On the face of it, all seems right with the world. A person should not go speeding through a school zone even if "speeding" is a 6-mph medium jog over the speed limit. (I do have to admit that my perverse, reflexively rebellious side wishes I had gotten more speeding value for my lawbreaking dollar.) Selfrighteous people everywhere, rejoice. And, my personal \$200 financial tragedy aside, the problem of people speeding through school zones is evidently epidemic because I share my fate with some 6,000 other folk similarly nailed in recent weeks.

Water District 19 Commission Proposes New Master Policy Resolution

The Water District 19 Commissioners. staff and lawyers have been working for 3 years to consolidate a multitude of policy resolutions into one master resolution governing the District's operating policies. Advised by the District's lawyers to do so, the Commission has recently completed the consolidation after the review of nearly 1200 resolutions dating back to 1925. The forty page draft master resolution is available for public review at the Vashon public library, at the District Office, and on line at www.water19. com. The Commission plans to vote on acceptance of the master resolution at the District's next regularly-scheduled meeting, January 8, 2013.

"We didn't intend the review process to result in any notable policy changes," said Commission President Steve Haworth. "We simply wanted to review our spate of resolutions, issued over many decades; to be sure we eliminated any possible contradictions, removed obsolete resolutions, and clarified our rules and regulations into one accessible document."

The new mater resolution contains only two minor changes in policy that were suggested in the process of reviewing old resolutions. These changes

1)Waiting List Policy: When the District offers a water service connection to people on the waiting list for new water, they have 30 days to respond affirmatively and 120 days to pay the new connection fee. Otherwise they will be eliminated from the waiting list. This is intended to facilitate people on the list to get connections in an expeditious manner. [Article III, paragraph iv (a)]

2) New Service Connection — Residential: Out-buildings on a property

During this time we took pictures of valuables and tried to comfort a woman who's Son just passed.

After being in the home with Dorothy only two hours a person from the Island Funeral Service showed up and told my wife and I we needed to leave the property immediately or the police would be called. I asked the representitive to call the police as we were at the home by request of Steve's mother. We did go outside the dwelling and waited for Mrs. Saul to come out, but left after a while so as not to cause any discomfort for Dorothy.

Once we were out of the home, the Island Funeral Service representative began telling Dorothy that my wife and I were KNOWN thieves and were only there to "rob her blind". She told Dorothy that I had a long and publicly known history of theft, drugs and violence. Dorothy called me immediately to inform me of what was said, I immediately called the owner of the Funeral Service to discuss this, and how it would be dealt with.

While I know that the rumor

chain is "just part of island life" it is my intention here to share what sort of damage can be done by rumor telling people who seem to do this as a way of making their miserable little lives less painful. Unfortunately the victim here was this poor woman who just lost her son. I on the other hand know the truth, and have nothing to hide.

As a side note, I am trying to work with the Island Chamber to put together a benefit concert which would donate ALL proceeds to Wolf Town. One of the chamber personnel pulled me aside last week and told me that the same sort of rumor was told to them as well. I guess my question is simple.....when will these bored and possibly less than intelligent folks figure out that these are all lies? Do I need to publish my criminal record to prove that I am not what the rumors include, or should I just let these poor unfortunate souls have something to make them feel better about themselves? It might just be the only thing which gives them happiness.

In short I would ask (once again) why people tolerate this habitual and sophomoric habit which runs rampant in our community. Don't people ever think about the ramifications like in this case where a vendetta was played out at the worst time possible for the grieving?

I did ask the owner of this business to get involved, and suggested that legal action may well result should a resolution not quickly come to light, the only resolution I can think of is that the offending party be terminated from their job, and a public apology be given to this person who was victimized.

Voice of Vashon has been broadcasting the Vashon High School Pirates baseball, football, and basketball games live this year. Kevin Linnell and John Yates are announcing the basketball games this winter.

Kevin Linnell, who handles color commentary, says "I had been talking with John Yates about doing broadcast of Vashon sports events for seven years." We travelled to state tournaments to watch Vashon teams play and many small communities were broadcasting the games to their hometowns. We thought why not do this for Vashon." This past summer they got their chance when VHS varsity football coach Andy Sears asked if they would be interested in announcing fall games. Kevin recalls "We said yes right away because we really wanted to do this to generate community support for our local sports teams."

John Yates, who does play-by-play, is very enthusiastic about the broadcasts and has a personal interest because his son Sam plays on the varsity football team this year. Yates credits many individuals at Voice of Vashon for making the live broadcasts possible. "Dan Schueler has really put a ton of effort to make the technical side work for us. And Michael Golen-Johnson is invaluable back at the station to make the live feeds available on Voice of Vashon's web radio station. Michael also adds to the commentary by asking us key questions about what's happening on the court." Yates, who is owner of Vashon True Value, and Linnell, who is the general manager, felt so strongly about announcing the games for the community they even purchased their own broadcast-quality headsets.

Preben Martin, who grew up on Vashon Island and is sports broadcast director with ESPN since 1997, was instrumental in creating a team of volunteers to make the live broadcasts possible. Preben had imagined bringing his professional sports broadcasting expertise to Island sports and mentioned his idea to Voice of Vashon. A meeting ensued that led to baseball, football and basketball games being streamed live at www.VoiceOfVashon.org. The first games to be broadcast were high school baseball games last summer with Jeff Hoyt and Lance Morgan announcing.

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Island Life An Unexpected Journey

It seems that one is constantly being reminded of the life paradox that the more you know, the more you seemingly don't know. I, for instance, had no idea that I was to blame for the economic woes at the Vashon Park District (VPD) until I attended the latest (at this writing) meeting at Ober Park. But it wasn't just me, but all of you share the blame as well, except for the average of two people that used to attend these meetings before all heck broke loose. In a long soliloquy voiced by board chairman Bill Ameling

(and posted here on YouTube: http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=sNyIN3d-WD0), the implication, or aspersion, that I grasped as a takeaway from this was that we were all to blame for VPD's problems because we hadn't shown up to keep an eye on what was transpiring there, even though many of us had indeed voted these board members into their positions, trusting they would do the right thing with our property tax monies and our faith in their abilities.

As it is, my combined takeaway from the four meetings I've attended since this all blew up is that even if I had been showing up previously, the board would have not listened to anything I might have said regarding the fields project, as they don't seem to listen to any of the well meaning attendees that now populate these meetings. That being said, I decided to do my own fields survey to try and understand at least some of what was going on.

First, I drove to the new VES field which is at the center of this controversy. It was surrounded by chain link fence, and the only apparent entrance was spanned by a chain and padlock. I did not go in. I then travelled to Agren Park, where a sign at the edge of the field indicated the space was closed to any activity because of adverse weather-related conditions. I then went to what many refer to as the horse park on Paradise Ridge. There was a new cover on the arena that I hadn't seen before, and a wide flat area that seemed like it could have been considered a candidate for at least one sports field. From there I went down to the skate part, or B.A.R.C., and found a large, flat space that seemed like it could have accommodated at least two play fields with minimal grading, in spite of the fact that the artist's rendition posted there indicating future park plans showed a paved, outdoor skating oval and a topographic feature designated as a "knoll", both potentially occupying this space in concept. I then drove to the LDS Church, because at the parks meeting I learned for the first time, as did many others judging by the overall reaction, that VPD had made an arrangement with the church to maintain and use their baseball field while the new fields were being constructed. I did not know that this field even existed, but the two deer I interrupted during my brief visit there obviously knew it well, and stared me down from either end of the field until I left, as if I had barged in on some private frisbee toss they had been enjoying prior to my entrance.

From there I paid a visit to the Parks office and Susan McCabe, who to my mind is the voice of reason in all of this-it's too bad she is leaving. She labeled the current situation a perfect storm of economic poo-poo, which I felt said it as well as anything I've heard. Part of my confusion in all of this has been a search for

the why, as in: why was this project even considered a good idea in the first place? To this she answered with rough numbers: 400 soccer players, 200-300 baseball players, 150 lacrosse players. Between the leagues and the schools, the fields were getting beaten to the point that they were becoming unusable. She also said that if I were looking for some kind of nefarious (my word) motivation behind the fields project I wouldn't find one. She said that it was her impression that the intent behind the creation of this fields complex was as a gift to the community and the future, as well as to accommodate the increasing need for more fields.

From there I went shopping for windshield wiper blades, which in retrospect contained an irony of sorts, as the stop wound up enhancing the clarity of more than one view. As it turned out, a friend there had read my last column and let on that he was a soccer coach. He said that while it was funky and at times sporting some pot holes possibly left by digging dogs, the old fields at the new fields location were quite useable, if not necessarily perfect. He also said that it used to be policy that when it rained and the fields got too wet they would practice in the gym. This cut way down on the destruction of the fields. He did mention that over the last three years, a relaxing of the indoor practice policy may have led to greater field wear during wet times. The word from Susan McCabe was that the indoor practice policy is still in effect, and to reduce wear and tear on walls and bleachers, a milder form of soccer known as Futsal is played for indoor practice. My coach friend did say that there had been no loud and extensive clamor for new and better fields by the coaches, that he recalled. The coaches and players are however quite pleased with what they have seen of the new facility. He did mention that he remembered hearing one loud voice advocating from early on in this mess for the new fields, and that voice belonged to David Hackett.

It should be mentioned, whether you look at it or not, that I am, along with my column, cited by name by Mr. Ameling in the above mentioned YouTube clip. Of all the topics I mentioned in the article as needing questioning, the only one he chose to address involved the Rossers, or as I am hearing him pronounce it on the recording-Rosslers. It was my exchange with Mr. Ameling about the Rossers that led to a conversation with one of the contractors on the fields project after the meeting. What he said to me was that he had researched the Rossers claim and he felt they were wrong. He also said that in talking with his grandparents, handshake deals were common on the Island back then, and that it was more than likely true that the Rossers had such a deal. I did not ask him if he were in a situation similar to the Rossers

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if he wouldn't be fighting to substantiate his claim as they have. Everyone bemoans the passing of how things used to be on Vashon. At the same time, it seems to be not so difficult to condemn someone for trying to live by the same principles and methods of operation that used to be. There was no dispute with the Rossers and their driveway and easement until the VPD came in with their fields plan and pushed them aside. The other overlooked part of this is that this is not even parks property-it did and does belong to the school district.

Another thing the contractor mentioned was that the parks would not be in the trouble they are in if the Rossers hadn't forced their dispute into court. This is not true. The reason VPD is going into the end of this year at least \$58K in the hole is because the board authorized the spending of way more money than they had because of the dream of a gift. Whenever someone blows it big, it has to be expected that a fall guy, a scapegoat, a boogeyman has to be found to vilify and to transfer blame. That was the role of the Rossers until this past Tuesday the 11th, when Mr. Ameling accused you and me of complicity in this debacle because we did not show up to tell him not to spend what we didn't have. I titled this piece An Unexpected Journey, partly because that is the second title of the just released Hobbit film, and mostly because of the fact that I had no idea that this was happening or that I would wind up spending so much time going down various roads in order to try and find out what the heck is going on. As it turns out, the actual second title from the Hobbit book is "There, and Back Again". What this brings to mind is the quote attributed to Albert Einstein, and that is: " Insanity- doing the same thing over and over and expecting different results." When I look into Mr. Ameling's eyes on the YouTube clip and he asks whether we think anyone cares more about the parks than he does, I'm almost ready to answer no, I don't. But when he says that all we need to do is get to the end of the year and "...everything will be just like it was", I am quickly snapped back to the reality that the VPD has been crippled by the actions of this board and it is time for a fresh start with people unassociated with this debacle.

a moment, exactly what sort of evidentiary force did the photograph with descriptive text add to the equation? It's a still PHOTOGRAPH, not a movie. A picture of my car on a street is not like a picture of me knocking over a bank or a liquor store where the content of the photograph actually depicts the apparent criminal activity. My alleged crime was that of speeding, and a still photograph doesn't show speeding. The SAME EXACT still picture could also be depicting me stalled at a dead stop in the middle of the street or going 90 miles an hour instead of 26.

The descriptive text accompanying the photograph is only as good as the operating officer's say so. May as well just settle for the officer's say so by itself because, essentially, it's just the officer's assertions written down and stuck on the picture. It doesn't add any evidentiary value in and of itself.

Secondly, this entire approach to catching speeders steals the accused's right to speak in their own defense for all practical purposes. Ordinarily, I would say something like "imagine being accused of a crime and being denied the right to speak on your own behalf" except that you don't have to imagine it. Just get one of these photographic speeding tickets and you can experience it for yourself.

Think about it. Whenever you have received a traffic infraction in the past, back when you still got personal contact with an actual police officer when you got your ticket, you have always been an active participant in the process. You're THERE, in the moment, actively paying attention and witnessing all of the facts carefully and remembering them for the future, perhaps even discussing the details of the incident with the citing officer at the time. You're fully cognitively aware of what's going on and if there's anything hinky with what's happening to you, you're aware of it at the time and can carefully examine the situation. Was someone driving erratically and you were trying to avoid them at the time? Was there a moving van parked in front of the blinking school zone light so you didn't see it and didn't know you were in a school zone? When the red light came on in your rearview mirror, did you check your speed and it showed you weren't speeding and so you think the officer's radar is is miscalibrated or his radar must've targeted a different car?

But with a photograph-

based speeding ticket, you don't find out until about 10 days later that you've even been accused. You have absolutely no chance to gather evidence to defend yourself at the time the alleged crime was committed. About the only thing YOU can do is appear as a character witness for yourself. You can trust me when I tell you that's not going to be very effective in court.

I can barely remember being in the citation area at all much less any potentially exculpatory details. Again, while I would pretty clearly remember robbing a bank or knocking over a liquor store, who can remember exactly what they were doing along an arbitrary stretch of road 10 days ago? I'm a very stodgy, safe driver, very prone to obeying traffic laws. But can I honestly say I now remember that specific date, time and arbitrary stretch of road clearly enough to actually swear to the details in a court of law? No way, and the State (aka City of Seattle) knew that very well in coming up with this system. You can practically see the administrative avarice collecting in puddles.

Oh, technically, I can have my day in court if I want. And say what, exactly? "Um....uh... er....I really don't know if I was speeding or not"? Effectively, and very efficiently, any ability I MIGHT have had to mount an actual defense of myself is gone before I step in the court door. Any right I might have had to speak for myself is reduced to whining about how unfair it all is.

And if you're someone who thinks that we should all just accept the State's word on it when citizens are accused of crimes, then you're a fool and I'd be delighted to tell that to you to your face. The State gets it wrong all the time. They got it wrong in one detail in my actual case. They insisted I had not mailed in my required response and the state employee I was working with got all ramped up to jam extra penalties down my throat when I produced my certified mail receipt. The resentment from the employee for my having successfully defended myself against additional fees was palpable.

And why have courts at all if the State is always to be trusted, if their word is sufficient?

You can believe me when I tell you that these two flaws are not the only flaws I discovered with this ticketing system. I haven't covered the rest of them because of article size limitations.

So celebrate, law-abiding citizens everywhere. Our children are much safer today. And it has only cost us a lowering of the bar of acceptable evidence and the complete repudiation of the notion of speaking in one's own defense.

Those with a more subtle political perception will recognize this sort of thing as

just an everyday example of how governments work to erode our basic rights and freedoms in favor of administrative expediency. We're being conditioned to believe that it's an either/or situation, that to achieve some social benefits we're simply going to have to give up some of our freedoms and rights. I mean, don't you WANT to keep children safe? As if such a worthwhile objective could not be achieved WITHOUT having to give up protections and freedoms in the process.

And don't forget, when we swallow such a poisoned policy pill, we are establishing a "precedent", a weapon far more effective than a bomb, that may be leveraged in other policy situations more politically useful for the government in the future. In America, a relinquished right or freedom is the political/legal gift that just keeps on giving, as far as the government is concerned. It is the essence of the slippery slope.

I am neither angry, resentful, or disappointed in my government for behaving in this shameful way. It's in its nature, no insult intended. The real fault lies with us, the citizenry, for being insufficiently vigilant. That is our job, honestly.

So the thing that surprises (and disheartens me) most about this whole experience is the type of responses I get from people on this issue:

- 1. Yeah, it's a racket.
- 2. If you don't want to get a ticket then you shouldn't speed.
- 3. I'm glad they're finally doing something to stop people from speeding through school
- 4. You're just mad because you got nailed with a speeding ticket.
- 5. Got a tinfoil hat to go with that conspiracy theory?

While all of the above may be true, it clearly shows a complete inability to perceive the vastly more important philosophical issues behind the mundane practical elements. Such people would have been technically correct if they pointed out that Rosa Parks would have gotten to her destination just as quickly if she had quietly sat in the back of the bus.

When it comes to American politics and the legalities of rights and freedoms, nothing is EVER what it seems on the surface; the implications and indirect ramifications are always far more critical. Because of this essential truth, there is no such thing as straining at gnats when it comes to our rights and freedoms. Simple things like where you sit on a bus or having the opportunity to sign your traffic citation make all the difference in the world between a country of rights and freedoms ... and something less.

How sad that what we have now is something less.

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
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Pom! Pom! Pom! **Gingerbread Drummers Play**

These cookie drummer boys are full of wholegrain goodness and have lower Glycemic Index numbers than cookies made with only wheat flour. Using half gluten-free and half all-purpose flour makes their dough more elastic, thus easier to roll out, than using all gluten free flours. If gluten is a problem for anyone in your family, use only teff and sorghum flours. Teff is extra-high in fiber.

> Drummer Boy Ginger Cookies Makes about 8 (5-inch tall) drummers & some 2-inch angels

Preheat oven to 350 degrees Mix well in large bowl: ½ cup melted butter ½ cup brown sugar ½ cup molasses 1/4 cup water 1 teaspoon vanilla 2 eggs Sift and stir in gradually: 3 ½ cups all purpose flour or 1 cup teff flour 2 ½ cups sorghum flour

1 teaspoon soda 1/4 teaspoon clove powder

1 teaspoon baking powder

2 teaspoons cinnamon 2 teaspoons ginger powder

Form three balls of dough. Dover 2 with plastic wrap. On floured surface roll out one ball to 1/8 inch thickness. Cut drummer boy shape with 5-inch gingerbread man metal cutter or by cutting around a cardboard shape with a paring knife or steak knife. Pull extra dough away from boys. Use 2-inch cutters to make small gingerbread kids or angels, or form this dough into another ball, roll and cut again. (These cookies will be crisper.)

With spatula or pancake burner, carefully transfer cookies to foil-lined baking sheets. Decorate with red hot candies for mouths and buttons, or with raisins and currants, or some of each. Bake in center of oven 8 to 10 minutes. When dough dents and then springs back at a finger touch, the cookies are done. Let rest 5 minutes on pan. Transfer to racks to finish cooling. Repeat with the other two balls of dough, or freeze them for baking later.

Paint the boy's clothes and drum with a mixture of egg yolk and food coloring. A mini-muffin tin offers plenty of little paint cups. Visualize the boy's round belly as the drum's top. Position toothpicks for drumsticks. Glue them on with egg white. Paint with egg-yolk and food coloring colors instead of sugar frosting to cut down a bit on the amount of sugar your people take in this Christmas.

In this column, I typically stick to observations about critters with flippers. Before I embarked on my current mission with marine mammals, however, I had a career in human suffering. I rather enjoyed my work as a mental health clinician, but the cruelty I witnessed as a case manager for Child Protective Services drove me back to nature. Man's infinite capacity to inflict horrendous pain on other humans induced me to study orcas instead.

My former vocation always comes knocking when we endure a heinous but possibly preventable national tragedy. Satisfactory explanations for the carnage in Newtown, Aurora, Tucson, ad nauseum, will never manifest. These events are ineffable. Through our profound collective grief, we offer condolences, thoughts, prayers, and poignant tributes.

This time, are we sufficiently disgusted by the massacre of innocents? Can we pierce the nihilistic denial in our violenceobsessed society regarding gun ownership, regarding mental health treatment? Are we finally ready for transformative action and policy change?

Returning to whales -- after dusk on December 17, K Pod traveled slowly south in windwhipped Colvos Pass. Mark Sears saw the orcas enter north Colvos four hours before we heard them on the hydrophone at Chez VHP. The orcas arrived with the evening high tide and we obtained our sixth Southern Resident recording of this season. Most vexing was the ultra-loud ferry noise masking the subdued orca vocalizations. We surmised that the engine and the prop were working harder in the stiff wind.

Mark and I are lacking solid data on a December 11 visit by the Southern Residents. In scientific terms, one public photo of a single K Pod member does not adequately document the encounter. We urge anyone The Dersal Spin the encounter. We urge anyone with photos or sightings from the 11th to contact the VHP.

> As this will be the last Dorsal Spin of 2012, I wish to acknowledge the departed in the Southern Resident Community: Raggedy (K40), Sooke (L112), Alexis (L12), Tanya (L5), Gaia (L78), and Riptide (J30). Several of these whales died prematurely, and we will not learn why they died because they simply disappeared. Little Sooke's body has been examined intensively, but the cause of her



death is still inconclusive.

Losing any Southern Resident is difficult, but I shed extra tears for Raggedy (K40) when I learned she was gone. She like Lummi (K7) was one of my special gals, among the Southern Residents I became well acquainted with 20 years ago. This week's photo shows Raggedy on one of her final visits to Point Robinson.

their nakedness and took care of the business at hand. It was noted that when the ship's party built a bonfire to stay warm, the locals stood a hundred feet or so away naked and sweating! I've heard another anecdote about a North American native. When asked how he could go about in the winter with no shirt on, he replied, "How can you go about in the cold with no covering on your face?" Receiving no answer, he continued, "Indians are all face!" If you've read any historic frontier or adventure novels, you can't help but wonder how our own ancestors survived the conditions they faced with only the resources

As we move between our comfortable, climate controlled houses, cars, stores, churches, etc., we seldom give ourselves a chance to acclimate to and experience the real world. It's hard to imagine how that cold wet dark world actually nurtures and supports us, but

This is just one indication of how we have isolated and separated ourselves from what we call Nature; if we thought we were truly part of it, we wouldn't continually refer to it as something other. Many of us see that our future lies in being able to abandon our

homocentric bubble in which we alone decide what we can or can't do in "our" world, where everything is valued in terms of its utility for us. Over the past few years, I've begun to appreciate the position of deep ecologists. Their position is simply that we humans are not the total "why and wherefore" of existence on this planet. We are only a single species in a very complex life system and we have an obligation to respect and support all of our larger self, the world. As our fellow species, whom we depend on to maintain the world we know, blink out of existence at a greater and greater rate, I think it is clear that we have taken way more than our share and it is time to scale back.

For those holiday blues, I recommend taking a quiet walk in the woods. Commune with who and what is out there, give yourself time to let your eyes get used to the dark, your ears attune to the quiet, and your skin adjust to the cold and damp. Let the "out there" become "here," and you may be better able to enjoy all that the season has to offer.

with a water service connection can be serviced with water after issuance of an engineering study that assures the out-building and the primary residence in combination will use less than one equivalent residential unit worth of water. This new regulation is in conformity with the Accessory Dwelling Unit policy passed earlier by the commission, that allows an ADU to be serviced with water from the same water connection that serves the principal residence. [Article III, paragraph iv (b)]
