I think the Island is getting better and better at. We are calling people into the truth of their own stories. Nowadays one doesn't have to have a cataclysmic event to get people to rally around. Daily people are finding help and support for their everyday lives.

We are becoming more and more willing to be engaged with those popular culture calls the disenfranchised. While there are certainly still people who rely on the strength of pretend to construct life or their story into whatever they wish it was and spin it that way, there are a steady stream of people who have healed on this Island by confronting their story the way it is and living through it. It's inspiring.

There is more and more transparency. There is more and more encouragement.

But here's the caveat. In this kind of victory, there is always a period of unfruitfulness as kind of a pendulum swing. So may I say to those who gave their best and had it thrown in their faces in a most ungrateful manner, stay the source.

There are four holidays that cross the time zone of deadline to deadline during this issue: Passover, Easter, Holocaust Observance day (May 1st), and Mother's



Day. Each of those holidays could be celebrated for the victory of endurance and steadfastness and seen in the eyes of success and celebration. At the core of each of those holidays, however, the stories that make up 'success' are ones of redemption. People who were willing to give their lives that others might live redeemed a situation that could have gone south.

I have a lot of friends rooting for me right now. They see some pretty adventurous doors swinging open and it's fun to dream about being on the other side of those accomplishments as I work towards them. To ensure I don't get caught up in the strength of pretend, I repeatedly ask myself "What am I willing to lay down my life for?" My children? Certainly. My needs have always come second to them even it is caused unbearable heartache. My faith? Would I risk my life for my faith? Well...actually that one has already been tested and the answer is 'yes', life and livelihood. My Jewish friends and relatives? Yes, everyday I remind myself that I must be willing to do that or I can't have a friendship with them. A cause? Like child advocacy? Of course.

We have people who have been willing to go to jail for what they believe on this Island. We have people who have been willing to suffer scorn and mocking from other Islanders for a cause or in service to them.

We've still a ways to go. The business of tagging is still all too prevalent. You know, where someone is pegged like they were a character from central casting and no one lets them evolve or drops the tag so they can really get to know them. And we still get caught up in a bit of pretentiousness every once in a while. But the more we develop avenues for sharing from our hearts, the more that dissipates.

If you find yourself trying to impress someone or worrying about what others think, drop it. It's the slippery slope of the strength of pretend.

We are in the season of holidays that are very real. Let real happen to you. It's truly a wonderful way to live.

infrastructure for what already exists to a great extent here – community and caring, resourceful, skilled people. In these times, we already know the importance of strengthening our local economy both for resilience and for the future of our community, both local and global. Life Dollars is already flourishing in the nearby communities of Bellingham and Port Townsend; and has recently been launched in Graham, Tacoma, and Lakewood. Its founder, Francis Ayley of Fourth Corner Exchange, is also bringing it to parts of Europe. His vision is to go global. Our vision is to start with our own community, Vashon.

"We couldn't have had a more appropriate forum, thanks to Dan Kauffman and friends' vision -- We All Belong; as well as the resilience movement driven by Transition Vashon, The Backbone Campaign, The Loop and others. As members of Sustainable Tacoma Pierce, a local organization whose resilience work is based primarily on Permaculture principles, we first learned of Life Dollars and became committed to establishing it in the greater Puget Sound. 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# Men Who Don't Work

Andrew Franks and Alexander Atkins have been making movies together for more than a decade. They planned their first film in the hallways of McMurray, and by high school they were utilizing the talents of their teachers and showing their films at the Vashon Theater. The enthusiasm that the island showed for their passion motivated them both to pursue filmmaking in college. Now, they have reunited in Portland, OR, and have set out to create their most ambitious and promising short film to date, "Men Who Don't Work".

Adapted from Raymond Carver's short story, What Do You Do In San Francisco?, it tells the tale of postman who develops a strange concern for a family that moves into a house on his route. Both challenging and cinematic, this film's major strength, much like Carver's writing, will be its authentic and minimalist look at the intricacies of

day to day life.

Set to be shot the last week of May, Alex and Andrew have already assembled the majority of a talented and entirely volunteer cast and crew. Much like Vashon, Portland's arts-oriented, volunteer-driven community will allow them to produce a high quality, festivalworthy short film for a fraction of what it might cost to make elsewhere. To raise the funds necessary to do Carver's words justice, they have turned to Kickstarter. com, the largest funding platform for creative projects in the world. ### The Mark Growden Trio

"I grew up in an old logging town, less than a hundred people, on the Sierra Nevada/Cascade Divide," says musician Mark Growden. Lose Me in the Sand is a tribute to Growden's rural mountain roots. His latest album is also a hats-off to the roughshod beginnings of American music and the spirit that music represents. Growden chose the banjo as the primary instrument for Lose Me in the Sand for both its timbre and history. An African-American instrument that made its way into minstrel shows and Appalachian folk music, the banjo resonates in our collective consciousness with the memory of poverty, oppression, resilience, and fortitude. "I'm aware of the choice of these songs and the era we're living in," says Growden. "Lose Me in the Sand is a banjo album. It's about humility."

Rehearsed and recorded in live studio sessions in Tucson, Arizona, Lose Me in the Sand is intentionally infused with the desert's eternal expanse. Its sparse arrangements are steeped in the enduring qualities of patience, surrender and acceptance. Lose Me in the Sand is Growden's second place-based album with Porto Franco Records engineered by Oz Fritz (whose resume includes Tom Waits and Caetano Veloso). It follows on the heels of his Oakland recording of Saint Judas, a bold and highly praised exploration of universal love and redemption.

Growden's musical influences are broad. His parents relied on Motown vinyl to rock him to sleep as a baby. Growing up, he sang in his father's church, played saxophone in elementary, middle and high school bands and discovered death rock and

the alternative music scene as a teen. These days Growden listens to contemporary classical and jazz music and Alan Lomax field recordings. But, the underlying quality heard in his music has roots elsewhere. "I grew up with a lot of alone time - in the woods and wilderness - with coyotes, trumpeter swans, geese, deer and antelope," says Growden. His music moves with a natural flow reminiscent of the patterned

hushes in bird trills and blowing winds.

Lose Me in the Sand croons, howls, stutters,

laughs, and runs, but always around a

central stillness. Growden uses music to

carve out silences most of us don't pause

"My vision is to inspire people," says Growden. "Making music with people is an incredibly powerful feeling....seeing people open up.... that's important to me," Growden says. "Music's been my best friend. When I've been down, it's a salve. It's been an amazing blessing in my life. I'm really grateful, and I have to share that with other people. It's just what I'm here to do."





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# Vashon Artist's Open Studio



I've long appreciated the reliable history of the Vashon Artist Studio Tours... always the first two full weekends of both December and May. I have come to set my studio's seasonal clock by that schedule. Its logic is simple and useful for me who's bells often become gifts for either the winter holidays or Mother's day, That schedule is one of the reasons I have participated for so many years, but I wondered how some other artists on the tour felt about those rhythms... and why they become regulars.

I think most artists on the tour would agree that the process of inviting folk into the work spaces we more usually occupy in solitude becomes an important teach / learning experience. We obviously want to share, promote... and sell... our work. We thus teach through our craft and technique... AND we look forward to learning in turn from everyone accepting our invitation... purchasing patron or not, your feedback helps complete the cycle of communication which art is about.

To explore the back lanes of our Island in the bloom of spring is an opportunity in itself. Then to be invited to explore behind the fences and gates, into the newly aired and tidied-up working spaces of such a wide variety of creative Islanders allows you to co-create the excursion in your own flavor. It is doubtful you will be able to cover it all.

One way to start might be to find a "neighborhood" of studios, like ours here on Dilworth Point with three artists sharing paintings, jewelry, garden sculpture and small wearable bells. The driveway to Steve Zartman's metal working studio is indeed next door to Kristen Reitz-Green's small carefully handmade pentagonal studio full with large paintings.

Steve was surprised one year to see a large bus, chartered for the excursion by a group from the city, moving up the single lane drive without first checking to see if there was room to turn that rig around! Somehow they managed, and while he appreciated the business from such a crowd, I suspect there was some cost to his landscaping! He is, like many of us, a gardener. His garden sculpture is designed to enhance such living spaces, while his jewelry works on a more intimate scale.

Before moving to the Island five years ago, Kristen was a professional musician, playing & teaching the French Horn. Now she's made a huge leap into boldly painting oils on canvases -- ranging from the small studies, which become her bread and butter sales, to richly colored large images of food [...think 4 foot bowls of Fruit Loops or a huge glistening closeup of a succulent sandwich!] That she began her first study of painting with Pam Ingalls is obvious, yet that she has moved [with even more obvious individuation] gracefully into her own style in just a few years is impressive. She raises chickens & paints them alongside sensitive studies of children. One year when she had an excessive gaggle of roosters she gave several away to studio visitors... unpredictable opportunities abound on this tour!

Because I love and collect eggs, even making some myself, I'm pleased that the calendar this year makes for a late Easter so that Emily Pruiksma's Ukranian decorated eggs will be quite in season! We share the use of wax in our work, although the hard wax I use to make the models for my lost-wax cast bells is of quite a different nature from the bee's wax used to make the hand dipped & often sculpted candles made by Fiddle Home Studio, Additionally the technique of decorating blown egg shells involves wax to develop the complex traditionally geometric patterns of a culture celebrating the spring holiday even more than the winter.

Emily's studio is a quintessential Island experiment & experience... bringing the cycle of living & working with nature closer to completion. They keep bees, using the wax produced to add with other, sometimes also local, sources of their organic raw material. Bees are a currently newsworthy important part of our ecology, so the cows which pose on this farm for the cameras of studio visitors & the window looking from the yurt into the chicken coop, dubbed the "chicken TV" to occupy younger visitors all necessarily depend on the crosspolination of species, including artists!

# Mike Dumovich SR & JR Perform at Red Bicycle



.. by Brian J. Barr, Freelance Writer (No Depression, Harp, Seattle Stranger): "A few years back, Mike Dumovich played an entrancing set opening for Jesse Sykes & the Sweet Hereafter. Slouched over his guitar, grinning sheepishly from under his ball cap, his notes rang as clear and as true as anything I'd heard since laying ears on John Fahey many moons ago. Since then, I've been anxious for this impending full-length. Mesojunarian reflects the plaintive picking and singing he's known for, but also brings to light his remarkably original songwriting approach. Structured around razorsharp fingerplucks rather than chords, Dumovich's lyrics often draw a chilly parallel between geography, weather, and human emotions, a condition we Northwesterners are well familiar with. Joined by Seattle's genius violinists Eyvind Kang and Anne Marie Ruljancich, Dumovich is given the damp atmospherics his words require: words that are barely sung. Instead, he melodically speaks quite matter-of-factly about 10,000 storms over 10 counties (Warm Territories), discarded engines and one dead bee (Wasps of Rain), and how Saturdays the third in a long series of planets that have been burned (5 Dollars). Mike is deeply thoughtful in the Nick Drake/Townes Van Zandt tradition. However, with producer Tucker Martine at the knobs, Dumovich shows he can also craft a catchy rock tune, such as Sand and Swallow, which borders on the Long Winters more somber moments. With Mesojunarian, we finally have a recorded document of one of Seattle's most treasured songwriters."

Says Brian J Barr with Seattle Weekly: Dumovich sings pensive songs, delivering them in a matter-of-fact voice and radiant guitar plucking that can put you in a trance. His lyrics are weighted down with chilly imagery and a very Pacific Northwest gloominess. Dumovich is an idiosyncratic character whose music and personality cannot be neatly boxed up—which is to say, he's a true artist in

a music scene full of phonies.

Joining Mike Dumovich Jr. on this double bill is none other than his father, Mike Dumovich Sr. in a rare appearance together. Both Mike's blew away the crowd in last December's "John Browne Appreciation Night" with Mike Sr. playing a slide guitar tune that brought everyone to their feet with a standing ovation.

Mike Dumovich Sr. began performing in 1964, playing washtub Bass at Olympia's Null Set Coffee House behind such NW legends as Barefoot John Hendericks. Influenced by the live acoustic players such as John Browne and Gene Jaleski, and the recordings of Leadbelly, John Fahey and Robert Johnson, Dumovich teamed up with Dan "Mudcat" McKinstry doing blues in the NW college and Coffee House Circuit.

After moving to Vashon in the 70's, The Islander Bar manager, Doug Royce, hired Dumovich on for a weekend single. Mike unretired his bass the next night and with Jack Cook (Of Jack Cook and The Phantoms of Soul) formed the first Hokum Blues Band. Thru the 70's Dumovich and Royce were joined by Mindy Manley and Bob Hayworth for a couple of months and later The New Hockum Blues Band included Dumovich, Royce, Dan McKinstry and Bambi Smith culminating in a wonderful live KRAB Radio recording at Folk/Life.

As a single, Dumovich Sr. has played Coffee Houses, Bars (some sleazy) Folklife and Bumbershoot. Credits include NW Choreographers and Musicians performances in the Opera House during Bumbershoot. His song Billy's Rag was used by a KOMO TV production of the artistic contributions of Billy Sandiford. Upon retirement, at 68, Dumovich produced his first CD and original DVD. Another CD and two DVD's are in the works.
